FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

sk your children the following questions: "What makes your grandparents happy? What makes them sad? What makes them afraid?" Every time I have asked these questions of children, without exception most answer: "My grandparents are happy when they visit us. They are sad when we are not with them. They are not afraid."

Children are by nature self-centered and are not to be blamed if these are their answers, especially because grandparents tend to dote on grandchildren and help sustain this self-



centeredness. We live in a society in which family members often live at great distance from each other. It is not unusual for grandparents to live far from their grandchildren and so as a result, visits are infrequent. Phone contact and internet is a primary source of communication. But, you cannot give virtual hugs.

Grandparents do not really want to "live" in front of their grandchildren. What profit is there in telling them about their doctor's visits, their driving experiences, or their aches and pains?

It is likely that the only meaningful contact our children may have had with the elderly in our community comes from their grandparents. Our children don't know what elderly people are like. By giving them a limited and largely unrealistic picture of old age, how can we expect them to reconcile the elderly that they do see? What message are we giving them when we take them to nursing homes for Mitzvah projects?

We do our children a disservice by not trusting them with life experiences. When did they become unable to handle mature issues of life? When did we decide they were too delicate to know about the aging process.

My father's grandmother was the perfect model of the Wicked Witch of the West. She wore black; black stockings, black dress, black shoes. She wore her silver hair in a bun. She had a humongous wart on her chin with two black hairs growing out of it. She mumbled all the time. I was petrified to visit her. She couldn't have been more than sixty-five. My parents would force me to visit her – not telling me where we were going until we had parked the car.


What astonished me was that my father loved her. He loved being with her. Even as a child of four, even though I was scared to death that she would touch me, I knew that he adored her and she him. As a child of six or seven I was astonished that my mother loved her as well. Only years later did I learn that while my father's family objected to his marriage – his grandmother firmly supported him. She was a woman of quality – and I eventually saw her as such – but only long after she herself had died.

I learned a lot through that interaction. Perhaps it was a lesson I didn't realize I had learned until I was an adult, but it was an important lesson nonetheless. I look back now and realize how much I would have missed; learning about my parents and life, if I didn't have these memories.

Sar El Needs Volunteers Now

Pamela Lazerus, Executive Director of Sar El, in Israel, just informed the hierarchy of Sar El, in the US (called VFI/Volunteers for Israel), that volunteers are needed as soon as possible on IDF bases. At this writing, we don't know if a ground invasion of Gaza will happen. Nonetheless, Israeli soldiers will need a wide range of support that can be given by volunteers like you. Paperwork will be expedited for those who contact me. I'm an interviewer/Sar El Ambassador, for Northern New Jersey.

Also, we have a growing list for a Sar El mission to take place during the first week of July '12. I'm certain the IDF will appreciate whatever help we can give. Right now, we will leave on June 27 and return July 7, although individuals might be able to make their own arrangements and dates.

Bulletin: In light of current events in Israel, our friend, Steve Jacoby, is organizing an earlier group to work during the tough times following a possible cease-fire/peace accord. His group, from West Orange and the general area, will start on Sunday, February 16. If you are interested in helping to ease the post-crisis military, contact me. Paperwork will be "expedited."

President's Message

am writing this article in the aftermath of "Superstorm Sandy" while parts of our town remain without power. When this bulletin comes out, life will have hopefully have resumed a closer resemblance to "normal and routine" functioning.

Our congregation has come through in true CBI spirit – reaching out and helping each other. Pre-storm, people came together securing the building with sandbags and wrapping furniture and equipment. Pre- and post-storm outreach by Rabbi Bayar and volunteers checking on congregants, went on around the clock. Our Shabbat services took place in a building without electrical power, but filled with the power of a determined Bat Mitzvah, Ilana Feldman, and our congregation who came together to daven and celebrate Ilana's milestone in our building.

Following the storm, many people could be found in our multi-purpose room, keeping warm, working, enjoying a meal together, finding internet and social connection. I want to thank everyone for all your help: our Clergy, Professional, Office and Maintenance Staff, and congregational volunteers. We have tried to include everyone's name who contributed to the storm-relief efforts elsewhere in this Bulletin. Additionally, a storm preparation committee, chaired by Andrea Hirschfeld, has already been formed to determine how we can best prepare in the future.

While we weathered the storm, we know that there are many communities that were completely devastated. We have seen images these past weeks of families with catastrophic losses. Immediately following Superstorm Sandy, I began receiving emails from congregants asking how CBI could help communities hit worse than we were. Our Hearts and Hands committee, along with Rabbi Bayar, are investigating what the needs are and will commence in efforts to help when it is clear how we can effectively contribute. This immediate wish to help heal the world is part of what defines our congregation and the larger Jewish community.

