FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

hat can one say about Purim? Superficially it seems to be a holiday of little depth; Haman (bad guy) tries to kill Mordechai (good guy) by tricking Achashverosh (simple king) into believe lies about Mordechai's people (us). Esther (beautiful heroine) turns the tables on Haman and everyone lives happily ever after (except Haman and his family).



So, to honor the story we dress up, drink (but not to excess) and have carnival fun during the reading of the Megillah and the games before and after. All in all we see a holiday meant for children and more to the point – a narrative on a child's level

There is however a serious side to Purim – and one that speaks to us even to this day. One of the issues that almost kept the story of Esther out of the Bible was that the name of God is not mentioned in the Purim story. It is almost as though God does not factor into the narrative. I believe that this omission was not accidental. If history serves, the Jews of Persia felt relatively secure. They were part of the fabric of the culture and comfortable in their secular society. How else could the heroes of our story Mordechai and Esther carry Hebraic versions of Marduk and Ishtar – the high gods of the Persian pantheon?

Another issue of the story is that the focus of the story is away from the land of Israel. Indeed, Esther is the only book of the Bible which contains a narrative that almost completely ignores Israel. We are told at the very beginning of the story that the Jews are "exiled" as though that comprised their total reality.

Is it accidental that both God and the Land are absent? Or is it perhaps a subtle message that when we leave these two behind – when they are not part of our consciousness our community (and we) are vulnerable and weak? A strong faith coupled with strong ties to our Homeland are vital supports to our foundation.

Purim can be a time of self-examination – it begins the Passover season. Let us evaluate our support of Israel and our faith – they both need us- especially now.

MUSICAL NOTES

uch of Jewish liturgy and ritual is repetitive – we say the same prayers each day, day after day; we have set rituals for Shabbat and holidays which don't change from week to week or year to year; the Passover Seder has a prescribed order of steps to follow, which remains the same for two consecutive nights every Passover; when we end the cycle of reading the Torah we immediately start the same cycle again. As we recite the liturgy



and perform the rituals, it is important to keep in mind the purpose of prayer and rituals. In Judaism, rituals and religious observances are grounded in Jewish law (Halakhah) combined with rabbinic laws and traditions. Our rituals, liturgy, holy objects and sacred texts assist us in infusing our lives with greater holiness, elevating the mundane to something sacred, which, we hope, gives us a greater sense of Jewish identity, deepens our connection to God and to the community, and helps to shape our perspective on the world and on life.

It is often a challenge, even for those who are knowledgeable and who have deep faith, to turn that which is routine into something meaningful. So, how do we uphold tradition and rituals while ensuring that engaging in these ancient practices will continue to be relevant and provide personal and communal meaning? There are many different approaches one could take to addressing this challenge. Historically speaking, Jews have borrowed rituals and ritual objects from other cultures, but each has been reshaped by Jewish values and Jewish experience and given new meaning in the context of Jewish living. Judaism has evolved, and if you look at the ritual practices of Jews around the world, it varies widely from place to place and at different times in history.

Recognizing that exploration, innovation and reinterpretation of rituals and liturgy are essential to contributing to Kavannah (intention) and spirituality, we are offering two programs this month to help rekindle your spiritual journey! Everyone is invited to participate in the CBI Sisterhood Women's seder on Sunday evening, March 15, which I will co-lead with Rabbi Helaine Ettinger, and which will feature the CBI volunteer band.

On March 20 – 22, CBI welcomes a talented musician/Jewish educator, Josh Warshawsky, as our Artist- in –Residence, helping us celebrate CBI's 90th year. As an inspiring and enthusiastic song leader and composer of new melodies for the liturgy, Josh has something to offer everyone – from our nursery school students, to our youth groups, to our seniors. Josh will be leading us on Friday night and Shabbat morning, not only in prayer and song, but also engaging us in dialogue about the significance and history of the liturgy, adding his own fresh nuance and lively new tunes! We hope you will plan to join us both on Friday evening and Saturday for what promises to be an uplifting and joyous Shabbat experience!

