FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

he concept of Teshuva (repentance) involves taking stock of who we are and what we have done. This is called "Cheshbone Hanefesh." We look into the mirror and try to reconcile how we see ourselves with how others view us. This is the first step on the path of repentance.



Looking into the mirror and knowing who you are is the first step. Knowing where you are going is the necessary second step. We must understand what we have done and where these actions are leading us.

So the third step: to know who you are, where you are going and what baggage you are taking with you. It's not an easy process even though it might seem that way. In part this is because the mirror does not reflect us clearly. It's clouded by our perceptions; for each of us has two identities; who we think we are and who we really are.

For instance we may see ourselves as caring and compassionate – but wonder why no one sees us that way. We may think we treat others with care – but then wonder why it is never reciprocated.

On the High Holy Days each of us will enter the sanctuary with different identities. We must be aware of both our identities for unless we do we will never understand our relationships. We will never understand how we have hurt others and why we have been hurt in turn.

Remember that identity is fluid; it changes as we journey through life. Repentance is part of that fluidity; it allows us to reboot after mistakes and remake ourselves into people who are caring and kind.

But we must first take an honest look in the mirror – and approach the mirror with honest intentions. We must recognize that we are human. Only then can we truly understand the purpose of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur.

Ginny and I wish you and yours a healthy, happy and honest High Holy Day season.

MUSICAL NOTES

If you know even a little bit about me, you know my passion for singing – particularly singing Jewish music, both sacred and folk; and for making music with others through the venue of a choir. I have derived great joy and satisfaction from conducting our own CBI choir, whom you hear each year singing so beautifully on the High Holydays.



There is a long history of vocal and instrumental music being an integral part of Jewish worship. King David is credited with establishing the first Israelite choir and orchestra with the purpose of enhancing the spiritual mood of sacred services. We read in I Chronicles 15:16, "David told the chiefs of the Levites to appoint their brethren to be the singers, accompanied by instruments: lutes, lyres and cymbals, joyfully making their voices heard." The Mishnah (Ar. 2:6) states that in Jerusalem's Second Temple, "there were never fewer than twelve Levites standing on the platform (as a choir) but there was no limit on the maximum number of singers." Following the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 C.E., the Rabbis abolished the sacrificial rite and its accompanying instrumental and vocal music. But the Jews still longed for the elevating sounds of the choir. Even Maimonides, the great 12th century Jewish philosopher, permitted the choir to sing God's praise in the synagogue and at all religious feasts. Professional synagogue choirs were established as early as the 16th century, following the artistic model of the European churches. In the 19th century, four- part choral singing became a regular feature of the synagogues in Europe, where they sang the works of such distinguished composers as Solomon Sulzer (1804-1890) and Louis Lewandowski (1823 - 1894). To this day, our congregation, along with many others, still include some of their Shabbat and High Holyday melodies (i.e. Tzaddik Katamar by Lewandowski and Sh'ma and much of the Torah service by Sulzer).

For almost every summer since 1990, I have been attending the North American Jewish Choral Festival, sponsored by the Zamir Choral Foundation. This festival is a 5 day gathering of over 500 people, all of whom share a passion for singing Jewish music (although not all of them are "professional" singers/musicians) and who share the objective of keeping alive the tradition of music in Jewish life and worship. A recent survey conducted on behalf of the Zamir Choral Foundation illustrates the impact that singing in a Jewish choir can have. There is strong anecdotal evidence that many people who are not otherwise involved in Jewish life find their way in through their love of Jewish singing. For me, singing in or conducting a Jewish choir is a way to integrate music, Judaism, community and spirituality.

I pray that the New Year will bring all of us to new spiritual heights as we lift our voices together in songs of praise and thanks. May we be blessed with good health, strength, harmony and peace. Michael, Shira and Joshua join me in wishing all of you a wonderful and sweet New Year. Shanah Tovah Umetukkah!

President's Message

My CBI Shtick

Over the summer, I visited the Yiddish Book Center at Hampshire College, where my daughter – and CBI Librarian! – Abigael was attending the Great Jewish Books Summer Program. There was a mural showing Yiddish words that are common in the English language. Of

course, one of the words that came to mind was shtick.