Less than a week before the storm hit, I had the opportunity to attend a celebratory and outreach event hosted by the Interfaith Hospitality Network. CBI's Hearts and Hands chair, Tracy Ferdinand, as well as Tina Goldstone and Robert Krauss, have been working hard since last year on establishing ways for CBI to help in IHN's efforts. In a strong statement of CBI's commitment to partner with this organization, Rabbi Bayar opened IHN's 25th anniversary event with a blessing. More than twentyfive congregants as well as



our educational director and program coordinator Janice Colmar, came to learn firsthand about IHN's work. We heard directly from families who have been helped by IHN. Their stories and the impact congregations made are inspirational. I am very proud that CBI will be joining IHN's team by providing shelter to families for a week next October, 2013. This is an organization that truly makes a difference and we at CBI will also be making a difference.

Our involvement with IHN is one way that our congregation is going to be able to help provide shelter to families who are in need, whether from the storm or other life circumstances. This effort requires the involvement of our congregants in order to be successful. Over the coming months, we will learn from Tracy, Tina and Robert, how we will be helping and what volunteering will mean.

As you know, the storm necessitated postponement of the Champagne Breakfast to honor Steve Brown and Barry Allen. However, our congregational programming is now back in full swing. Chanukah will be ushered in with several celebrations. I hope to see you at either the Young Family and/or Men's Club Chanukah parties.

In addition, the second Israeli film in the Adult Learning film series, *Footnote*, will take place on December 2nd. Thank you to Ayala and Yoav Tamir for leading a terrific discussion following the first film, *Ushpizin*. If you did not get a chance to see the first film, this next film has also received wonderful reviews and the discussion following the film adds to the experience.

Happy Chanukah! I hope your holidays are filled with warmth, love and light.

In the case of the CBI family before, during and in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy, you can be proud to know that this crisis brought out the very best in our community. Even with no electricity, families with generators and gas stoves were opening their refrigerators,



freezers, homes and hearts to neighbors during the long, stressful recovery period. CBI volunteers went door to door to check on the well-being of congregants including those with health issues as well as our more elderly members; even though the volunteers, themselves, were living in the dark and the cold. Our clergy had no heat or electricity for over almost two weeks, and yet, there they were, taking care of their congregants throughout.

After week one, CBI regained its electricity and, thankfully, we were able to open the doors of the synagogue to provide Wi-Fi and a place to "plug in" along with much needed warmth, comfort, food and camaraderie. The good people of CBI rose to the occasion, shopping, cooking, serving their congregation in any way they could. The Congregation B'nai Israel family showed its true beautiful colors, by taking care of and being there for one another, providing true sanctuary for all.

Then, as everyone gradually found their way back to normalcy with heat and light, we all began to see reports of the devastation and destruction that Sandy left behind. In recent weeks, I have been asking people that I hadn't seen during the recovery period, "How did you do in the storm?" Invariably, the answer has been "I was very lucky!" When I ask, "You didn't lose your power?" The answer no longer surprises me, but it does inspire me every single time: "Oh – I only lost power for a week or so." What incredible people! Strong, giving, and caring who are donating time, money, socks, canned goods – you name it – to take care of those much less fortunate than they.

Yes, some families pull together in a crisis, and some synagogues are more than the programs, worship services and schools they house - they are a community of families who care, like CBI.

This Hanukkah, "don't let the lights go out!"

EZUZ

o Israelis, the idea of an Israeli going back to Israel from America to do community service sounds like an oxymoron—which is precisely why it took me close to 30 years to decide to embark on an adventure and volunteer to work on a tiny organic farm in Ezuz. Ezuz is a rural settlement on a hill next to Nitzana, one kilometer from the Egyptian border.

I left Tel Aviv on Monday, January 9th at around 8 am and arrived three hours later. The drive was quick and the scenery was starkly different from what I am used to seeing in the U.S. and even in Israel.

Looking around on my way there, I saw nothing but sand and dunes, an endless and vast land with "nothingness" going for miles ahead. I was the only moving object making noise. Around me was this solid quiet, the kind I have rarely experienced, before or since.

My destination was the house of Avi Arazuni and his family, situated on the northern side of the hill. Upon arriving at his house I was greeted by one of his kids, a 12 year old boy with long hair and bare feet, signaling me to follow him.

