

#### FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

he story is told of Albert Einstein that he was going on a train to an out of town engagement. The conductor stopped by to punch his ticket. The great scientist, preoccupied, with great embarrassment rummaged through his coat pockets and briefcase to no avail. The conductor said, 'we all know who you are Dr. Einstein. I'm sure you bought a ticket. Don't worry about it everything is ok."



The conductor walked on down the aisle punching other tickets. He looked back and saw Dr. Einstein

down on his hands and knees looking under his seat trying to find his ticket. He came back and gently said, Dr. Einstein, please don't worry about it. I know who you are. Einstein looked up and said, "I too know who I am, what I don't know is where I'm going."

In this season, knowing where you are going is necessary to understand what you have done and where these actions are leading you. It's not an easy process even though it might sound that way. For we each have two identities: Who we think we are – and who we really are. This is perhaps best understood by the difference of what we do and why we do it.

It is indeed odd to speak of motivation, of "why" we do things as important in Judaism – because intention is not important. In Jewish law "why" I do something is not questioned. If I give Tzedakah, whether I want to or not, I have performed a mitzvah. If I don't hit you – as much as I want to – I have not sinned.

But repentance is not a commandment –So, we do look at the "why" of things – and it becomes important.

Each of us has a psychological identity: This identity is the one where we compensate for loss. Every person lives with loss – it is a constant in life. We are constantly losing things; our youth, our health, those we love, those we don't like – our faith. We learn to live with loss - we do this by holding on to some private perception of our home and family – which often may conflict with official records and actual events.

For instance, we may see ourselves as caring and compassionate – but wonder why no one else does. We may believe that people are against us – when in point of fact they just don't agree.

We must be aware of both identities – for the difference is crucial –and if we neglect this effort we can never understand where we are headed and will never find a life that is meaningful for ourselves or to others.

Anyone who has ever lost a job or failed at a task knows the dissonance created between who we thought we were when we were successful versus who we think we are now that the community has seen us fail.

Victor Frankl was a noted Viennese psychiatrist who was taken first to Theresienstadt and then Auschwitz. In observing his follow prisoners he wondered what it was that enabled certain inmates in the concentration camp to maintain a sense of hope and inner strength while others lost their will to live. In his classic book, "Man's Search for Meaning," he affirms the truth that while we may not decide the conditions of our existence, we



# President's Message

often marvel at the dedication of CBI's clergy, administrators, educators, office and maintenance staff and volunteers. As you heard during my High Holiday speech, Congregation B'nai Israel is truly a synagogue that offers "human contact, spiritual fulfillment and intellectual development."



Our synagogue community and what it provides is a gift. As CBI President, I am blessed to see first-hand the caring and commitment of so many people. This was reinforced to me during an agenda-packed Board of Trustees meeting last night. After hearing a thought-provoking D'var Torah presented by September's volunteer, Joe Tenenbaum, the Board of Trustees discussion included:

- holiday services and plans to evaluate congregant satisfaction
- reports on finances, our two schools, and facilities
- sign up for High Holiday Appeal calls
- recommendations for guidelines to recognize congregants being honored by outside organizations (thank you to Heidi Cohen, Lisa Lisser and Dan Richter for tackling what turns out to be a somewhat complex issue)
- continued plans regarding our wonderful new website with easy access to calendar and programming
- how to introduce our new Rishonim -dynamic teens from Israel who will be with us for the year contributing to planning across committees bringing Israel closer to us right here at CBI
- Interfaith Hospitality Network hosting that will take place at the end of this month
- We heard from our Synagogue Administrator about a \$62,000 grant we received from the NJ Office of Homeland Security and Preparedness. This grant will provide funds for upgrading building security and is the direct result of the hard work of Steve Brown, Art Fredman and Lisa Roth. They worked tirelessly to gather and compile all information. This was a continuation of the ongoing work that has been taking place by our Security Committee,

- chaired by Art Fredman in partnership with clergy, staff and many expert congregational volunteers.
- Mandarin school program whose founder was so satisfied with renting a classroom from us this summer that the after-school program will continue on-site during the 2013-14 academic year.

