# FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

This calendar year Hanukkah arrives in mid-December. Personally, I have always preferred Chanukah observed well-away from Christmas; it removes (at least partly) the inherent competition between the two observances.

As a holiday, Channukah is a fascinating study in the evolution of ritual, observance and meaning. Scratching the surface of its history we find questions that probe the very nature of our tradition. For instance:



# What is the miracle of Chanukah?

In brief, the books of Maccabees state that Judah cleansed the Temple in Jerusalem, set sacrifices and reestablished the independent state. However no mention is made of lighting the Menorah or of any problem with the existing oil. There certainly is no mention of having only one cruse of oil that lasted for eight days.

In the books of Maccabbees we find various reasons given for the holiday lasting eight days: Chanukah was modeled after the festival of Sukkot, which is an eight day festival or when Jehuda cleansed the Temple they took eight spears, filled them with oil and lit the "ad hoc" Menorah.

No miracle concerning oil is mentioned in our tradition until the story is recounted in the Talmud (600 CE). Yet the Talmud glosses over the Maccabean battles, hardly mentioning them at all. How can the Talmud assert a miracle that no extant literature contains?

What exactly is the miracle of Chanukah? The answer depends upon how loyal one remains to the tradition.

# Why is Chanukah not mentioned in the Mishnah?

The Mishnah, a commentary on the legal portions of the Torah, was edited by Rabbi Yehuda Hanasi, leader of the Jewish community in Israel around 200 CE. He began to record the "Oral Law" (Mishnah) in response to repressive Roman policies which caused the death of many Rabbis and teachers of the law.

The title "Nasi" was given to the leader of the Jewish community. This was an inherited position; passed down from generation to generation. Each Nasi was considered to be a direct descendant of King David, who was of the tribe of Yehuda (Judah). Had Israel been an independent state, the Nasi would have been king.

Matityahu and Yehuda Maccabee were "Kohanim" (priests) from Jacob's son Levi. When their rebellion succeeded they declared themselves to be "Priest Kings" of Israel. They assumed both religious and administrative leadership of the now independent Jewish state. They began the Hasmonean dynasty which lasted until Rome took control of the Middle East about one century later.

Although qualified to become High Priests, the Hasmoneans violated the tradition when they declared themselves kings; a position that could

# MUSICAL NOTES

In January, 2000, The Jerusalem Report published the results of a readers poll of the 100 greatest Jews of the Millenium. I'm sure much can be said about every one of these "giants of Judaism", but the one person I would like to make special note of at this time is the person who ranked number 88 on that list, Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach. November 1st is the 18th anniversary of the death of this most influential songwriter, singer, storyteller and teacher. Defined as a "Chassidic Minstrel," Carlebach used his music to reach out to and inspire Jews around the world. He



was an extremely prolific composer who also recorded his songs on more than 25 albums. Rabbi Carlebach put words of Jewish prayer to music and composed niggunim (melodies without words) which still can be heard at virtually every Jewish wedding from Chassidic to Reform. Some of his best known song are Am Yisrael Chai, Od Yishama, V'ha'eir Einenu and Esa Einai.

Shlomo Carlebach was born in 1925 in Berlin, where his father, Naftali, was an Orthodox leader. The family, which fled the Nazis in 1933, lived in Switzerland before coming to New York in 1939. His father became the rabbi of a small synagogue on West 79th Street, Congregation Kehlilath Jacob; Shlomo Carlebach and his twin brother, Eli Chaim, took over the synagogue after their father's death in 1967. Shlomo remained the Rabbi of this shul, better known as "The Carlebach Shul," until his death in 1994.

In the 1950's, while studying with and working for the Grand Rabbi of Lubavitch, Rabbi Menachem Mendel Schneerson, Carlebach picked up a guitar and began writing songs and visiting coffeehouses and clubs in Greenwich Village, where he met Bob Dylan, Pete Seeger and other folk singers. They encouraged his singing career and helped him get a spot at the Berkeley Folk Festival in California in 1966. After his appearance, he decided to remain in California to reach out to what he called "lost Jewish souls," runaways and drug addicted youths. He founded a commune-like synagogue called The House of Love and Prayer. Eleven years later, he closed the House of Love and Prayer and took the remnants of the congregation to Israel, where he established the small settlement of Moshav Or Modiin, in Lod, near Ben Gurion Airport.

