

# FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

The central ritual of Passover, the Seder, takes place at home. The introductory statement of the Haggadah which begins the Seder is the "Ha Lachma Anya."

This is the Bread of Affliction our ancestors ate in the land of Egypt. Let all who are hungry come in and eat. Let all who are in need, come in and share the Passover sacrifice. This year we are slaves. Next year we will be free. This year we are here. Next year we will be in Jerusalem.



This introduction to the Seder is written in Aramaic, not Hebrew. This is significant because at the time of the Seder, Hebrew was not the spoken language of the Jews – Aramaic was. When the rabbis wanted to make sure that the participants of a service understood what they were reading, they left it in Aramaic. The rabbis wanted to be certain that the message of the Ha Lachma Anya was understood.

It is a humbling experience to know that your ancestors were "the poorest" in the world. Slavery is our origin which is why we have a responsibility not to forget and be sensitive to others. So the Passover celebration is a strong reminder of our obligation to help others in the same situation – because in the beginning we ourselves needed Tzedakah.

One observance of the mitzvah of Passover involves the giving of Maot Chittim (wheat money). These funds are donated to poor people so that they can celebrate Passover correctly.

The second important mitzvah associated with Pesach deals with ransoming captives. We are reminded in the Torah several times that we were "strangers" in the land of Egypt. God redeemed us and made a covenant with us. But we were not the only ones redeemed from Egypt.

We learn in the Midrash (rabbinic legends) that Rabbi Meir taught that "not only Israel, but God also was redeemed at the Exodus." Our Covenantal relationship with God teaches us that our God is one who experiences history with us. We were slaves with God in Egypt. Similarly, when we feed the hungry, we are feeding God. When we clothe the naked, we are dressing God. When we perform a Mitzvah of any kind, God is acting with us.

# MUSICAL NOTES

**F** ollowing the death of a close relative, Judaism has very specific laws and guidelines for what is restricted during this period of mourning (30 days for a spouse, sibling or child; a year for a parent). During this period of personal grief, the mourner is supposed to avoid parties, celebrations, concerts, dancing. They can not listen to live music and, for 30 days, they cannot shave or cut their hair. Within each calendar year, Jews also have periods of communal mourning where similar restrictions



are imposed. One such period is the three weeks leading up to Tisha B'Av (commemorating the destruction of the Temple). The other is known as "sefirah" or the 49-day period of the counting of the Omer, which begins on the second night of Passover and goes to Shavuot.

The earliest written source for these communal mourning customs dates back to the Geonic period (6th to 11th centuries C.E. in Babylonia). It appears that the first semi-mourning custom that was established for the Counting of the Omer period was to prohibit marriages, followed at a later date by the prohibition against cutting one's hair, followed still later on by the prohibition against listening to live music and playing musical instruments. The entire issue regarding whether or not music is permitted during sefirah derives from the Magen Avraham, in the Aruch Hashulchan, who writes that one may not dance during sefirah. Many authorities have interpreted or extended this ruling to include listening to any music, because dancing is closely associated with music. Others limit the ban on listening to music during Sefira to music that leads to dancing. Therefore, for example, since listening to background music when driving cannot possibly lead to dancing, a number of authorities permit one to do so.

Originally, the Counting of the Omer period was a time of great joy since it was the time when the Jews were counting down the days from the second evening of Passover to the evening before they received the Torah from God at Mount Sinai, celebrated on the festival of Shavuot. However, tragic events later on in Jewish history - including the tragic death of the 24,000 disciples of Rabbi Akiva who died in a plague in the weeks between Passover and Shavuot (according to the Talmud, this is the traditional and primary reason for the Counting of the Omer period being a period of semi-mourning), and later on the persecutions of the Crusades in medieval Europe, and the massacres of the Spanish Inquisition (1480-1492), the Crusades, and the Bogdan Khmelnitsky pogroms of 1648-1649 in Eastern Europe, all took place primarily in the days between Passover and Shavuot, resulting in the Counting of the Omer period being a time for semi-mourning. The Holocaust is also included in this list of tragic events, although it occurred all year long for many years during World War II. However, in Yaacov Vainstein's 1953 book entitled, "The Cycle of The Jewish Year: A Study of the Festivals and of Selections from the Liturgy", the revolt of the ghettos against the Nazis took place in the month of Nissan and is included in his discussion of the Counting of the Omer period.

However you choose to observe this period of seven weeks, may it be




We are indeed, a very fortunate congregation to have such a fantastic and positive team.



#### Dear Congregant: Sale of Chametz & Maot Chittim (Wheat Money)

The sale of Chametz is an integral part of the traditional Passover preparation.

Jewish law prohibits both the consumption and the possession of Chometz during Passover. Since it is virtually impossible to dispose of all Chametz prior to Passover, it is customary practice to arrange for its sale by an agent appointed by the individual family.

This is a legal transaction, which is arranged by the rabbi. By assigning the rabbi as your agent, you give the buyer all rights of ownership over the Chametz that will be sold to him/her.

After Passover, the rabbi, as agent, repurchases the Chametz.

The sale of Chametz must be attended to by Monday morning, March 25, by 10:00 a.m. For those who cannot see the rabbi in person, we provide a form, which must be filled out, signed and received at the congregation by Sunday, March 24.