In a room of dedicated, thoughtful and committed people, we discuss agenda items fully, amidst a wide range of opinions (this is not a shy group!). We carefully evaluate, plan and make decisions responsibly and thoughtfully. This was just one meeting. While every meeting may not be as agendapacked, every meeting is met with the same level of serious thought, discussion and dedication.

I would like to announce and thank three new committee chairs: Brad Schenerman joins Heather Adelman as co-chair of Blanche Bayar Religious School, Michelle Retik is our new Hearts and Hands chair, and Steve Friedman joins Josh Schor as co-chair of CBI's Adult Learning. Our new chairs bring continued vision to already strong and dynamic committees so we can be assured of wonderful programming and continuity. With permission, I quote from Steve Friedman who so aptly expresses the meaning of all that goes on at our synagogue and goals of our programs:

"....CBI can provide not only a place to pray, celebrate holidays, Hebrew School, and to learn about Israel, but also is a place for enrichment and learning with respect to those other critical elements of Jewish tradition that deal with issues such as how to make your life more fulfilling, how to deal with everyday ethical issues, how to treat your neighbors and how to raise your children as well grounded mensches who are ready to do good in the world."

#### A Day in the Life of BBRS

#### **MEN'S CLUB**

The powerful story about Abraham destroying the idols in his father's store is not found in the Torah portions from Bereshit that we will be reading during services in the next few weeks, but belongs to



the Oral Tradition (Torah Beal Peh - literally Torah on the Mouth). It is believed that the Jewish people received both the written Torah and the Oral Tradition from G'd at Mount Sinai. In the first centuries of the Common Era, the Rabbis transcribed the Oral Tradition into parts of what today is known as the Midrash Rabba. Paraphrasing the Midrash, the story goes that on a day when Abraham was left to watch the store, he took a stick and smashed all the idols his father Terah had manufactured, except for the largest one. When Terah returned, he asked what had happened. Abraham replied that the idols had got into a fight and the biggest one had won - to which Terah said: "Why do you make a sport out of me - have they then any knowledge?" or put in contemporary language: "Don't be ridiculous, don't you know that the idols have no power?" Abraham's next answer to Terah, as written on the Midrash text, I find to be enormously powerful: "Should not your ears listen to what your mouth is saying." Nowadays, as in Abraham's times, it is easy to say that worshipping idols is absurd; but we all know that modern life if full of gadgets, devices, fads, consumption and entertainment that demand our attention.

Of course it is easy to say that none of these things distract us from conferring a more profound meaning to our lives.

But do the ears listen? I like to think that actively participating in our Congregation and Men's Club – embracing Jewish wisdom and Jewish tradition - helps the ears better listen to what the mouth says.

# **CBI Youth Groups** Chaverim – Kadima – Millburn USY

Max Retik is the Vice President/Communications of Millburn USY for 2013-14. He is a Junior at Millburn High School. Max is a familiar face in the halls of CBI, now in his fourth year working at Blanche Bayar Religious School as a Madrik. This is his first year on the Millburn USY Board.

Hi, I am Max Retik. Former USY-skeptic and current USY-fanatic. It's funny how that happens, isn't it?

Well it's not all that rare. For me, like so many others before me, and so many more to come, my USY experience truly started over the summer. Granted, I had been to many chapter-level USY events at the synagogue, and a few regional dances. But I had no idea what a 'region' was. And I had no clue about the huge scale of the International USY community. That all changed the day I was signed up for USY on Wheels 2012, against my will.

I spent the day sulking, truth be told. The idea of praying two or three times a day couldn't have resonated more dissonantly in my ears. The idea of wrapping tfillin, well, that was like nails on a chalkboard. But, I had no choice. And soon enough I found myself standing in a room full of 47 other strangers -- and staff -- whom I felt no desire to get to know whatsoever. Luckily for me, I had an escape. I'm a filmmaker.

