FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

s the month of Kislev has begun our thoughts turn to the upcoming holiday of Chanukah. If there was ever a holiday made for Hollywood it's Chanukah. The few against the many, the weak overcoming the strong and the fight for religious freedom resonate with so many of us on all different levels. And like so many other Hollywood stories what we have been taught is that the tale told does not even come close to the truth! The texts of Chanukah tell a s omewhat different



story. Chanukah started as a civil war between rival factions trying to control the office of the Kohen Gadol (High Priest). There were the assimilationists versus the traditionalists. The assimilationists called for help from the Syrian-Greeks who came and stayed. What had started as a localized civil conflict became a full-fledged war.

The turning point in the conflict is found in the book of I Maccabies when Mattathias kills an apostate who is offering as acrifice upon a pagan altar. He raises the banner of rebellion and the story continues from there.

Chanukah is a holiday that personifies the Mitzvah of Al Ta'amod (do not stand idly by). As the forces of Antiochus perpetrated atrocities and abomination upon Judaism – Mattathias and his son Judah kept the religious flame alive. While they and their descendents were seriously flawed a nd en ded u p m ore a ssimilated t han t hose t hey o riginally fought, at the right time and in the right place their accomplishments are undiminished.

Chanukah retains its theme of Do Not Stand Idly By in modern times too. I g rew up in a small community. Chanukah was at ime when religious freedom was tested by those who would seek to display religious symbols on public property. When I was one of five rabbis who were imprisoned by the United States government for protesting the treatment of Soviet Jews, we were imprisoned on Chanukah and were nicknamed, the "Maccabee Five."

The following year I was sent to the former Soviet Union to visit Refuseniks during C hanukah as well. I f ound t hat C hanukah was a most important holiday. Religious freedom did not exist. They would make a Chanukah Menorah by cutting a potato in two, hollowing out a depression in one half and placing a single candle in it. That way, if the KGB or a neighbor called they could quickly dispose of the evidence.

There were no greater models for the Mitzvah of Al Ta'amod than the Refuseniks of the Soviet Union.

MUSICAL NOTES

THE LIGHTS OF HANUKKAH

ach Hanukkah, I wa tch the candles burn on my Hanukkiah and with each additional candle, by the eighth night I am completely mesmerized by the lights. The Rabbis ordained that we should light the Hanukkah menorah each night in order to publicize the miracle of Hanukkah. Interestingly, the light of the candles is not to be used for any other purpose (like illuminating a room in order to



see). But the original reason for marking the holiday with light is uncertain. From the Books of Maccabees we know that they burned incense on the altar and lit the lamps on the menorah when they rededicated the Temple; however, the well-known story of the miraculous cruse of oil does not appear in the Books of Maccabees nor in the Mishnah, but only in the Talmud.

So why do we celebrate Hanukkah with light? Rabbi Jose, in the Talmud (Megillah 24b), says, "I was long perplexed by the following verse: 'And you shall grope at noonday as the blind gropes in darkness [Deut. 28:29].' What difference does it make to a blind man whether it is dark or light? Once I was walking on a pitch-black night when I saw a blind man walking with a torch in his hands. I asked him: 'Why do you carry the torch?' He replied: 'As long as the torch is in my hand, people can see me and aid me." From this, we can derive deeper meaning about the Hanukkah candles. They not only remind us of what happened 2000 years ago in the Temple, but they also represent the light of the human spirit and the light of the Divine presence in our lives. The Hanukkah menorah reminds us that no matter how dark life may be, there always remains a source of light inside us. Each of us can brighten up the lives of others through acts of Tzedakkah, kindness and Tikkun Olam.

As I o bserve my fa ther's third Yahrtzeit at the end of this month, I continue to be grateful to this community for the light you provided to me during a very dark time in my life. This year, let us all remember that by lighting the Hanukkah menorah, we ignite the flame within ourselves, and we can use that spark to light up the lives of others. Wishing you a joyous and meaningful Hanukkah celebration!