The word has a number of meanings and usages, deriving from its Yiddish and German roots meaning "piece." It is perhaps best known in relation to comic routines or gimmicks, as in "bits" of comedy or adapted personas. (Think Johnny Carson, Rodney Dangerfield, Chris Berman and even The Wiggles.) Over time, *shtick* has come to mean any habit, routine, talent, quirk or convention commonly associated with a particular person.

I thought of this as I sat down to write my first column as president of Congregation B'nai Israel. I needed a *shtick*! What will be my eccentricity that everyone will come to know about me when it comes to CBI? I realized I already had one...my obsession with community as the most important factor in synagogue life. It is what I talk about when I am Bima Officer for a bar or bat mitzvah in our sanctuary. It is what fuels my approach to programming, whether adult learning, Israel connection, youth engagement, family enrichment or purely social. It is what has kept me motivated during my eight years as a trustee and officer of our *kehillah kedosha* – sacred community.

Welcome back to a New Year!

I am very excited for the incredible programming that will be happening at CBI this coming year for both adults, children and families. We will have speakers, classes, field trips, family learning projects, hands on social action projects, music, and much more.



One of the things I am most excited about is a visit from a Medic from United Hatzalah, the volunteer emergency response organization in Israel. Not only will a medic be coming to teach us about the exciting work that this organization does, averaging a response time of only 90 seconds in Jerusalem and 3 minutes throughout Israel, he will also be bringing a ambucycle, a specially outfitted motorcycle which has everything that an ambulance would have except the bed and can get to the scene of a medical emergency much faster than an ambulance. We will get to see and touch the ambucycle on December 10, 2017.

I am also excited for our Tichon, Hebrew High School program on Monday nights, which was best described by one of our students as "Jewish Social Studies." We look at current events, understand the Jewish calendar, delve into ethical dilemmas and reframe the Jewish holidays to make them

meaningful to teens. If you have a teenager who may not have been in Tichon in the past, that's fine, we are always happy to have new students of all ages.

Of course, BBRS will open on September 10 with our full faculty and students ready for a great year of building Hebrew skills, creating community, forging Jewish identity, singing, laughing, and enjoying our learning together. We will once again partner with two local Conservative synagogues to do camp-style programming with our 4th and 5th graders. We will learn from a Rishona, an emissary from Israel who will teach our 6th graders in a fun class called "I love Israel." And we will celebrate holidays, with special programs. I look forward to welcoming all of the students and parents back to school on Sunday, September 10 with a brief opening assembly and few weeks of school before the High Holy Days.

Hello and shana tova from the library! Over the summer the library has been relieved of its irrelevant books and updated with new donations. We will continue to have book reviews in the bulletin and in the library this year, and more donations are always welcome in the form of books or money to purchase books we would like to add. We will also continue to use plural pronouns, despite there being only one person doing all this.

Today we have for you a review of a book the library does not yet own: *Superman Is Jewish?* by Harry Brod.

"If I'm successful, readers of [Superman is Jewish?] should come to see how the people of the book became the people of the comic book."

In a long introduction and even longer book, Harry Brod tackles questions that are relevant not just to Jews in comics but to all Jews in America: what makes a person, a character, or a work of art Jewish? He creates his own criteria and goes crawling for answers through the golden, silver, bronze, and modern ages of comics, as well as the works of Jewish graphic novelists all over the world. From Superman to Maus, Spider-Man to The Rabbi's Cat, Brod traces the roots and influences of comics all the way from religious art in Europe to the culture of immigrant Jews in New York during the birth of comics. He focuses on the lives on the of the very first Jewish comics creators and their enduring

influence, and follows the path through how comics and graphic by Jewish novels authors have changed in tone and message. How did the struggle traditional masculinity and secularization shape heroes created by **Iews?** Are some of these heroes more religiously or culturally Jewish than



others? Have the Jewish roots of these heroes been honored up to this day? Drawing on his own childhood and the knowledge of comics professionals, Brod presents a compelling argument not just that Superman *is* Jewish, but that the *idea* that he is remains important to this day.

The CBI Vision 2020 committee is pursuing some strategic initiatives for CBI's future to ensure that we remain sustainable while

meeting the needs of our community. We are in the early phase of gathering both feedback and ideas from members as we discuss the challenges and opportunities that we face.

