# FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

Shavuot suffers from bad timing; it occurs fifty days after the beginning of Passover, a time when religious schools are closed for the year. The Megillah of Ruth is read on Shavuot because it details the story of Ruth who is considered the model convert to Judaism. Naomi had two sons who married Ruth and Orpa. The son's marriages bore no children. After Naomi's husband and two sons died she



wishes to return to the land of Israel without her daughters in law. She urges them to return to their own families. Orpa leaves. Ruth stays.

In the ancient world an elderly widow without male children is powerless. Ruth's desire to share Naomi's fate shows her character; she will not desert her elderly mother in law. When they return to Israel it is Ruth who works to keep them both fed. She does this by gleaning. In the Torah farmers were required to leave part of their harvest for the poor. In particular, if the workers drop any stalks of grain as they are harvesting, they are not allowed to pick them up. They are left on the ground for the poor to glean. It was hard work and the gleaners were not always treated with respect. Ruth finds herself in the field of a man named Boaz, who we later find is a relative of Naomi.

Boaz returns favor for favor. What Ruth did for Naomi, Boaz does for Ruth. Shavuot is the holiday that celebrates the revelation at Sinai. Ruth embodies the faith and spirit of the Torah we received. Faith and action are the models we follow.

Boaz and Ruth will marry and give birth to a son who is the grandfather of King David. The text suggests that if Ruth had not followed Naomi back to Israel, had she not shown Naomi kindness and loyalty she would never have met Boaz.

The story of Ruth brings up another question; was it just coincidence that Ruth went to glean in the field of Boaz or was it the hand of God? The older I get the less I believe in coincidence. I believe our lives are composed of threads of "coincidence" where we intersect with other lives circumstances. Each life we touch, each circumstance we encounter gives us the chance to bring about healing in the world. This weaving is a constant in our lives - if we allow ourselves to be sensitive to it.

### President's Message By Jonathan Engel, CBI President

### The Omer

ith Lag B'Omer approaching, our thoughts turn to this odd period of the year in which we variously adopt semi-mourning rituals, celebrate spring, recall the Holocaust, take up bows and arrows, and celebrate the rebirth of Israel. If you find yourself confused, be comforted; most people do.

The Omer is that seven-week period after Pesach that takes its name from the commandment to count bundles of barley (an omer was a measure of grain in ancient Israel) until Shavuot is upon us. The counting seems critical, as the Torah takes pains not to articulate the actual date on which Shavuot falls (the 6th of Sivan) but describes it only as the 50th day of our counting which began on Pesach. This odd little task, mildly annoying but hardly onerous, has been made easier with the presence of digital age omer counters and i-Phone Omer apps. Along the way we trip over two modern Israel holidays, Yom HaZicharon and Yom Ha-atzmauth, which are wholly out-of-character with the semi-mystical quality of the Omer period, and one deeply somber modern holiday, Yom HaShoah, which raises its own problems regarding Jewish rituals of memory and mourning.

At its base, the counting seems designed to force us to recognize the connections between Pesach and Shavuot, both agriculturally (planting leads to harvesting) but also spiritually (liberation paves the way for redemption). The message is a bit heavyhanded for our usually nuanced canon, and would seem to teach us that just as we can only reap grain from fields that have been properly prepared and sown, so too could we only receive Torah once we had freed ourselves form physical and spiritual slavery. Seems a bit trite.

Fortunately, we need not stop at Torah. Early rabbinic-era sages wrestled with the meaning of the Omer, and began to view it as a semi-mystical period of spiritual transformation, encouraging

to refrain from Jews overt celebration and practice modest forms of self-abnegation. Many modern eschew lews celebrations during this time, including weddings, overly festive b'nai mitzvoth, dancing, and live concerts. At the same time, parallel rituals have grown up around hair during this period,



most likely emanating from the ancient Nazarites (of the Samson story) who were somewhat obsessed with the power of the plait. Many Jews will not cut their hair during the Omer, while among certain Hasidic sects a boy's first haircut is reserved for the Lag B'Omer following his 3rd birthday. Go figure.