BLANCHE BAYAR RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

As the days grow shorter and colder, Hanukkah comes closer. We will celebrate with BBRS on D ecember 6 and I thought I might reflect on the word Hanukkah itself. Hanukkah, of comes from the 3 letter Shoresh or Hebrew Root Chet, Nun, Chaf. Lacha'noch, to train or teach, to school or educate, to tutor, bring up, dedicate or consecrate. Hanukkah is essentially all about what we do. Is there a real difference between educating and dedicating? Not so much, especially in Hebrew schools.

Our Chanichim, our students, pupils, trainees, or even neophytes come to us for Chinuch, education, schooling, training, upbringing, or maybe even a n in auguration, a s in L'chanech T'kufah Chadasha, to in augurate a n ew era, the inauguration of their Hebrew studies and their parents might be sending them K'day L'chancho B aMitzvot, to initiate their child into the performance of Mitzvot.

Hanukkah will be a fun time at BBRS – because I keep thinking that Chanukkah itself was invented for the sake of sweetening the Chinuch, the education, of our chanichim. Our s tudents will be de lighted e very e vening when we gather to light the Chanukiyyah (does that derive from the

word's Chanach and Ya? – D edication to God? I k now it doesn't, but I like the idea anyway.) They will answer trivia questions, t hey will sin g M aoz T zur, and t hey g et do wn and dirty playing dreidle, which we know was created so that J ewish c hildren could continue the study of T orah while hiding from the Romans, Or was it? I've read that the dreidle game is just a take off on an old European gambling game called Teetotum... but it's a nice myth and it inspires our students, which is just what it is meant to do.

There is another word in Hebrew with the same 3 letter Shoresh, Chet, Nun, Chaf – Chanichayim means gums, and Chay'chan, is someone who smiles. It is my hope that our students will be smiling throughout Hanukkah and will be rededicated to their studies and to their Jewish life in a ll aspects of their lives, at school, at home and everywhere they go.

EYE ON MEN'S CLUB, A SPECIAL ADVERTISING SECTION TO THE CBI BULLETIN

Have you ever noticed those Special Advertising Sections tucked into reputable publications such as the *Wall Street Journal* or *Fortune*, which are made to look like a regular news section of the newspaper or magazine that happens to be focused on the economic miracle of a single country, like Egypt, Russia, or Albania? They are there to enhance the public image of their country, and the government sponsors hope to encourage investment by the readership of the n ewspaper or magazine. So the CB I Men's Club, being a shrewd observer of these media trends, paid off the CB I Bulletin for an undisclosed sum to publish some important information that you won't find in the pages of the "main stream" media.

A Small Land with Big Dreams

Men's C lub i s a n a utonomous g roup w ithin t he CB I community. It has a separate dues structure, and even its own bank account. Building on Success

The other Special Advertisers like Albania, Egypt, and Russia will s how y ou fancy c harts a bout GNP g rowth, expansions of c anals, and s pace p rograms r eaching new heights. However, there is a reason these countries need to pay heftier sums than us to get their message out. They probably have some bigger issues that need to be worked in their countries, before they can provide fun and fulfilling venues for Conservative Jews. None of those other countries can boast a long and proud tradition of Hanukkah Parties honoring fantastic and accomplished Conservative Jewish Men, ar enown c holent cooking contest, and c hallah French toast paid up breakfasts. None of these other countries venerate their citizens for their athletic and skill accomplishments in bowling, fishing, and poker playing... and cholent cooking.

Strong Economy

The industries that make up the GDP of Men's Club

are fairly diverse. While a nnual membership fees are the biggest source of income, other important income streams ensure that our excellent programming is carried out. These include event fees, athletic participation fees, challah sales, and media sales (mainly the Hanukkah Party ad-book.) We export precious metals in the form of Kiddush Cups for bar and bat mitzvahs. Our high tech industry has been written up numerously in the pages of this publication.

Clean Energy and the Environment