We held several focus group sessions in June and July, with lively discussion at each meeting covering a wide array of topics and concerns. Some topics covered include the appropriateness of our mission statement and our progress towards the goals outlined therein; feelings regarding our religious services; preferences in synagogue size including a discussion of the implications of a larger or smaller congregation; ideas for our preschool, religious school and youth programming focusing on ways to keep our youth engaged Jewishly; social activities and adult education; our efforts at social action; the physical

facilities we occupy and our professional staff. Analysis of these discussions will help us determine the key questions to raise in our congregational survey and to discuss further.

To give everyone in the community a chance to participate in the conversation and broaden the base of information that we can use when making important decisions, we are preparing a community survey that is being sent out this fall. We will also look for forums to share our findings and promote further discussion. As we develop our strategic initiatives, we expect that they will grow and change along with us.

"Mitzvah in a Minute"

from the Religious Affairs Committee

Shabbat has been said to be G-d's gift to the Jewish people, and the Jewish people's gift to the world. Coming from the Hebrew root "Shevet" meaning "to rest," Shabbat has and continues to be an experience of physical rest and emotional restoration. In this time of doing "more, faster, harder," the concept of a rest, of "being", as opposed to "doing," can be extraordinarily healthful and meaningful.

The Religious Affairs Committee and clergy have recently introduced programming and experiences to enhance our experience of Shabbat at CBI. Please share with us your experiences of these events. Our goal is to offer programming that piques your interest, encourages you to join us for Shabbat services, and ultimately, for you to experience Shabbat in a more meaningful.way.

Rabbi Bayar has held a monthly Tisch on Shabbat mornings. Tisch, a Yiddish word for Table, is a Jewish tradition in which members of community sit at the rabbi's table, learning Torah as if it were a sweet and nourishing meal. At CBI, the Tisch begins at 8:45 on Shabbat morning, before services and lasts about 45 minutes. After the Tisch, we return to main sanctuary for services. Thus far, the Rabbi has focused on the weekly Parasha, the Torah portion. The Tisch have been a mix of discussion and lecture, with quotes from various Jewish scholars from across the generations used to stimulate discussion. Of course, bagels, salads, cake and coffee are available!

A second Shabbat enhancement was the rabbi's effort to introduce Storah-telling, something our community experienced in January when Rabbi Amichai Lau-Lavie came to CBI. Rabbi Bayar has changed up his typical D'var Torah by explaining and discussing each sentence in a particular Torah

reading as it is read, rather than after the entire Torah and Haftorah readings.

Three types of musical Shabbat experiences on Friday night have also been introduced in recent years in an effort to increase attendance at services and kavanah, heart-felt intention in prayer. Shir Shabbat, developed by Debbie Marcus, Rabbi Bayar and others, has been a very successful monthly, family-oriented Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat service. Held a bit earlier than the Kabbalat Shabbat service in the main sanctuary, this service includes many camp tunes for the Shabbat prayers and other engaging songs and activities. A second musical Shabbat activity introduced by Jill Kimmelman has been a Friday night activity for families with young children. It includes songs accompanied by guitar, and other Shabbat activities. Finally, the CBI Yom Tov Band plays three-four times during the summer at the Kabbalat Shabbat service. The band, made up of congregant-volunteers, intends their music to provide added inspiration and feeling to our Friday evening prayer service. It's a child-friendly, active experience where participants are encourage to dance, sing, and shake rhythm instruments along with the prayers.

I hope this have given you some sense of what's been happening at CBI Shabbat services and why. Please do share your thoughts, and more importantly, check our what's been happening! These changes to services could very well be the "something" that helps you to experience Shabbat in a more meaningful way!

ISRAEL AFFAIRS

2017 AIPAC Policy Conference March 26 – March 28, 2017

Last month's Bulletin included an AIPAC article by Jacob Daniel. This month we present the reaction of another student to the AIPAC Policy Conference. Several CBI teenagers attended the conference through

the generosity of the Jewish Federation of Greater Metrowest, and a grant from The Herb and Milly Iris Youth and Family Endowment. Each of the students receiving grants wrote essays highlighting their experiences. This month we are presenting Josh Kallet's essay. Josh was a 10th grade student at Golda Och Academy when he attended last March's Policy Conference and is the son of Cantor Lorna Wallach and Michael Kalet.