Insofar as we embrace Omer rituals at all, today, we owe thanks to the 2nd century mishnaic rabbi Shimon bar Yochai (the "Rashbi"), student of Akiva ben Joseph, and the primary author of the Zohar. Rav Shimon was one of the few of Akiva's acolytes to survive a terrible plague that killed 24,000 Talmud students, and he celebrated the end of the plague, the 33rd day of the Omer, with bonfires, picnics, and (what else) Torah learning. Oddly, he later died on Lag B'Omer, making our annual spring gambol an odd sort of vahrtzeit ritual, as well as a celebratory anniversary of the end of the plague. Rav Shimon crafted a somewhat mystical approach to the Omer, assigning each of the seven weeks one of seven Kabalistic values -- Chesed (compassion), Gevurah (strength), Tiferet (beauty), Netzach (persistence), Hod (splendor), Yesod (foundation), and Machut (nurturance). People drawn to the mystical explore these values while counting the Omer, ordering their lives, preparing for revelation, and tying strings around their wrists. Spiritual elevation is elusive, and people discover different paths to redemption.

What of those three modern holidays? The



# **BLANCHE BAYAR RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS**

ay is the month in which we assess the year which has gone by. As the school year rolls to an end, we take this opportunity to review and reiterate the learning of the past year. And if you would think that I am referring to a series of final exams - perish the thought. The end of the school year is about Maccabiah – our academic color war and other such activities that allow us a "soft" assessment and evaluation of the past year.



A moment to reflect on Primary Camp. Last September we initiated a new model for our Kindergarten through 2nd grade students. As the year draws to a close we can say that this model was successful – students have enjoyed being welcomed at the door by their counselors and becoming friends with them. These counselors – all students in our Tichon program – have grown in the year, as demonstrated by our April 29 Yom Ha'atzmaut program. The students rotated through different activities taught by their counselors. They were escorted by ... their teachers. This reversal is an example of the beauty of Primary Camp – where counselors can become teachers, and teachers can learn from counselors. Next year the model continues as we expand the school day for these young students to noon and the counselors receive additional responsibilities.

Maccabiah – Each year the students in 3rd through 5th grade participate in an academic color war that takes place during the Tuesdays in May. I am most pleased that this year's program was created by Jacob Ehrlich, an eighth grade madrikh (teacher aide) who attends Tichon. Jacob came to us with the theme of the Tribes and developed a program of fun study that will have students learning about the Tribes, their banners as described in the Torah, their placement in Israel, a modern city that is located in the same area, etc. Not to mention the use of Hebrew for extra points.

Graduation: The major culmination in May is the Graduation of the 7th grade. On May 10, students who have been together for 5 - 8 years will gather in the sanctuary and mark their transition from BBRS to Tichon. A program designed by the students, we will hear about their favorite memories and their thoughts going forward. Many attended a Taste of Tichon in April and are all ready planning to continue their Jewish education at CBI or another educational program. In next month's Bulletin I will present the highlights of this ceremony.

### COUNTING OF THE OMER: A MEN'S CLUB PARALLEL

Each year on the 49 days between Pesach and Shavuot we have the opportunity to perform the mitzvah of counting the Omer. wandering in the desert until we arrive at Sinai ready individually and collectively to receive the Torah from God. Reflecting on this idea, it occurred to me that the flow of our Men's Club events this spring follows a similar progression. Just days before Pesach we held our annual Juan Katz/Joe Keselman Memorial Paid-up Breakfast. This event honors two men who played a major role in establishing a Men's Club presence at CBI. In essence they gave us our start with an opportunity to grow as an organization and to realize our potential, much as the Children of Israel left Egypt with the opportunity and the potential to build their future as a people. calendar marches on, and history sometimes falls inconveniently. Yom Ha-atzmauth, the 5th of Iyar, was simply the day in 1948 (May 14th) when Israel declared independence shortly before the British departed. Yom Ha-Zikaron, military remembrance day (akin to the U.S. Memorial Day) initially coincided with Independence Day, but was moved to the day before in 1951 in an effort to better focus on the message of military valor. The conservative movement honors Yom Ha-atzmauth by adding *al-hanisim* to the Amidah that day, while the Israeli government has tried to reconcile the jarring juxtaposition of military celebration and Kabalistic drive by elevating Lag B'Omer to a sort of youth scouting holiday (taking the lead from those bar-Kochbah-era bows and arrows). For much of Hiloni (secular) Israel, the Omer gets the worse of the compromise.

