FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

his year marks the 23rd Yahrtzeit of our Rabbi emeritus, Max Grüenewald. I thought it a fitting tribute to remind CBI of his illustrious past – and his contributions to us which continue to this very day: This biography is an edited version from the Encyclopedia Judaica and the Leo Baeck Institute:

Max Grünewald was born on December 4, 1899 in Upper Silesia, Germany. In the fall of 1917, Grünewald was tested for the army. Despite many illnesses during his youth, he was declared fit and



entered at seventeen years old. His experience in the military was one of tension and frustration. Max Grünewald applied for a leave of absence from military duties in 1918 and enrolled as a medical student at the University of Breslau. He was not happy with the subject and met with historian Hugo Brann from the Jewish Theological Seminary, where he enrolled after completing his military duties.

One of his most influential teachers was Saul Horovitz who later became his father-in-law. Grünewald received a Doctorate of Philosophy (medieval philosophy) from the University of Breslau in July 1925 and concomitantly was ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary. After graduation, Max Grünewald held the post of Chief-Rabbi of the Mannheim Synagogue from April 1925 to March 1938. After the Mannheim Synagogue was destroyed during the 1938 *Kristallnacht*, the Grünewalds fled to Palestine. Max Grünewald traveled back and forth between Palestine and the United States where he conducted research at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America (in New York City). He lived in Palestine until 1944, when he immigrated permanently to the United States and began working as an interim Rabbi for Congregation B'nai Israel in Millburn, New Jersey

Beginning in the early 1950s, Grünewald became very involved with several important Jewish organizations based in the New York area. He was President of the Jewish Philanthropic Fund of 1933, Inc., and one of the directors of the Ruth Gottscho Kidney Foundation, which is still in existence today.

In 1942, Grünewald co-founded the American Federation of Jews from Central Europe and was chair from 1952 to 1962. Max Grünewald was present at the very beginning of LBI's founding in Jerusalem, at the home of Martin Buber, about a year or so before Leo Baeck died. The initial goal of the LBI was to document the lives of Jews living in Germany from the time of the Enlightenment to the time of the Holocaust. After the founding, Grünewald remained an integral part of the Institute and was named president of the New York LBI in 1956, a position he held until 1985.

He also maintained ties with other former Mannheim residents and took part in several reunions both in the United States and in Germany. For the 1987 reunion, Grünewald traveled to Mannheim in order to participate in the dedication of the new Mannheim synagogue. On December 28, 1992, Max Grünewald succumbed to cancer. The following year, the city of Mannheim named a square in his honor, the Rabbiner Max Grünewald Platz, illustrating his impact as a religious leader and an individual.

MUSICAL NOTES

he beginning of the Hebrew month of Shevat, this year corresponding to the middle of January, is the fifth Yahrtzeit (anniversary of the death) of Debbie Friedman. I wanted to take this opportunity to pay tribute to her. Debbie had a distinguished career as an American Jewish songwriter, singer and song –leader, who accompanied herself skillfully on the guitar. As a recording artist, she released over 20 albums and performed in sold out concerts at Carnegie Hall and in hundreds of cities



around the world. I had the honor of performing with her on several occasions and I was always amazed at her special gift and talent to be able to get people to sing together. She truly believed in the power of song and community singing to bring about healing and Tikkun Olam (repairing the world). One of her most famous settings is the Mi Shebeirach (the prayer for healing), the melody of which we use regularly at our Shabbat morning services, and which is sung in synagogues and churches across the nation. The following is commentary that Debbie wrote about the Mi Shebeirach:.

"We are powerful. It is hard to remember that. Sometimes life takes its turns into the unknown and presents us with challenges we would have preferred not to encounter under any circumstances. Suddenly we are confronted with our pain.

It is a strange thing that pain creates beauty and potential for healing. It is hard to imagine that it can provide a foundation for beautiful moments to arise. When we are experiencing emotional discomfort, we need to find a safe place to express our grief and loss. The willingness to both offer and receive blessings of healing and well-being allows one who is wounded to transform and unravel their pain. Our pain need not bury us, instead it may elevate us to the point of healing - if we choose to allow it."

In the Torah portion Beshallach, which will be read this month on Sisterhood Shabbat, is Shirat ha-Yam, the Song at the Sea, a poetic, emotional expression by the Israelites in response to the Exodus from Egypt (Ex. 15:1-19). This chant is immediately followed by the Song of Miriam (v.20-21):

"Then Miriam the prophetess, Aaron's sister, took a timbrel in her hand, and all the women went out after her in dance with timbrels. And Miriam chanted for them: "Sing to the Lord for He has triumphed gloriously." Debbie's uplifting setting of this text, called "Miriam's Song," is another one of her best known and best loved songs.

Debbie Friedman was truly a modern-day prophetess. Not only was she a musical leader like Miriam, she was also visionary akin to her namesake, the prophetess and judge Deborah, the heroine of the Haftarah of Parashat Beshallach. Debbie showed us new ways to cross the sea, by bringing God into a folk-musical conversation and helping us all engage our souls in heartfelt prayer. Debbie's music and her memory will always be a blessing.







Cholent Challenge Weds day Night January 27th in the CBI Kitchen

So are you also inspired to prepare tasty food in the CBI kitchen? Then we want you! And your cholent too! The second annual CBI Cholent Challenge is Saturday January 30th at the Men's Club Shabbat. Cholent Challenge contest should come to CBI Wednesday night January 27th.