President's Message

Por the first time in 28 years as a resident of New Jersey, I'm no longer a landowner. Now that we've moved, people constantly ask me "how do you like Summit?" and I find myself answering in a way I never thought I would, even just a few years ago..



I find myself saying "it's a place to live. I'm not meeting my neighbors, really. My community is here at B'nai Israel." Had I not been in a leadership role in our synagogue, would I still feel that strong a bond? As with any community we participate in, our bonds are only as strong as we make them as we invest back into the community. I have had the honor to work with our Emerging Leaders cohort this year and watch as the group learns more about each other, becomes more comfortable sharing details about themselves and, this last month, about their hopes for our community and its future. Now my hope is that they will begin to lead us all forward. And my hope for all our members at CBI is that they make CBI part of their busy lives in whatever way we fit. There are so few places in the world where we can be welcomed, supported and engaged in daily life. Synagogue can be that place if you help us make those bonds with you.

Minyan is one place where we develop those close ties during morning davening and when saying kaddish for loved ones. And, our daily minyans are often the place we welcome the stranger on a daily basis. I, like so many of us, started attending the daily minyan only when I needed to say kaddish for my parents. At that time, I recall being completely intimidated at any minyan. I had started shiva for my father in Chicago where the

only place to attend was a local orthodox shul. I sat on the women's side and waited until it was time to say kaddish. After kaddish, I left as quietly as I arrived. No one noticed me. Upon returning to CBI, I was still intimidated having never attended the morning minyan here. But once in the room, I could not have been more welcomed as people in the room acknowledged the loss of my father. As the days went on during that year, I stayed for the breakfasts, honored yarzheits with others and was part of the minyan for those who came to say kaddish during the year. My relationships with so many were developed during that year. And minyan continues to be a place I can go to be among friends. As in past winters, our daily minyans struggle as the regular members travel to warmer climates. Please help us uphold our tradition and attend morning or evening. Your attendance is so welcomed - and I cannot encourage you more from my experience to be part of the community when you can.

As I look back on those 28 years, I feel that my life as part of this community could not be richer. It didn't happen overnight – but I was always welcomed and encouraged to be comfortable in committees, the sanctuary, the minyan, and on the Board of Trustees. Please call or email me if I can help you have that same experience.

ISRAEL AFFAIRS

CURRENT EVENTS

Last month I wrote about the most recent important issues relating to Jews and Israel, which focused on events in France. Since then, events in the United States have exploded in controversy. When Speaker of the House, John

Boehner invited Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to speak before a joint session of Congress, the White House objected both to the process of inviting him, and to his appearance just two weeks before the Israeli elections.

The pressure on the Prime Minister not to speak before Congress, both from his political opponents in Israel, and from many Americans, has been intense both for the reasons stated above, and because the Prime Minister and many member of the US Congress disagree with the apparent direction of the administrations' negotiations with Iran. **Their position has become more lenient** about Iran's nuclear program than was originally intended.

While the invitation has been a source of much tension and criticism on both sides, I hope that the focus returns to the importance of the policy differences, and the need for additional sanctions if the original goals of the negotiations with Iran are to be accomplished.

The next deadline for these negotiations to reach a broad agreement is the end of March.

World Zionist Congress Voting now through April 30,2015

Jews worldwide have an opportunity to elect delegates to the World Zionist Congress, which meets every five years, and is meeting later this year. As Americans, we can participate in the election of the US delegation, which is currently 145 delegates, approximately one third of the representatives. According to the website of the American Zionist Movement, http://www.myselfourisrael.com, "to be eligible to vote in the US Zionist election, you must declare that you subscribe to the Jerusalem Program and be 18 years of age or older, be a permanent resident of the United States, be Jewish, and have not voted in the March 2015 Knesset election.

The Jerusalem Program is described at http://www.myselfourisrael.com/jerusalem-program. It begins with the following summary paragraph:

Zionism, the national liberation movement of the Jewish people, brought about the establishment of the State of Israel, and views a Jewish, Zionist, democratic and secure State of Israel to be the expression of the common responsibility of the Jewish people for its continuity and future.

Please visit that website for more details on the Jerusalem program.