Yom Ha-Shoah (Holocaust remembrance day) is problematic in its own way. Although virtually all Jews today feel compelled to remember the victims of the Nazi Shoah, the current date chosen (the 27th of Nisan) is more Zionist than hallachic. The date came about as a commemoration of the Warsaw Ghetto uprising, which began on Erev Pesach in 1943. In deference to Pesach, the Israeli government moved the date back two weeks and mandated certain national mourning rituals, meaning that the current date, besides being essentially arbitrary, commemorates an episode of partisan military resistance which was largely inconsistent with the broader tragedy of the Shoah, and seems designed, instead, to portray the Holocaust as a sort of modern day Hasmonean revolt. The Orthodox have long rejected Yom HaShoah in favor of Tisha b'Av as an appropriate time in which to mourn our Holocaust dead, but even the Conservative movement has wrestled with the idea. Chancellor Ismar Schorsch of the Jewish Theological Seminary, notably advocated for Tisha b'Av as the more appropriate day of mourning.

There are so many competing ideas and ideals circulating about the Omer that a modern-day Conservative Jew can truly make of it what he or she wishes. Try actually adhering to the counting; it may bring out your inner Zen, and it certainly adds a bit of drama to the arrival of Shavuot. Pick and choose from bows and arrows, haircuts, yellow candles, Israeli flags, *Tiferet/Gevurah*, and asceticism, knowing that any ritual that reminds us of the coming of Sinai can only deepen our passion for Torah. It is a confusing time of year, but then being Jewish is not for the faint of heart!

# SALUTING OUR SUPER SENIORS: IRVING AND SHIRLEY ALPER

B 'nai Israel first opened its doors in 1925, corner Essex Street and Lackawanna Place. Annual family dues were five dollars.

Irving Alper arrived in Millburn, from Hoboken, as an 8 year old, with mother Sonia, Father Max, brother Carl, and sister Ruth. His family immediately joined B'nai Israel, a 25 family congregation. Irv has been a member of the congregation for 82 years, our longest continuous member.

There were only three grammar schools -Washington School, Hobart Avenue School (both closed), and Wyoming School. Millburn High School included grades 7 and 8, on the site of the current Middle School, Old Short Hills Road. When Irv graduated High School in 1940, he was the only Jewish student in his class.

Shirley Alper (nee Goldberg) was raised in Cranford. They are the parents of Michael, Laura and Eugene, and grandparents of Ben, Jeffrey, Devon, Michael and Eden.

Irv had a dental practice in Millburn for 50 years, and his successor, Dr. Scott Krosser, operates that today, as Millburn Dental Arts. Shirley and Irv recently celebrated their 61st wedding anniversary. Shirley's background is in Education. She attended the University of Wisconsin/ Madison, and graduated from Kean College. Shirley taught English at Linden High School, and was a Registrar at Union County Vocational-Technical Institute in Scotch Plains. She also created a counseling program there.

The Max Alper Prayer Book Fund at our Synagogue was established in memory of Irv's father, also our First Torah Reader and Shofar blower.

Shirley and Irv have traveled extensively. Irv

looks back fondly on his service as a Volunteer Dentist on two trips to Israel, at two Kibbutzim, one in Jerusalem and one in the Negev. These were monthly commitments, which he undertook while still practicing dentistry.

Irv's 1940 High School yearbook bears this message from his father, "The wisdom you have acquired, the knowledge you possess, may they, like a beacon, lead you to success." Irv has assuredly followed the wishes of his father. We salute Shirley and Irv Alper, for over 60 years of marriage, for their energy, spirituality and devotion to our congregation.

At a recent 90th birthday celebration, Irv acknowledged Shirley for being his lifetime partner, true inspiration and constant presence. In truth, it is we who are honored by their presence as congregants.



Next, the plenary sessions were designed so beautifully between individual speeches, panels, video stories and interviews. The visuals were fantastic and it seemed like there was no bad seat. And to sit in a session with thousands and thousands of Israel supporters was in itself uplifting.

What was your favorite Break-Out Session? [Break out sessions are smaller meetings which delegates select from dozens of choices]

break-out sessions Μv were extremely informative. I especially enjoyed one in which I could learn about the missile defense systems that are being put in place and developed with the help of money coming from defense budgeting from the USA. We learned about the systems and what they are doing and will do, about the importance of the budget for them, and about the work Congressman Steven Rothman does on the appropriations committee about this. The information was thorough and presented extremely well.

Jill had some advice for next year's delegates: I would advise people to go early to plenaries so as to avoid more time on line in favor of a more relaxed waiting in the space. I would advise them (as I appreciate that I was advised) to