Although Rabbi Carlebach was Orthodox, he operated outside of the traditional Orthodox "norm" in both his style and substance. He spoke of God and God's love for all people in a way that could make other rabbis uncomfortable. To paraphrase Carlebach himself, he had a homeopathic rather than a conventional view of Judaism and the purpose of religion. According to Carlebach, religion, like homeopathic medicine, has to work from inside to outside, unlike conventional medicine, which treats from the

In 2010, his book, The Prime Ministers: An Intimate Narrative of Israeli Leadership was published.

I have read the book, and found the breadth of Ambassador Avner's knowledge interesting and exciting. And the stories he told described events critical to Israel's history, many not unlike events in our own time. I encourage everyone in our community to attend this event to hear this distinguished speaker.

And the importance of the relationship is the same no matter which party is running the Israeli government.

While Ambassador Avner will provide a wonderful lecture which will teach and excite us about Israel's history, the Policy Conference offers two days of sessions – including panel discussions, speeches by leaders of both countries, in depth lectures on dozens of topics (you choose your session) as well as an opportunity to meet supporters of Israel from throughout the United States, and the world. And on the third day of the conference, you have the opportunity to meet with our own members of Congress, and relate to them how important the United States – Israel relationship is to you.

# **OUR MITZVAH PROJECT BEGAN IN ISRAEL**

or our Mitzvah project, we will be supporting the ◀ Israel Tennis Centers, ITC. We first learned about ITC when we were in Israel, just before we started the last CBI tour. We had some time and decided to check out the tennis in Haifa. This ITC looked the same as the tennis courts you find here.

When we came home, we were invited a few months later to a fundraiser for ITC with our parents. The fundraiser was a success and we met the kids from Israel who were in the United States as ITC "ambassadors". The group included kids from places we had visited during our CBI trip, and kids from different backgrounds, some Jewish and some not. It didn't matter that we didn't all speak the same language because we could all play tennis. We had fun, and became friends.

ITC is a foundation that does far more than train kids to play tennis. This program brings together the children of Israel with the opportunity for a safe and fun activity. ITC has 14 different locations, mostly in disadvantaged neighborhoods or outlying development towns throughout Israel from Kiryat Shmona on the Lebanese border in the North to Beer Sheva bordering the Negev Desert in the South. Our last CBI trip also included a trip to the Negev.

ITC has many different programs. One of them is the Co-Existence program, where Jews, Arabs, Christians, Druze, and Bedouins play tennis together. The goal of ITC in this program is to have these kids grow up together, so they can build friendships that will continue to grow and to try to eliminate hatred. When we visit Israel it is clear everyone there wants peace so it makes sense to use tennis to get people together. Another program is for kids with special

needs, which our friend runs in Jaffa. This is a large and successful ITC program for these children to have fun and become winners by participating and trying. There is also a program for immigrant children like our friend Oshri, who is in the Ashkelon Special Populations program. Oshri had never been in a swimming pool until the weekend he spent in New Jersey. ITC's most famous program is their High Performance Program, where they train and house kids to become college players, professional players, and coaches. They have produced such players such as Andy Ram, Shahar Peer, Yoni Erlich, Anna Smashnova, Amos Mansdorf, and Schlomo Glickstein.


A special success story is ITC graduate Nadine Fahoum, an Israeli Arab who became the number one singles player of the Duke University Women's Tennis Team before graduating last year. She entered ITC as a young girl with a mother who opened up the door for many other Arab mothers to bring their children to the tennis centers. We met Nadine last summer as she was preparing to move to New Jersey to work fulltime for ITC. Besides being a wonderful player and person, she is the first Arab to represent Israel in the Junior Olympic Games. She is now the first Israeli Arab to have a leadership position in an Israeli charitable foundation. She truly is a success story of how we can all co-exist.

We are using our B'nai Mitzvah to bring attention to ITC, raise funds and collect tennis equipment for ITC. We will also be helping our friend Rakefet Benyamini coach kids in Jaffa when we visit Israel with the next CBI trip. We will continue to support ITC is any way we can, including another year of hosting ITC ambassadors at our home.