As a filmmaker, I saw the potential to 'make the best' of a terrible summer by making a documentary about the bus. It sounded like an intriguing idea, 48 Jewish teens traveling the country. At least, from an audience's point of view. I would lay awake at night and visualize the film. I saw it play out in my head -kids sitting around a campfire at night, singing, playing the guitar, laughing, and crying. It was a quintessential summer camp experience that I knew everybody could identify with. I was actually excited for the trip, or, for after the trip, so that I could make the movie. I even made a short trailer using footage from a trip to the airport to pick up one of my Canadian bus mates...a short video that actually gained a deal of publicity in the USY community before the trip even started.

That front continued into the first week of the trip. I would frequent my camera bag, constantly taking out my camera, filming this, filming that. The camera never left the strap around my neck. I didn't talk, I didn't pray. I recorded. And thereby, I separated myself from the others. I wasn't a member of this trip! I was just simply there to capture it. Nobody talked to me. I didn't talk to anybody either. My first fourteen days were all the same.

Now, of course it couldn't continue that way. And little by little, I started making friends. Acquaintances, really. But we would have friendly conversations and I'd tell jokes and they'd laugh and that was okay by me. I didn't know the tunes to their ruach, and I didn't sing it. I didn't know Birkat Hamazon, and so I didn't chant it. And I certainly, definitely, did not pray.

In fact, it wasn't until we reached California that the tables turned. I can't remember when exactly, and perhaps it is better I didn't, but I started to realize how included I had become. People wanted to room with me. Heck, they wanted to sleep in the same bed as me! I had made friends. I had made best friends! I would stay up late talking to my friends, I would tell them what I was thinking, concerns, joys, and guilt. And they would tell me theirs. And we would laugh all night and we would engage in deep discussions and even arguments, but that was okay too.

And, at our last Shabbat, I had my revelation. We stayed at a Ramah camp for the weekend. I remember, after a day of traveling, unpacking, and a...dance competition (my group of five performed a crowd favorite; the four boys and I's rendition of One Direction's "You Don't Know You're Beautiful" won honors with the 'judges'), we all changed into sweats and met on the field for s'mores by the bonfire. And when the chocolate ran out, my friends and I gathered around the campfire and took out our guitars. We grabbed our iPhones and searched for lyrics to songs. We sang for hours. Request upon request, wasting the night away deep in song and connection. When the songs had all been sung, and the music had been engrained into our memories, we said goodnight and all went off to our respective beds. And that was when I saw my camera, sitting on my bed, untouched for hours.

Therein lies the moral of the story, and the real meaning I found that summer. Sometimes it's just better to step out from behind your mask of lenses. #### FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

always possess the freedom to interpret those conditions and the freedom to choose our response. Our response is freely chosen. We always possess the freedom to shape the interpretation of our experience to decide what it means to us. We therefore bear full responsibility for our character and this freedom and responsibility for our own character is the definition of being human. We can live in self-absorption, nursing the resentments of victimhood, or we can reach out to the other in love and caring. This freedom lifts us above the fragility of life to a level of meaning. '

Frankl laid the groundwork for linking forgiveness and meaning. In the nazi concentration camps during World War II he said he experienced kindnesses as well as brutality. Based on his experience Frankl reconstructed his view of humanity around the competing ideas of indecency versus decency Frankl explained, there are two races of men in this world, but only these two – the race of the decent man and the race of the indecent man.

One dictionary definition of the verb to forgive is to acknowledge that no debt exists. This acknowledgment

goes beyond forgetting or pardoning, both of which imply that debt exists, but has been dealt with in one way or another. I doubt that I have learned as much in life as a reasonably long lifetime should be expected to provide, but a few things stand out. I have learned that life is an adventure in forgiveness.

And I think that this is the key – being able to forgive is what gives us the ability to see the bigger picture. You may have hurt me in some undefined way – but my inability to forgive you does not allow me to see you as a human being. I have dehumanized you – and dehumanization prevents empathy.

We often talk about spirituality and our need to move up the ladder of nearness to God – but without empathy there is no movement. Without forgiveness you can never find meaning. You cannot progress unless you can learn to forgive and care.