The orchard Avi has built for the last 6 years is the center of universe for the Arazuni family. Their house is made out of old train cars refurbished and made to fit the life style. No chairs or sofa can be found. Inside the house you sit on the floor on rugs and there are some low cushions against the wall. The main room is both the living room and the kitchen combined. Most of the food is made here including bread, jam, and cheeses. The fruits come from the orchard, which has an amazing variety, from oranges, apples and figs to peaches, schesek, almonds, and more. The family owns chickens, two goats, and a donkey, in addition to a dog and a few cats. Avi's wife, Tamar, homeschools all four kids until high school. Avi's car is a good representation of his basic and recycled way of life. Everything in the farm is made out of recycled materials from housing to vehicles



to curtain hangers. The materials used for the orchard walls and construction are either natural stones found in the area or materials brought in from nearby abandoned air-force bases.



Avi's life philosophy is simple, effective and direct. He lives according to his own principles and will not compromise on any of them. He believes strongly in making his trees tougher by training them to get less water than usual. This same principle is applied to his own family members as well. Less makes you alert and eager for more. Even his cats are fed less to keep them alert and nimble in order to help catch mice and snakes and keep the area around his house safer and cleaner.

His connection to his land and conviction about how to go about his life are admirable. He is calm, quiet, and modest, insisting on making us volunteers comfortable and at ease as much as possible. "No rush," "Take your time," "Lo bo'er." Quite a few times he asked me to take a break and look around, enjoy the scenery, notice the birds and smells and take in the beauty around me. Time does not equal money, according to Avi. When you take money out of the equation, then it doesn't matter.

The only thing that brings me back to reality here is the sound of the military jets practicing in the sky above us; an eerie sound that brings me back to my childhood and the fears I had each time I heard these sounds during the Six Day War.

This place was so enchanting that I didn't want to leave it and go back to "civilization". There was nothing there and yet there was everything a man could wish for. My hosts seemed to always be content, calm, and genuinely happy. At Ezuz the phrase "less is more" is and will remain the reality.

On December 18, we will screen the Puccini opera Gianni Schicchi following lunch at noon. Gianni Schicchi is a comic opera in one act by Giacomo Puccini to an Italian libretto by Giovacchino Forzano, composed in 1917-18. The libretto is based on an incident mentioned in Dante's Divine Comedy. The work is the third and final part of Puccini's Il Trittico (The Triptych)—three one-act operas with contrasting themes, originally written to be presented together. Although it continues to be performed with one or both of the other trittico operas, Gianni Schicchi is now more frequently staged either alone or with short operas by other composers. The aria "O Mio Babbino Caro" is one of Puccini's most well-known, and one of the most popular arias in opera.


The CBI Chanting and Meditation Circle

SALUTING OUR SUPER SENIORS: RALPH BERKOWITZ

Ralph Berkowitz

alph was a lifelong member of Congregation B'nai Israel, Elizabeth, until it merged with CBI in 1992. For the past 20 years, he has been a congregant here.

Widowed in 1989, Ralph was married to Audrey for 41 years, and is the proud father of 4 daughters, a son and has 5 grandchildren, including 3

grandsons and 2 granddaughters.

Ralph was a graduate of Carnegie Tech (now Carnegie Mellon) in Pittsburgh, and served in the U.S. Navy during World War II, in the Pacific on an LST and as a commander on an LSM.

Ralph was a second generation printer, operating Berkowitz Press and Microtone Corporation, on Morris Avenue in Elizabeth with his brother Stuart, until he retired. He is an avid reader, primarily of fiction, including detective stories, mysteries, etc. He is a board member and past president of the Elizabeth Development Company, which promotes the economic growth of the city.

Ralph was a photographer aficionado, which served him well in the printing industry and in fact Ralph maintained a fully equipped dark room in his home. An Elizabeth resident for over 80 years, Ralph was Bar Mitzvahed at his Elizabeth synagogue, as were his children. Ralph notes that his Conservative synagogue in Elizabeth was one of New Jersey's pre-eminent congregations, under the guidance of Rabbi Gershon Chertoff and Cantor Morris Schor, at a time, during the 1930's, 1940's and 1950's, when that city was at the epicenter of Jewish life and commerce in New Jersey.

The Elizabeth Daily Journal was the largest daily paper in Union County, and North Broad Street was a business and commercial hub. As the demographic pattern changed, many residents and congregants moved to suburban towns like Westfield, Mountainside, Scotch Plains and elsewhere and Elizabeth became more inner city. This presaged the

membership decline within that congregation and its eventual close. This pattern has evolved in many areas as suburban communities expanded and people sought more living space, more amenities, quality schools, and what was seen as seeking a more upscale lifestyle.

We salute Ralph Berkowitz, a congregant and member of the Adult Forum. The merger of our two congregations was a fortuitous one, resulting in, among other positives, a stronger, more viable men's club, and a strengthened Minyan, and a more congenial, socially active and enriched congregation. Ralph is a foremost example of this happy marriage.



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