# CBI NET STARS SERVE ACES By Art Fredman

While the sound of the Shofar still ringing in their ears, like Joshua in Jericho, the B'nai Israel tennis players attacked on the clay courts of Berkeley Tennis Club, in Orange, for the prized Men's Club Mishugana Cup. From a sports perspective, these descendents of the athletic giants and mighty hunters of our distant past, carry on the tradition of Nimrod and Esau, Jacob, Saul, David, and the mighty Samson. On September 30, on an historic clay surface, we witnessed the athletic feats of our own David(s), Hernan, Grant, Steven(s), Mark, Lisa, Mitchell, and Daniel.

Nine Men's Club members (and one wife), showcased their athletic abilities at the First Annual Mishugana Cup. Three hours of keen competition on a glorious Fall Sunday resulted in the winner, Mitchell Radin, doing a victory jog down the deuce doubles alley of Court 6, at Berkeley Tennis Club, in nearby Orange.

According to event director, Art Fredman, "CBI members displayed skill, competitive drive, and passion for the sport." CBI President Linda Sotnick provided a cameo of her fast-paced forehand before helping out with photography and score keeping. President Linda Sotnick, along with leaders of Berkeley Tennis Club, champion player and President Dr. Mike Winds, and Berkeley Pro, Jean Bernard Kitio-Kitio, added a touch of class to the event. # **MEN'S CLUB** By Hernan Wurgaft, Men's Club President

s we progress with the reading of the weekly Torah portions, and we read the parashot about Abraham Avinu, I think of him as the first Hebrew Mensch and as a role model for us at Men's Club.



Abraham's hospitality and social advocacy are two features of his character that seem particularly relevant. We learn about Abraham's hospitality in Bereishit 18-2 when he displays great excitement and anticipation by running to meet three strangers who arrive at his tent on a hot day. With comparable excitement and anticipation we meet and greet new members and old members that get more involved as the year's activities accelerate to full swing (see upcoming events). Abraham's social advocacy is observed in his negotiation with G-d to reduce, from fifty to ten, the number of just people that was necessary to save the city of Sodom (Bereishit 18-27). Nowadays we avail of the democratic process as an important way to negotiate our views to improve society. Throughout most of history, nations imposed legal disabilities or promulgated limited rights to their Jewish populations. In this respect, the United States of America was exceptional from almost its beginning. The adoption of the First Amendment, in 1791, guaranteed equal rights without discrimination due to religion. Ever since, American Jews have participated in politics, got elected to public office, and contributed to the improvement of society. By voting in this and every presidential election, and by getting out the vote, we strengthen and celebrate these achievements.

# SALUTING OUR SUPER SENIORS: MANNY MAGID

anny and Phyllis Magid joined CBI in 1957. We were not, however, their first congregation. As then residents of Springfield, they were among the founding families of Beth Ahm, their local conservative synagogue experiencing a growth in Jewish families. This demographic pattern would evolve in many suburban communities.

Congregants of longer standing will remember Phyllis who passed away in 2002. They were married 53 years. Manny spent his career as a math teacher, first in Brooklyn, then New Jersey. He retired as Chairman of the Mathematics Department at Newark East Side High School.

Sons, Martin and David, reside in Newton and Worcester, Mass., respectively, with their spouses, Beth and Debra, and son Joseph lives in Wynnewood, Pa., with wife Liz. Four grandsons and two granddaughters complete his immediate family.

Manny and Phyllis both served as board members in our congregation. Manny was on the finance committee for many years, and also served on the CBI Board as Treasurer. Both Manny and Phyllis served on the Adult Forum Steering Committee of our congregation, since its inception in the early '90s. They established the Phyllis Magid endowment fund in recognition of his wife's long time service and commitment to the synagogue.

Their communal activities have been extensive. Phyllis, in 1967, became the first director of the West Orange YMHA nursery school, remaining in that position for 27 years, until 1993. She then assumed the role of Director at the Whippany JCC. Manny, in retirement, has kept busy. He was Budget Director of The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, originally established in 1914. He managed a 36 million dollar budget which supported, among others, HIAS immigration, ORT international, and Lubavitch Schools in France and Morocco.

