### FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

S havuot suffers from bad timing; it occurs fifty days after the beginning of Passover, a time when religious schools are closed for the year. The megillah of Ruth is read on Shavuot because it details the story of Ruth, who is considered the model convert to Judaism. Naomi had two sons, who married Ruth and Orpah. The son's marriages produced no children. After Naomi's husband and two sons died, she wishes to return to the land of Israel



without her daughters in law. She urges them to return to their own families.

In the ancient world an elderly widow without male children is powerless. Ruth's desire to share Naomi's fate shows her character; she will not desert her elderly mother in law. When they return to Israel, it is Ruth who works to keep them both fed.

In the Torah, farmers are required to leave part of their harvest for the poor. In particular, if the workers drop any stalks of grain as they are harvesting, they are not allowed to pick them up. They are left on the ground for the poor to glean. Gleaning was hard work, and the gleaners were not always treated with respect. Ruth finds herself in the field of a man named Boaz, who we later find, is a relative of Naomi.

Boaz returns favor for favor. What Ruth did for Naomi, Boaz does for Ruth. Shavuot is the holiday that celebrates the revelation at Sinai. Ruth embodies the faith and spirit of the Torah we received. Faith and action are the model we follow.

Boaz and Ruth will marry and have a son who is the grandfather of King David. The text suggest that if Ruth had not followed Naomi back to Israel, had she not shown Naomi kindness and loyalty, she would never have met Boaz. Had Boaz and Ruth never met, King David would never have been born. Kindness brought them together.

Was it just coincidence that Ruth went to glean in the field of Boaz, or was it the hand of God? The older I get, the less I believe in coincidence. I believe our lives are composed of threads of "coincidence" where we intersect with other lives and circumstances. Each life we touch, each circumstance we encounter gives us the chance to bring about some form of TiKun Olam. This weaving is a constant in our lives...if we allow ourselves to be sensitive to it. Ruth and Boaz met because of the Mitzvot they performed - and their union produced King David.

### MUSICAL NOTES

**B** ach spring I look forward to attending the Cantors Assembly Convention – a gathering of about 300 cantors (mostly Conservative, but also Reform and Orthodox) from the United States and Canada, Israel, South America and Europe. This year's convention will place in New Jersey and New York City from May 19 to May 23. At this year's convention, a female cantor, Nancy Abramson, will become the first woman president in the history of the Cantors Assembly and all the



female cantors in the organization are being honored. This spring marks the 22nd anniversary of my graduation from the cantorial school at JTS and the 22nd anniversary of women being accepted as members of the Cantors Assembly.

People still ask me about my motivation to become a cantor and about the challenges of being one of the first female cantors. The short -answer version about how I came to pursue a career in the cantorate is that I have always loved to sing, and was involved Jewishly while growing up. In a nutshell, my Jewish identity was shaped by my involvement in the synagogue where I grew up (a traditional, non-egalitarian congregation in Brooklyn), by the Jewish home created by my parents, and by my experiences as a camper and staff member at Camp Ramah/Berkshires over 15 summers. These early life experiences directed me on a journey to deepen my Jewish identity and to find a meaningful way to use my voice.

I don't want to dwell on what the issues of being a "pioneer" as a woman in the cantorate, because the joys and the rewards have far outweighed the obstacles. The greatest challenge I believe I face going forward is to continue to be the kind of cantor I want to be who can inspire others to heightened spirituality and be a positive role model. May we all be blessed with strength and good health to fulfill our individual and collective dreams.

One of the topics that we end up discussing at every cantors convention is how to maintain a balance between the old and new melodies of prayer and the popular versus the not so familiar, so that the service remains comfortable yet inspiring to the worshippers. A trained hazzan has access to the powerful tool of music, specifically *Nusach* (the "traditional" way in which the liturgy is chanted according to the proper prayer modes) to help achieve the goal of inspiring the prayers of others. But how the Hazzan uses this tool is what will have the greatest influence. The music for Jewish prayer has changed and will continue to change. What some think of as a "traditional" melody is more likely that which is the most popular but may not necessarily be a very old melody.

We have enjoyed great success with a "new tradition" at CBI of having several Kabbalat Shabbat services in the spring and summer that use musical accompaniment – provided by our own CBI volunteer band. This year, we look forward once again to holding three instrumentally enhanced Kabbalat Shabbat services, the first of which is on **May 31 at 7:00 PM. Please note**

### HEDWIG GRUENEWALD EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER



It's difficult to communicate the value that I place on regional conventions like these to help me unwind and decompress after months of academic pressure. It feels like stepping off an airplane after a long flight. Every year, Millburn sends many of our members to the convention, and every year I wish we could have sent more. So, next year, or the year after, if you find yourself with a shortage of leg room, I highly recommend coming to "Spring," deplaning, and stretching out those legs.





don't have strong memories from childhood about Shavuot, and I suspect that I am not the only one who feels that way. In Shavuot there is no seder or sukkah or shofar or dreidels. There is no grand family reunion for a lavish meal. It



almost feels like an afterthought: seven weeks of counting the Omer after Pesach, and then Shavuot. This is paradoxical because Shavuot commemorates the day that God gave the Torah to the entire nation of Israel assembled at Mount Sinai, arguably the most important day in the history of the Jewish people. One possible explanation is that the magnitude of the giving of the torah event is such that no single day is enough to remember it. As it is written that Moses said to the people: "Only take heed to thyself, and keep thy soul diligently, lest thou forget the things which thine eyes saw, and lest they depart from thy heart all the days of thy life; but make them known unto thy children and thy children's children." (Deuteronomy 4:9) Consequently, we bless and thank God for choosing the Jewish people to receive the Torah every day of our lives.

