FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

his month we will commemorate three modern observances: Yom Ha'atzmaut (Israel Independence Day), Yom Hazikaron (Israel Memorial Day), And Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day). They are found in close proximity to each other because they are inextricably tied to each other. The joy of Israeli independence tinged with the bitterness of loss that has touched every family in Israel and the recognition that an entire culture was destroyed almost within our lifetimes.



We all recognize Yom Hashoah and Yom Ha'atzmaut but very few of us are aware of Yom Hazikaron. It's is all the more saddening because our religious identity today has been in no small part forged by the establishment of the state of Israel and the State of Israel was created through the sacrifice of its defenders.

Consider this: given the population of Israel, the loss of only a few hundred soldiers is felt directly by the majority of Israelis given that everyone is connected and all are family.

These days are perhaps best captured in a song made popular over twenty years ago: for the rose and its thorn, for the honey and the stinger, for the bitter and the sweet.

These are familiar themes in Judaism and we are asked to accept and sometimes even embrace these relationships. We crush the glass at weddings in order to remember the saddest of times, the destruction of Jerusalem and its temple so that at times of greatest joy we can also remember times of greatest sadness. Our tradition recognizes that nothing of value can ever be accomplished without sacrifice, and that the effort and loss add to its value.

We are a community that is diverse in its formation and makeup. It's diversity is our strength. We are only stronger when we come together in spite of our differences and we ned this strength to thrive and grow. No matter what your political affiliation, no matter where you stand on the spectrum do the Jewish community. I hope you will be cognizant of and participate in each commemoration.

Elie Wiesel stated that the opposite of love is not hate, but indifference. Do not be indifferent.

MUSICAL NOTES

his month we celebrate the 65th anniversary of the State of Israel. For a young country, Israel has such a plethora of folk songs. Looking at the various styles and themes of the repertoire of Israeli folk music, one can certainly get a feel for the pulse of the people from the time of the pre-establishment of the state and throughout its existence as a state. The songs encompass a wide variety of traditions, spanning centuries and Jewish communities around the world. Whether



expressing emotions, ideals or values, the songs tell a story. They record history in a unique and valuable way.

Unlike European folk-songs, whose origins tend to be vague and lost in the past, most of these songs originated in the 20th century and have known composers and poets. Yet they are folk music just the same, for they live now in the oral tradition. Several generations of Jews have grown up singing them, and some songs, such as Tsena Tsena, Shalom Chaverim and, of course, Hava Nagila, have achieved mainstream recognition. The purpose of Israeli folk-songs was to inspire a new national cultural identity through which, in the words of Hinei Ma Tov, Jewish brothers and sisters from many lands would dwell together in unity. For Israelis and for Jews throughout the world, the songs evoke sentiments of pride and belonging.

In celebration of **Yom Ha'atzma'ut**, the Greater MetroWest community is sponsoring a concert on **Monday, April 15 at 7:30PM at Congregation B'nai Jeshurun**, featuring the **Israeli singer Noa**. Known in Israel by her given name Achinoam Nini, Noa is Israel's leading international concert and recording artist. Born in Tel- Aviv in 1969 to parents who were from Yemen, Noa lived in NYC from age 2 until her return to Israel alone at the age of 17. In New York, she attended the SAR Academy lower school and Ramaz High School.

Noa, who is known to be a peace activist, was the first and only major Israeli artist who agreed to have her name posted on the billboards calling for participation in the November 4, 1995 peace rally in Tel Aviv and was on stage performing just minutes before Yitchak Rabin was assassinated there.

Noa and her musical partner Gil Dor, frequently collaborate with Arab and Palestinian artists from around the world because they feel it enables them to express, musically, their belief in the power of communication and dialogue as a means of promoting peace and understanding.

I encourage you to attend what I know will be an uplifting and memorable concert where you will hear some classic Hebrew songs from the "Israeli Songbook". Please contact the office for information about purchasing tickets at a special group rate of \$18 per person.

May the many beautiful folk songs of Israel continue to be sung by Jews around the world, and may there soon be peace and harmony in Israel and everywhere.





