FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

I n my first weeks in the congregational rabbinate after my ordination I was confronted with several intense emotional experiences. I watched a baby die, performed a messy divorce and wedding involving the same couple and dealt with serious problems that had built up while the previous rabbi had been gone. I came through and to my everlasting surprise, did no harm to any of the families involved because I had been taught the basic skill of "When in



doubt call an expert." I came to realize that there was no adequate preparation for the rabbinate, except experience.

After surviving those initial crises I began to ask myself serious questions about the role of the rabbi. How do I cope with what is expected of me? How do I give my all on limited resources? How do I keep my job and my self respect? How can I truly reach out and affect people so as to bring Judaism into their lives in a meaningful way?

Most rabbis feel that the sermon is the most effective means of making a difference in the lives of their congregants. However pulpit speaking takes up only the shortest period of time during our week. We may spend several hours or days preparing a sermon yet even the most long winded of us will not take much more than twenty minutes to present it. Twenty minutes of direct contact with a congregation each week, no matter how intense is not going to have much of a lasting effect. Twenty minutes of individual consultation or tutorial is of much greater value. For better or worse the liberal American rabbinate can no longer be sermon oriented. Liberal Jews are not as approachable through this medium as they were twenty years ago. As the needs of congregants change the rabbi is called upon to be more versatile in meeting those needs. The sermon is only one means at the rabbi's disposal and it is questionable whether it is the most effective one.

While the rabbi may no longer stand at the center of a complex and diversified Jewish community, he/she is the key figure for many Jews who are in search of meaning within their faith. If every contact is meaningful Judaically then the rabbi is constantly onstage. This may be the philosophy of many but not, in my opinion, the most effective one.

MUSICAL NOTES By Cantor Lorna Wallach

ost Jews are familiar with the Biblical verse "Sh'ma Yisrael Adonai Eloheinu Adonai Echad." In the verses that follow this sentence, in Deuteronomy 6, verses 5 – 9, is the phrase "uk'shartam l'ot al yadekha, v'hayu l'totafot bayn einekha." "And you shall bind them as a sign upon your hand, and they shall be a reminder between your eyes." This is of course referring to the mitzvah of Tefillin. Tefillin are ritual objects worn for weekday Shacharit (morning prayers) and are



usually introduced at bar or bat mitzvah age. They consist of two small black boxes (bayit) made from layers of parchment that are sealed and lacquered and attached to leather straps. Inside the boxes are scrolls of parchment inscribed with four passages from the Torah (from the books of Exodus and Deuteronomy).

The mitzvah of wrapping Tefillin is one of the most basic Jewish rituals. Years ago, it was not necessary to offer special instruction on the significance of and the "mechanics" of wearing Tefillin. Children saw their fathers and grandfathers wearing them for the daily morning prayers and the boys knew that when they became Bar Mitzvah they would take on this commandment together with all the other commandments. Yet for many of us today, the practice of wearing Tefillin is removed from our daily lives; somehow a relic of the past rather than a vibrant and vital spiritual experience.

I must admit that when I first began wearing Tefillin (I was 23 years old!) it felt strange and uncomfortable. As I became more accustomed to wearing them regularly, and as the skill of wrapping them around my arm and hand became more second nature to me, I learned to appreciate this ancient ritual and get to a point in my life where now, when I recite the daily morning prayers, I feel strange and out of place if I'm not wearing my Tefillin. Putting on Tefillin (and a Tallit) is like a way of praying to God with what we wear. In his book, *To Pray as a Jew*, Rabbi Hayim Donin suggests that Tallit and Tefillin are like a uniform worn by soldiers in the army. When wearing a uniform, one is especially mindful to whom one owes one's allegiance.

At B'nai Israel, we should be proud of the fact that we sustain a daily morning minyan, which, by the way, could use some more attendees as there are always people needing to say Kaddish and we have fewer "regulars" who can attend as frequently as they used to. Some, though not all, of the attendees put on Tefillin. While men are obligated to perform this commandment, as the case with many other mitzvot, women can take on these obligations and then consider themselves "equally obligated." Taking on a new ritual is not necessarily easy to do. The best way to learn how to put on Tefillin is to have someone show you how it's done. Similar to learning how to ride a bicycle, if someone just explains how it's done you still won't "get it" until you've tried it and practiced it for a while. CBI's Men's Club brought the "World Wide Wrap" program, sponsored by the Conservative Movement, to our congregation several years ago to help teach and inspire our members to perform this mitzvah. This year, on Sunday morning, February 1, Men's Club will once again offer this program in our congregation. I encourage everyone to participate, whether you've never



At once a plea to end human suffering and a ray of hope for Israeli-Palestinian harmony, journalist Shlomi Eldar's documentary Precious Life chronicles the plight of Mohammad Abu Mustafa, a four year old Palestinian boy born without an immune system, who will die in an Israeli hospital if he doesn't obtain a bone marrow transplant within a brief period of time. Not only does Mohammad succeed at getting the treatment he needs, his case manages to pull Israeli and Palestinian doctors together, who make a concerted, joint effort to save the child's life, putting aside their racial and religious differences in the process, despite the Gaza embargo. Meanwhile, Mohammad's mother, a woman named Raida, both draws scathing criticism from the Gazan community, and alienates others by espousing her sympathy with Palestinian terrorist bombers. This leads Eldar himself and the audience - into a deep-seated ethical quandary about saving the life of a child who may well grow up to be an extremist, sacrificing his own life to kill others. Precious Life was hailed as "enthralling" by the Wall Street Journal, and "remarkable" by Thomas Friedman in the New York Times, while the Hollywood Reporter observed, "The film has as much tension as a good thriller and more honest emotion than most Hollywood tearjerkers. And it's suffused with moral intelligence."

ISRAEL AFFAIRS

CURRENT EVENTS

The news items I mentioned over the last two months are still important issues and are only closer to resolution due the passage of time. These items are:

- Ongoing negotiations between the Western powers and with Iran about eliminating Iran's nuclear weapon's program (interim deadline March 2)
- Israel's upcoming election (March 17)
- Provocation and terrorism within Israel from last fall

More recently, events in France have focused much of the Jewish world on several related issues – specifically the safety of Jews in France, and more generally European anti-Semitism. The attack on the newspaper also highlighted the danger (which the world has been aware of since Salman Rushdie was first threatened with a Fatwa in 1989) of radical Islamic intolerance of disrespectful satire or characterizations.

A more general issue focuses on the choice faced by the Jews of France. While Israel is a safety valve for Jews living under the threat of violence, the question as to what is better for the Jews of France is heart wrenching. France has the second largest Diaspora community of Jews and there is value in maintaining that community. But Israel is also a refuge for Jews who do not feel safe in their own home.

On July 24th, Bus E went ice-skating. Forty-eight teenagers, many of which had never tried it. Isn't that a little weird, I wondered? We had never had lessons. Surely we would all fall. Looking back, I'm not sure it was so strange at all.

I had left for the trip with my sister's promise that I was in for the best summer of my life, and just a bit of cynicism that it couldn't be that good. After all, I didn't know anybody. What about the long hours on the bus? What about praying every day?

The ice was comfortingly solid, but trying to walk in my

skates was like trying to walk in stilettos. I grabbed the wall and held on tight.

The first night on Wheels, our Rosh told us that USY was a bubble, a constantly moving space inside which each of us could be anyone we wanted to be – better yet, we could be ourselves. 