- Anti-Semitism
- Education and Identity
- Israel Diaspora Relations
- Israeli Civil Society
- Justice and Tolerance

Each is described in more detail on the Jerusalem program website.

As part of the Conservative movement, we urge our community to support the Mercaz slate of delegates to the Congress, as this is the slate aligned with the goals of the Masorti movement within Israel. Having stronger representation in the Congress will help provide funding and political support for greater diversity in Jewish life in Israel. As the Mercaz website explains,

Your vote for MERCAZ allows for our Conservative/Masorti communities in Israel to live the lives we take for granted in the United States, where Conservative conversions are accepted without question, women can read Torah proudly and without fear, and egalitarian minyanim are celebrated. It also translates into critical support for fledgling Masorti communities throughout the world, particularly in regard to

providing opportunities for our youth.

SALUTING OUR SUPER SENIORS: GLORIA SEGEL

loria Segel was born to immigrant parents in Elizabeth, 1932, and grew up in a multigenerational home built by her grandfather, on South Park Street. That area, from around 1900 to the mid-fifties, was primarily a Jewish neighborhood, in Elizabethport. The Jewish families subsequently migrated to Upper Elizabeth, Union, Hillside, Cranford, West-

field and other areas, as new suburban neighborhoods grew. The orthodox synagogue of Gloria's youth was Holche Yosher Shul, established in 1886, 14 years after CBI Elizabeth, its conservative counterpart. It was eventually purchased by the City of Elizabeth and razed in the late 1940's to make way for the NJ Turnpike. Holche Yosher was the forerunner of the renowned Jewish Educational Center (JEC).

Gloria received her BS degree in nursing from Jersey City State Teacher's College, and became a registered nurse at Jersey City Medical Center. She also taught chemistry and pharmacology to nursing students. She subsequently received her master's degree in nursing from Columbia University and taught at Battin High School in Elizabeth.

Gloria met her husband, Kal, a University of Pittsburgh graduate, at a party, and married the year after. Four years later, Kal, from Johnstown, Pa., who worked for Exxon (then Esso), became vice-president in charge of building additions for the European Esso refineries. They moved to The Hague, in Holland, and lived there from 1960-1968. Gloria remembers that period as a happy time. Raising their young son, Philip, traveling throughout Europe, and finding remnants of Jewish life in the aftermath of World War II. She remembers seeing overgrown cemeteries, as well as many shops and stores on main streets, formerly occupied by Jewish merchants and families.

Gloria is the proud mother of Philip, married to Holly. They live in Basel, Switzerland, where Philip is an audiologist for Cochlear at their European headquarters. Holly is a speech pathologist. Gloria is also mother to George, wife Dina, residing in Newtown, Pa., and grandmother of 17 year old triplets, Kalli, Joseph and Rebecca. George is a dentist and Dina is a practicing attorney.

Gloria has been an active con-

gregant her entire life. At CBI Elizabeth, she was recording secretary, treasurer, presidium president and sisterhood president, and worked on/chaired many committees. In her communal life, Gloria is a life member of Hadassah, has chaired chai luncheons, fundraised, chaired fashion shows, managed publicity campaigns and was named Woman Of The Year. She is also a life member of National Council of Jewish Women (Union County) and has been recording secretary, presidium president and president. She's also a life member of Jewish War Veterans.

After the 1992 CBI merger of Elizabeth and Millburn, Gloria continued her involvement as sisterhood recording secretary, nominating committee chair, membership chair, plus a host of other activities, including the filling of Purim baskets, working on rummage sales, Shabbat oneg preparation, and more.

Gloria's husband, Kal, together with Jose Keselman and Juan Katz, Elizabeth, were instrumental in effecting the merger of our 2 congregations. Though all three are gone, their legacy is seen in the revitalization of our morning minyan (breakfast included) and Men's Club. Gloria's role even extended to helping restart Men's Club, as well as the transfer and repositioning of CBI Elizabeth's yahrzeit plaques within our building.

Gloria continues to be a board member and participant in our Adult Forum. To Gloria, we say "Yasher Koach." May you continue to go from strength to strength, infusing our congregation with your sparkle, vitality, energy and personal stamp of Yiddishkeit.