21ST Century Pioneers: Developing Communities in the Negev

Yedidya Harush, JNF-Haluzta liaison, was born and raised in the community of Atzmona in Gush Katif. Yedidya's family relocated to Halutza after Israel withdrew from the Gaza Strip in 2005. He was recruited to play basketball in New Jersey for the last two years of high school. After graduation, he was offered college scholarships, which he did not accept. Instead, he returned to Israel and joined an elite Paratrooper Brigade.

Located in the northwest Negev on Israel's borders with Egypt and Gaza, Halutza was founded in 2005 by a small group of families evacuated from the Gush Katif communities of Atzmona and Netzarim during Israel's disengagement from Gaza. This remote corner of the desert, which had never been inhabited or farmed, is now a rapidly expanding agricultural region, which is attracting new residents from throughout Israel.



Since 1959, on every 27th of Nisan, Yom Hashoah is observed in the State of Israel and in Jewish communities throughout the world. In Israel, there is an official ceremony at Yad Vashem, and services and ceremonies are held at



schools, military bases and other public and community organizations. At 10:00 am, sirens are sounded for two minutes and the country comes to a standstill as people pay silent tribute to the six million victims of the holocaust. Flags on public buildings are flown at half mast; places of public entertainment are closed, and television airs Holocaust related documentaries and talk shows.

Outside of Israel, Jews observe Yom Hashoah within the synagogue and in the broader Jewish community with prayer and educational programs. Our Congregation will be observing the day with Dr. Nili Keren speaking about the history of the Holocaust and Holocaust memory on the eve of Yom Hashoah (April 7 at 7 pm). The program will include the lighting of the Yahrzeit Yellow Candles that Men's Club has distributed. Donations through the Men's Club Yellow Candle program are directed to help Holocaust survivors and to support educational and informational efforts related to the Holocaust.

Soon after the defeat of Nazi Germany, Dwight Eisenhower, then the Supreme Commander of the Allied Forces in Europe, visited the site of a concentration camp and wrote: "I visited every nook and cranny of the camp because I felt it my duty to be in a position from then on to testify at first hand about these things in case there ever grew up at home the belief or assumption that the stories of Nazi brutality were just propaganda. Some members of the visiting party were unable to go through with the ordeal. I not only did so but as soon as I returned to Patton's headquarters that evening I sent communications to both Washington and London, urging the two governments to send instantly to Germany a random group of newspaper editors and representative groups from the national legislatures. I felt that the evidence should be immediately placed before the American and British publics in a fashion that would leave no room for cynical doubt."

Unfortunately, Eisenhower was right in his preoccupation about the preservation of the truth. Nowadays, despite of all the evidence, there is no lack of individuals that attempt

to deny or minimize the Holocaust. The current Secretary General of the United Nations, Ban Ki-Moon, referred to these deniers with the following words:

"Denying historical facts, especially on an important subject as the Holocaust, is just not acceptable. Nor is it acceptable to call for the elimination of any state or people. I would like to see this fundamental principle respected both in rhetoric and in practice by all the members of the international community".

The remembrance of the Holocaust serves as a warning not to forget what can occur when prejudice, hatred, and indifference prevail. This is a lesson for all free societies in the world. We must remain alert not only of every attempt to deny the Holocaust, but also, sadly, of every threat from criminal calls to repeat it.



AIPAC Policy Conference

Congregants have been slow to respond to my request to devThis March, I went to the AIPAC (American Israel Public Affairs Committee) policy conference in Washington, D.C. I went in to this year's AIPAC conference an understandably self-centered thirteen year old, who didn't know and didn't care a whole lot about Israel's or the World's, struggles. I came out a young delegate ready to lobby Congress for what I believed in, a strong U.S.-Israel relationship. To say that AIPAC has inspired a paradigm shift in my worldview and the way I see Israel, may very well be an understatement.

One of the most astounding things that AIPAC does is that they make support for Israel bipartisan. When Democrats and Republicans can't agree on anything in Washington, I saw Democrats and Republicans hand in hand ready to talk about and to learn about Israel and its problems. 