Manny is currently Vice President of Newark C.A.S.A. – (R) Council of Administrators and Supervisors. This is a 150 member organization of retired school academicians.

Manny, Crown Heights, and Phyllis, Flatbush, were raised in Brooklyn. Maplewood residents since 1964, Manny is most proud of his sons, Martin, a Math Professor (second generation) at Wellesley College; David, a Computer Consultant of broad standing; and Joseph, a Health Care Consultant and political activist.

Manny can be found most Shabbat mornings, in his customary seat, far left isle, in the sanctuary. And he is always

# **Millburn USY**

Ezra Engel is the President of Millburn USY for 2012-13. Ezra is a senior at Millburn High School and has been active in USY since his freshman year. Ezra spent much of the past summer in Israel. He conducted research on desalination technologies at Technion, Israel Institute of Technology, located in Haifa. During his two month stay, he traveled around Israel and met up with the USY pilgrimage trip. This month's USY Column features Ezra's speech about the importance of youth groups, given during Kol Nidre service.

In the Central Bus Terminal in Jerusalem, you'll find an interesting piece of art. Adorning the entrance walls are large wrought iron sculptures of Jewish hats. Shtreimels, spodiks, shtofeners, kolpiks, kashkets, samets, fedoras, kutchmas, yamakahs and kippahs. I'm not joking. Those are all real.

And that list still doesn't even come close to capturing the diversity of the Jewish movement.

Depending on whether a man's hat is pinched or rounded, one can tell if he's from Stolin or Slonim. The shape of the brim can tell whether he comes from Hungary or Poland.

When I think about this incredible diversity in our culture, I can't help but think of America as well. We live in a country of immigrants, and we are stronger for it. Thousands of different perspectives and traditions synergize to create a more comprehensive and complete world-view.

However, living in America has its drawbacks. We do not share in the cultural diversity of Israel. American Jewry, especially the Conservative movement, is more subdued. We don't have a thousand different hats. Most of us don't even wear a kippah outside of shul.

While we may try to perpetuate the ideal of the salad bowl, America is, and forever will be, a melting pot. We have a talent for assimilation. Cultures and faiths are not lost, but they are certainly muted. It's difficult to hear our ancestral tradition when it's voice is drowned out by loud dance music. This is true for all cultures, including Judaism.

Our movement may not share in the variety or zeal of Hasidism, and we seem to have an increasing tolerance of religious torpor.

This all begs the question, where will be in 50 years? or 100? I surely don't know, but if you believe some of the more pessimistic Israelis, we'll be gone. Disappeared. Assimilated completely. That's a very sad prospect, but...I don't think that'll be the case.

I don't think that because when I look out over this congregation, I have trouble believing that we'll disappear. Tonight, over 600 people sit in this synagogue that we built. And we're all here not from threat of excommunication or familial shame but because we want to be here. That passion is the reason that I think we'll survive.

To safeguard our future, we must instill this passion in children. As President of Millburn USY, the best way that I know how to do that is to get them involved. Those who invest in their community sustain it, not only with their time and effort, but with their presence as well. Youth Groups have become an integral part of Congregation B'nai Israel: Chaverim, Kadima and USY. These groups will help to protect the future of the Jewish faith.

As a national movement, USY aspires to connect young Jews with their peers around the country. We are a uniquely nationalized movement. And here at Millburn USY we become part of a much larger community than our own.

Our Chaverim and Kadima programs are great ways for younger kids to get involved in the community and socialize with their friends in a Jewish setting. Chaverim and Kadima help us get involved early, and provide a great extracurricular for kids in elementary and middle school.

This year, USY and Kadima opened with chocolate making events; Chaverim opened with GaGa and Games. I want to assure everyone that this is not Hebrew school. We have far too much stress in our lives for that. The main purpose here is to relax and have fun and enjoy good food, but along the way, we might rekindle a religious fire.

I want my generation to be able to pass on our ancestral culture to our children. We may not have 1000 hats, but we still have something very special and it's worth passing on.



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