Israel: A Jewish State, but Not Just a Jewish Cause

My experience at the 2017 AIPAC policy conference was extremely valuable and educational, something that I had expected prior to attending my first conference. It's impressive to hear about the amazing life changing innovations that have been developed in Israel such as technology that produces drinkable water from thin air and smart phones that can be used by people who are paralyzed from the neck down. You feel pride when you hear about the great work of the IDF mobile field hospital which travels to places around the world devastated by crises such as earthquakes and tsunamis and that they received the highest ranking of 83 countries from the United Nation's World Health Organization, and about how the IDF medical staff treats victims of Syrian's civil war in Israeli facilities along the Israeli - Syrian border. However, the most surprising yet meaningful thing that I learned at AIPAC is how many non-Jews support AIPAC and Israel. I had incorrectly assumed that because Israel is a Jewish state, most of its supporters are the Jewish people along with politicians and other public figures who want to gain the Jewish voters' support. Having attended the AIPAC Policy Conference has taught me that Israel's base of support is comprised of people from every religion and ethnicity imaginable.

Through AIPAC, I have come to realize that Israel is so much more than a Jewish state; it is a holy country for many religions, where all people can feel welcomed and accepted, something that is not common in the Middle-East. While it is true that I could have acquired this information without having gone to the

AIPAC Policy Conference, it is very different to learn information through the media versus hearing it firsthand. Had someone told me that a number of countries in Africa, including Rwanda and Togo, may be some of Israel's strongest allies, I might not have truly understood what that meant. However, seeing the president of Rwanda give a speech at a pro-Israel conference about Rwanda's strong support for Israel, and seeing Togo's Minister of Foreign Affairs not only preach about his and his country's undeniable support for Israel, but also sing the Shamal in a beautiful melody in front of a crowd of thousands of people, a song that he learned on an AIPAC-sponsored trip to Israel, has truly enabled me to understand what it means for Israel to have support from every denomination of people and how important these supportive relationships are to both Israel and her allies.

The Bulletin will include other student's essays in future months.

2018 AIPAC Policy Conference March 4-6, 2018

Several donors from CBI has pre-purchased a limited number of \$399 registrations to encourage our fellow congregants to attend the Policy Conference next year. As the AIPAC direct price is now higher than that, registering through CBI will save each purchaser at least \$100. Let me know if you are interested in registering this way, and we will sign you up with AIPAC. We are also hopeful that Metrowest will continue its scholarship program for teenagers who attend the AIPAC Policy Conference with a parent. Please respond early so that we can fill our allotment and have a large and energetic delegation next year.

My Summer Vacation in Israel July – August, 2017

Nancy and I spent all of July and a few more days in Israel this year, the longest continuous period we have ever been in country. And it wasn't really a vacation; it was a visit. We visited our daughter Stephanie and her family to welcome our new granddaughter, Noga Rahel!

I tried something else which I had always wanted to do, but never had the time. I took a four-week Ulpan Course (Level Aleph +). I took my course from UAB (Ulpan Aviv Bertele). The class I took met five days a week (starting on Sunday) for four weeks. Aviv is a knowledgeable and energetic teacher. For me, who has tried many times to learn Hebrew, this time was

an exciting success. While I have a long way to go, I for once feel comfortable trying out my Hebrew with Israelis, including ordering in restaurants (sometimes) and grocery shopping. Although our trip had no touring, we had miles of walking every day in July Tel Aviv heat. If it weren't taking our older granddaughter to Gan, or picking her up, it might have seemed like work.

So, we are back home now in the US, but looking forward to our next trip home in Israel.

What's coming in 2018?

The Jewish Calendar turns again in September, and we will be beginning 5778. In addition to the events which happen every year, like the Israel Bond Appeal, the AIPAC Policy Conference, and the Salute to Israel Parade, next year will feature something which does not happen every year. CBI will be sponsoring a family trip to Israel. The trip will be led by Rabbi Bayar and will take place in February. We also hope to have some speakers and educational opportunities which will touch on Israel issues.

CBI and Israel

While Nancy and I were in Israel, we were not the only members of our CBI community "Being There." We had students participating in the Diller Teen program, and the Maccabiah games and probably other programs, I am not even aware of. If you had a summer experience in Israel, please share it with me so I can share it with our community.

Our Goal for the Year?

The most important thing we can accomplish in 5778 is promoting Unity among the Jewish People. And Unity does not always meet everyone else agreeing with us. It means all of us recognizing that both these and those are the words of a Living G-d. We must recognize that we will not always agree on which policies are right, but we must focus on being sure that our efforts are focused on maintaining a strong overall Jewish people and a strong US Israel relationship