Just as we are enjoined to remove Chametz for the holiday, we are also asked to help those in need celebrate the Passover correctly. We do this through the collection of Maot Chittim (wheat money) This year we will use monies from the fund to help the Jewish communities in Israel and Essex County.

The fund for **Ma'ot Chittim** is set up through the Rabbi's Fund at B'nai Israel. Money donated to this fund is earmarked to help those in need celebrate Pesach. *Please make out your checks to the Rabbi's Fund* (*RDF*).

# MEN'S CLUB

The little child understood that he had a special role as the youngest – and only boy - among the grandchildren. He was proud and a little nervous. The Zaide solemnly presided over more than forty people attending the



Seder: the child's parents and sisters, the married aunts and their families, the single uncles, relatives from Buenos Aires in search of work or a spouse, neighbors and friends from the years at the agricultural colony and some even from the old country. The Bubbe diligently directed the serving of the delicious meal that she had expertly cooked: homemade chrain; charoset as in her mother's old recipe; gefilte fish made with corvina from the Pacific Ocean; the chicken from the backyard roost that had been ritually sacrificed in the morning. The traditional Ashkenazi pronunciation of Hebrew words from the grown-ups reading the Haggadah did not sound anything like the lessons the child and his sisters had been learning from a moreh from Eretz Israel. But when the time came for the fir kashes, the child chanted loud and clear, and the Zaide, visibly moved, commended him saying that he had sung better even than a chazzan.

The child in this story is my father and this is a memory that he told me from the early 1940s when the family had already been established in Santiago for over twenty years and had climbed out from deep poverty through the industrious efforts of my grandfather. I've received no memories about previous Seders, at the colony where my grandfather grew up as a Jewish gaucho - and that was lost to flooding - or at the village on the Dniester River - which, as heard by my father, my great-grandfather swam across on hot summer days - or at previous places altogether forgotten. I can only imagine how they dimmed the lights, set another place at the table, served a special glass of wine, and opened the door for Elijah to come in, as they did at my father's first Manishtana Seder. And I can only imagine their voices - still resounding in my father's head - telling the story of liberation from slavery and singing Avadim Ainu, Dayeinu and Hadgadia. But I don't need to imagine the faith and dignity of those prior generations that celebrated Passover before my time. They live strong in me as my family and I continue the traditions of the Seder.

**Onward Israel Negev Fellowships** - After a successful first year, we are recruiting now for summer 2013. #### AIPAC Policy Conference March 3 - March 5

As this Bulletin is being published, CBI delegates to the Policy Conference are ready for an event that will offer knowledge and inspiration and Celebrate 65 Years of US Israeli friendship. The message of AIPAC is that the United States Israel relationship must be strong no matter who is charge of the two governments. It should be well known that AIPAC's focus is on strong Bi-Partisan support for the relationship, including both Democrats and Republicans.

After attending the Policy Conference, your fellow congregants will have experienced three days of hearing US and Israeli political leaders, scholars and journalists addressing the most important issues facing the US Israel relationship. Among the critical issues discussed:

- preventing Iran from attaining nuclear weapon capability;
- reinforcing the importance of direct negotiations in bringing peace to the region;
- supporting US security assistance to Israel; and
- urging the EU to designate Hezbollah as a terrorist organization

Delegates attend four general sessions that include speakers and panel discussions of general interest, and also select up to four specific break-out sessions that allow them to learn more about a topic of their own interest. Finally, following a Monday night gala event attended by government officials from throughout the world, on Tuesday delegates visit Capital Hill to lobby congressional representatives about key issues impacting the US Israel relationship.

# SALUTING OUR SUPER SENIORS: HOWARD GREENWALD

members. Their daughter, Elyse, went to Washington after graduating from Smith College, and is employed by the Homeland Security Committee, chaired until recently by former Connecticut Senator Joseph Lieberman.

Howard is the nominal leader of the daily morning minyan, having committed himself to this important CBI activity. Howard began attending minyan services in 1999, saying kaddish for Nan's father, Ernest. As with many congregants, this soon became habit forming, and part of his daily routine. "When I first started saying kaddish," said Howard, "Saul Drasin was our minyan leader, followed by Juan Katz, Joe Keselman, and Al Kent. I feel honored to be continuing a tradition upheld by some of our most respected congregants."

Howard notes with pride that minyan contributions, over the past 20 years, have raised and contributed over \$70,000 to CBI, all voluntary. "You would be surprised," he adds, "to realize how much money is donated, from simple one and two dollar donations, paying for breakfasts, to larger contributions honoring and memorializing current and former members and their families.

Howard reflects that, though not growing up particularly observant, he became more so after marrying Nan, and gradually becoming drawn to her spirituality and that of her parents.

Howard served in the Pacific theatre during WWII. Enlisting in 1942, he graduated from Officers Candidate School, and was discharged 4½ years later, as a major. Howard served as a staff officer under the administration of General Douglas MacArthur in the Philippines and Hawaii.


Howard was president of the CBI men's club for 3 years,

and also served on the CBI board of directors for six years. One of his fondest and most fulfilling activities, after retiring, was mentoring students in reading and mathematics at Glenwood Grammar School. "It was, perhaps, among the best five years of my life," opined Howard.

Howard also has a daughter, Maureen, four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren, who reside in California. Howard, together with his mother-in-law, Ethel Rosenfeld, were recently honored on their milestone birthdays, at a CBI Kiddush, a truly special and memorable event.




