FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

There is a great Rabbinic story that illustrates what type of people we are supposed to be. It is told of Rabbi Yosef Soloveichik that once a poor man came to his house. The man said that he had come to ask a question regarding the sacred rituals of Passover. He told the rabbi that he could not afford to buy wine, so he wished to know if he could fulfill his obligation to drink four cups of wine during the seder by drinking four cups of milk.



Rabbi Yosef said that no Jew could fulfill this important religious commandment with milk. The rabbi then gave the man twenty five rubles with which to buy wine.

After the man had gone, the Rabbi's wife went to her husband with a question. "Why, when wine cost two or three rubles, had the rabbi given the man twenty five?"

Rabbi Yosef smiled and said, "When a poor Jew asks if he can use milk at his seder because he cannot afford wine, it is obvious that he cannot afford meat either."

We are taught to be people who look beyond the question to the questioner and in doing so, we look to see what would provoke the question in the first place.

During the Passover Seder the four children ask four questions. If you look closely at the answers you will see that the answers don't fit the questions asked as much as they apply to the questioners themselves. Too often words are used as a defense. We are asked to be the type of people who can disentangle the words and put the puzzle behind them together.

A sweet Passover to everyone.

MUSICAL NOTES By Cantor Lorna Wallach

his month we celebrate the 67th anniversary of the State of Israel. For a young country, Israel L has such a plethora of folk songs. Looking at the various styles and themes of the repertoire of Israeli folk music, one can certainly get a feel for the pulse of the people from the time of the pre-establishment of the state and throughout its existence as a state. The songs encompass a wide variety of traditions, spanning centuries and Jewish communities around the world. Whether expressing emotions, ideals or values,



the songs tell a story. They record history in a unique and valuable way.

Unlike European folk-songs, whose origins tend to be vague and lost in the past, most Israeli folk songs originated in the 20th century and have known composers and poets. Yet these songs are folk music just the same, for they live now in the oral tradition. Several generations of Jews have grown up singing them, and some songs, such as Tsena Tsena, Shalom Chaverim and, of course, Hava Nagila, have achieved mainstream recognition. The purpose of Israeli folk-songs was to inspire a new national cultural identity through which, in the words of Hinei Ma Tov, Jewish brothers and sisters from many lands would dwell together in unity. For Israelis and for Jews throughout the world, the songs evoke sentiments of pride and belonging.

There have been many, many composers and lyricists who have contributed to this vast repertoire -- some have been more prolific than others, and some have had just one or two big hits which made them famous. This past September, an Israeli composer and conductor, Gil Aldema, who played an important role in Israeli vocal music, sadly passed away at the age of 86. Aldema was born in Giv'atayim in Mandate Palestine on September 17, 1928. He graduated from the Jerusalem Academy of Music and Mannes College of Music in New York. Aldema taught music at Hadassim youth village. Later he worked as a program producer and arranger for the Israel Broadcasting Authority. He composed and arranged songs for folk-ensembles and choirs. He had a special ability to create a musical tapestry that expanded the contours of the original composition and gave the song a new dimension of sound. He arranged the tunes of such prominent Israeli composers as Mordechai Zaira, David Zahavi, Daniel Samborsky, Emanuel Amiran, Moshe Vilenski, Sasha Argov, Naomi Shemer and many others. In 2004, Aldema was awarded the Israel Prize for Hebrew song. I feel privileged to have had the opportunity to sing some of his arrangements through my many experiences singing Jewish choral music over the years.

This year, in celebration of Yom Ha'atzma'ut, CBI will have a special program on Friday night April 24, with a Shabbat dinner and a sing-a-long of some popular and beloved Israeli folk songs. Please join us for this uplifting evening with the opportunity to hear from members of our community what their favorite Israeli songs are and why! We'll also try to honor requests that evening of songs to sing together, but if you could tell me (or Joe Tenenbaum, or Janet Slifer, or email Celeste) in advance, then we can try to have the song lyrics available for everyone!

May the many beautiful folk songs of Israel continue to be sung by Jews around the world, and may there soon be peace and harmony in Israel and everywhere.







Since the last bulletin article, Men's Club did all this: helped volunteer for the Purim Carnival, set up a training on the CPR & Defribulator equipment which will be located soon in the Chapel, cooked up a lot of French toast and omelets for the Paid Up Breakfast with Josh Cohen (the NJ Director of the ADL), held a Pizza and Poker night before Pesach, and distributed Passover wine to our congregants. We also gathered for an evening to pack up and mail little yellow candles for a somber day ahead.

Please check your mail for a small box containing a memorial yellow candle for Yom Hashoa which begins on the evening of April 15th and goes through the day April 16th.

With delivery of these candles, we are offering the CBI community the opportunity to make a donation upon receipt of the candle. This is consistent with the Jewish tradition of giving tzedakah in memory of a departed person at the time of the yahrzeit (the anniversary of the individual's death).

Please consider a donation in of \$18 (or multiple of) since this is the numerical equivalent of the Hebrew word chai, or "life"). All funds raised above the cost of this program will be used for its Holocaust programs and related activities.

On April 15th, join what is hoped to be a million others who will light candles on this evening, by registering at www.yellowcandles.org.

From the organizers of this program, you should light the candle...

- To show your gratitude for the children in your life who don't have to face the Nazi horrors so many children went through in the 30s and 40s.
- To remember the over 1,500,000 children who were murdered by the Nazis.
- Because Anti-Semitism is still commonplace in our everyday lives.
- To honor and remember our brave soldiers who have and are still giving their lives to establish and protect the Land of Israel.
- Six Million Do not focus on that mind boggling number-instead think of that life, that one who was murdered, who couldn't find a cure for cancer; the one who couldn't write a great love song that you would have danced to at your wedding; the one great athlete who couldn't win a Gold Medal; the one who couldn't be a loving parent, grandparent, brother or sister, aunt or

uncle, or cousin.

CURRENT EVENTS

Last month I wrote about the pressure to prevent the Prime Minister from speaking before Congress. We now know that he did speak.

I was in Washington for the AIPAC Policy Congress (along with over 30

fellow congregants), and we watched the speech in the Convention Center between an appearance by Senator Corey Booker, and a meeting with top staff members of Senator Robert Menendez. It seemed to me that the crowd of several hundred activists were mostly pleased with the speech. The speech focused on the danger of Iran not only to Israel but also to the United States and other Western countries. This was also the theme of many of the speeches during the Policy Conference. The most emphatic speech during the two day conference was delivered Monday night by our own Senator Menendez.

Now that the speech has been given, the US Congress and the administration are back working on either the negotiations with Iran, or planning a response to a potential framework for a treaty. By the time you read this, you should know if a framework was announced by the March 24 deadline.

You may also know who will lead the new government in Israel. The Israeli election was expected to be very close – although forming a government could take several weeks after one of the leading vote getters is selected by the President of Israel to form a coalition government.



Running as fast as we could, we made the bus with only seconds to spare, the last ones to find our seats. As the bus began its journey south, the group became visibly more relaxed as we watched the beautiful beaches and gorgeous scenery of Israel pass us by. 