It may sound complicated – but it really isn't. The concept of Shalom means to be whole. If you want Shalom in your life, you have to act that way. You cannot use toxic behavior to achieve wholeness.

# John Less Exhibit at The Jewish Museum of New Jersey

n exhibition of art of former CBI congregant and artist John Less will be featured at The Jewish Museum of New Jersey (located in Newark) from October 6 through December 15. The exhibit, called "Berlin – Shanghai – Newark: The Odyssey and Art of John H. Less," can be viewed on Sunday afternoons from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m.

According to the museum, "the paintings in this exhibition primarily focus on Less' life as a German holocaust refugee in Shanghai from 1940 to 1947. They depict things he directly witnessed and experienced during this period of his life. Less vividly portrays his uprooting from a culture in which he and his family believed themselves to be at home and secure to their abrupt transformation into complete outsiders. Less' oeuvre is predominantly realistic with impressionist influence."


Closer to home, you can see another work of John Less on the reading table located in the sanctuary. The cover on the reading table was designed by Less and unveiled in 1987. The design reflects the seven branch menorah located in the front of the sanctuary. This design is also featured on some of our tribute cards.

John and his wife, Miriam, were long-time members of Congregation B'nai Israel and their children, Steven and Deborah, grew up in the congregation. John Less passed away in 2011.

Naomi Eisenberger, a past president of CBI, remembers John as a "gentle, quiet man with great talent and a generous spirit. Underneath all of that were the remains of his Shoah experience."

John's granddaughter, Lauren Byers, is a member of CBI along with her family, continuing a fourgeneration tradition.

Sandy and Alvin say, "We are delighted to be members of this vibrant, enthusiastic, energetic, forward-looking, youthful congregation."



Hello Adult Forum Members,

On October 15, Yiddish Words & Expressions That Have Crossed over into English will be presented by Hirschhorn speaker Bennett Muraskin. Begin to notice in the newspapers and on television just how many Yiddish words have come into popular use-think the Scripps National Spelling Bee winning word "knaidel."



Once again, we are partnering with the JCC of Central New Jersey to take some fabulous trips. The first of these is to the Frick Collection and the Asia Society on October 24. We will be among the first to view the Frick's featured exhibition which opens two days before our trip, Vermeer, Rembrandt, and Hals: Masterpieces of Dutch Painting from the Mauritshuis (http://www.frick.org/exhibitions/mauritshuis). That day we will also visit the Asia Society and view a landmark exhibition, Iran Modern, that will focus the rich art-driven culture in the 20 years leading up to the Iranian Revolution and the Iran-Iraq War. The cost for this trip is \$85 for members or partners and \$90 for community participants; this includes lunch. This trip is sold out but there is a wait list, call Barbara for more information 908-889-8800x207.

The second trip, on November 18, with the JCC of Central New Jersey, will be to the Michener Art Museum. From Philadelphia to Monaco: GRACE KELLY—Beyond the Icon. A first and only for the USA, this exhibit will present the woman behind the celebrity and trace her extraordinary life journey through some 100 objects and photos drawn from archives dated 1930 to 1970 provided by the Grimaldi Forum Monaco, Prince's Palace, Archives du Palais Princier de Monaco, and Audiovisual Archives of the Principality of Monaco. The cost for this trip is \$80 for members or partners, and \$85 for community participants, lunch included.

On November 5, we will screen the Matthew McConaughey film *Mud* in Mike Nichols's excellent rite-of-passage tale. Two 14-year-olds, Ellis and Neckbone, unearth a charismatic fugitive, Mud (Matthew McConaughey), hiding out near the Mississippi River. He impresses the noble Ellis, in particular, with his enduring love for a childhood sweetheart (Reese Witherspoon), persuading Ellis to promise to reunite Mud with her. There are some strong cameos here from Sam Shepard and Ray McKinnon, but it's the relationship between the boys, played by the impressive Tye Sheridan and Jacob Lofland, and Mud that captivates.

Remember, all of our in-house programs begin with lunch at noon followed by the program at 12:30. You may pay at the door, but please call or email me with your sandwich orders in advance. 


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