In recent years, I have become increasingly fond of Shavuot. I enjoy the Tikkun Leil study sessions with fellow Men's Club members and congregants at CBI. According to legend, the people of Israel overslept while God was waiting on the mountain top, and Moses had to wake them up to receive the Law. To make up for this *faux paus*, it is customary to pull an all-nighter – or at least a late night study session on any topic related to the Torah. The topics are always varied and stimulating, and there is a great atmosphere of camaraderie. And as the Torah nourishes the spirit like milk and honey, another Shavuot tradition that I greatly enjoy is to eat cheese, fruit, honey and wheat (because of the Omer) transformed into my favorite Jewish dish: Blintzes! I look forward to sharing these Shavuot customs with you.



### SALUTING OUR SUPER SENIORS: TIRZA FREEMAN

f the CBI family has crown jewels, Tirza Freeman, a member for over 50 certainly vears is among them.

Naomi, moved to Millburn in 1960.

Tirza was born in Eschwege, Germany, the third of four children. Ernest and Leah have passed on, and brother Joe Rosenberg (who with his wife, Aleza recently joined CBI) lives in Maplewood. Her father was a substantial businessman, operating many wholesale grocery stores in the area.

As Hitler's footprint expanded in the 1930's, culminating in the horror of Kristallnacht, it became apparent to Tirza's family that they could no longer remain in Germany. They were, fortunately, able to leave in February 1939. Unfortunately, Tirza contracted diptheria, and had to remain at Ellis Island, at Marine Hospital, while her family settled in Washington Heights, Manhattan, then home to many German Jewish families. Tirza, just 11 years old, remained alone in the hospital from February until August, when she was finally released and joined her family.

They subsequently moved to the Bronx, where Tirza graduated from James Monroe High School. While attending City College as an accounting major, she met Henry, whom she would later marry. With a master's degree in organic chemistry and employed by Exxon, Henry was planning to attend law school, intent on becoming a foreign patent attorney. With Exxon being a global company and with Henry speaking multiple languages, this seemed like a natural fit. Henry convinced Tirza that it wouldn't do for both of them to be students, so Tirza left City College, married Henry, and began raising her family. Her daughters, Eva and Naomi, live in Laudonville, NY, and Bethesda, Md, respectively. Eva is a professor of nursing, and Naomi is employed by the government in the field of international trade. Tirza is also a proud grandmother of four granddaughters. After raising her daughters, Tirza still had some unfinished business. She went back to College, got her accounting degree, and, at the age of 50, graduated magna cum laude from Rutgers. She spent the next 20 years, until her retirement, as a controller.

Tirza's impact on CBI is significant. She has, through the years, tutored many of our bar/bat mitzvah students. She attends morning minyan services regularly, and she is knowledgeable enough to lead portions of our Shabbat service. Her husband Henry, though seriously ill, had his second bar mitzvah at CBI in 2005, at age 83, helped in no small measure by the guidance and encouragement of family friend and congregant Kopel Burk. As youngsters, Kopel and Henry both had the same bar mitzvah parsha. Henry would succumb, soon after, to the cancer he so courageously fought. Indeed, many in Henry's family felt that his steadfast desire and singular focus to re-celebrate his bar mitzvah, gave him the strength to survive, against all odds, to beyond that special day.

Tirza, on most Shabbats, can be seen walking to services from her home, a mere 1.5 miles. Not bad for a mid-octogenarian. Her spirit, energy, wit and passion for observance are truly inspirational.

Tirza, you honor us with your presence. You make CBI a better place.

### JERUSALEM MARATHON By Leslie Gersho

ran in the Jerusalem Marathon this past March, celebrating my fiftieth birthday by combining two of my passions: Israel and running.

Here's how it happened. In February 2011, my family went on the CBI trip to Israel with Rabbi Bayar, Janice Colmar, and a terrific group of congregants. We spent several days in Jerusalem, which included Kabbalat Shabbat services overlooking the Kotel. While I was walking uphill back to our hotel through the beautiful streets of Yemin Moshe. I thought to myself, "Jerusalem would be an amazing place to run a marathon. It's my holy city, the capital of Israel, 3,000 years old; it has a challenging terrain, and a cool climate."

Because I had run five marathons, including Boston and New York, I knew what made a good marathon. If you're going to run 26.2 miles, you want it to be meaningful, or you might as well stay local and run some 5Ks. For me, location is key, and there's no more special place than Jerusalem. I could run in the ancient footsteps of King David. How cool would that be? Since my everyday life is full of extreme "non-coolness," it would be a thrill to combine my love of running with my love of Israel. Oh yes the hills. They were everywhere, and I had to walk up a couple near the end, but it was totally worth it. Next time, you take a bus or car up Mount Scopus, be glad you're not running up.

At the finish line, I met Marvin and David and traded race stories and took more photos. I couldn't have asked for a better way to celebrate my special birthday. To all my CBI friends, a big "thank you" for all your encouragement, good wishes, and support of my journey. And, for all you competitive readers, I finished in 4 hours and 19 minutes, good enough for seventh place in my age group.



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
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


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