On Wednesday night, January 27th at 7:30pm, those Men's Club Members who are worthy (have paid their dues) and who wish to take the challenge to cook up the greatest cholent in the land should arise and assemble in

the CBI kitchen with the following:

- a new (in the box) vessel to cook the cholent which can be a brand new plug-in Crock Pot (market value of approximately \$30) or an Oval Foil Roast Pan 18" x 14" x 3" 5 (5 pack for \$7.49) which can bake in our CBI oven.
- All Kosher fleishik or parve ingredients to make a cholent for 12-15. Cholents will be served in small sample cups, so will like likely be served to 50 or more attendees.
- a recipe either on-paper, on-line, or in-head

Chefs will have from 7:30pm until 9:30pm to prepare their cholents. Those who are able to, can also take a 20 minute break for minyan. If you need past 9:30pm, that's fine, but those sticking around as Moshgiach of the kitchen might start getting hungry by then, and they might start eating the raw ingredients.

Cholents will cook overnight Wednesday, and will be put in refrigerators until Saturday morning. On Saturday morning, they will be warmed up in Shabbat ovens until the Kiddush at approximately 12:30.

ISRAEL AFFAIRS

The Situation in Israel

I do not actually consider this a current events column, but I try to add a little news in hopes that readers who do not focus on Israel in their daily or weekly reading and browsing will become more aware of what is happening. This is

particularly important because listening or reading headlines about Israel is guaranteed to give you an inaccurate and incomplete picture.

You are, I hope, aware that over the past couple of months, Israelis have been subjected to surprise attacks using not only firearms, but often knives and automobiles which often maim but are intended to kill. While the enemy is aiming at Jews, their attacks have been indiscriminate, often injuring Muslims and Bedouins as well. In addition, they are purposely aiming at people of all ages– including infants, and adults over 60 or 70 years old.

While I was generally aware of this, the news reports often report the number killed and the number injured, or report some as "moderately" injured. This understates the impact of these attacks. I was shocked recently when I saw a list of Israelis in need of Refuah Shleima due to terrorist activities.

May they all have a refuah shelaima -- a full and speedy recovery among all the sick and wounded of Israel.

My point is not to frighten our community or cause distress. I am simply encouraging all of you to be compassionate towards our brothers and sisters in Israel and show them how much we care.

What Can We Do?

- Communicate Make public statements of support and stay in touch with Israelis you know.
- Visit—if you have plans to go, go. If you do not have plans, make plans. It is so important that the American Jewish community let Israel as a nation, and Israelis as individuals know that we will not be kept away.
- Support Support Israeli charities, and buy Israeli products. Attend events where Israelis appear (like the recent FIDF event I publicized last month).
- Understand the situation in Israel (like the situation in the US) is not subject to a simple solution. Please be understanding with Israel as it struggles with finding the best way to keep its citizens safe.

I know that almost all places in Israel (as in the US) are safe at almost all times. I just want us to be as supportive as we can be.

I recommend two sites for getting current information about attacks of this type:

On Facebook, follow The Muqata – He has up to date posts about events. (He was actually my source about the Refuah Shleima list). On the internet, follow the blog – This Ongoing War, a site regularly updated with accurate news to fill in the holes, or the misrepresentations you may read elsewhere www.thisongoingwar.blogspot.com/

Thoughtful and Creative Giving with JCF: How Congregation B'nai Ahavath Shalom Continues to Shine

When Congregation B'nai Ahavath Shalom (CBAS) of Union closed last year, quite a few members of the congregation join our community. We are thrilled that they have found a home at CBI! Here is an article about how two current CBI members from CBAS—Hank Kaplowitz and David Gelband—helped ensure a continuing presence for their former synagogue in the Jewish community.

Hank Kaplowitz, who recently retired as the Director of Kean University's Human Rights Institute, and David Gelband, attorney and CBAS president for the last 23 years, are passionate about what matters to them. So it is no surprise that they passionately described the fortuitous fate of their beloved Congregation B'nai Ahavath Shalom (CBAS) on Vauxhall Road in Union.

Faced with shrinking membership, the shul to which Hank, David, and their wives had belonged for years was struggling to stay afloat. The synagogue (which was itself the product of mergers between two temples in the 1960s) could not simply merge with another congregation; there were none nearby. It was clear that it was time to close CBAS's doors, but the few dedicated members left, like Hank and David, were determined that the new owners of the synagogue's property (building and an adjacent house) would maintain a Jewish presence in Union.

After many false starts, a "shidduch" was created between Rabbi Gershon Neumann of Yeshiva Zichron Leyma and the CBAS Board. They credit Rabbi Levi Block, of the Union

County Torah Center in Westfield, who knew of a yeshiva that needed a permanent home. It was a great match: CBAS members looking for a minyan would be welcome, and the yeshiva would maintain CBAS's Yahrzeit memorial boards, ensuring that these lights will continue to shine to commemorate lost members of the CBAS community.

Once the synagogue and house were sold, the congregants had to decide what to do with the profits. They considered many options and eventually came to JCF due to the organization's considerable knowledge of charitable giving. The synagogue's executive committee met with JCF professional staff and chose to invest their proceeds with JCF by creating the Congregation B'nai Ahavath Shalom (CBAS) Fund. It is truly an exceptional project. Through the CBAS Fund, synagogue members in good standing were each allotted an equal share of the funds to support a Jewish nonprofit organization of their choice. Some will support a new synagogue; others many give to a Jewish camp or a JCC; still others may support Jewish Family Service, Daughters of Israel or another agency.

Hank and David were clearly very proud that, in one way or another, CBAS is still sustaining the Jewish community. Union was always a working class community, so giving to the synagogue was not always easy for the congregants. The fact that the assets from the sale of CBAS will help feed the hungry, for example, keeps alive the CBAS spirit of giving back to the Jewish community. What an inspiration! The CBAS family made the best of a tough situation and showed, once again, that the Greater MetroWest community is genuinely dedicated to Jewish philanthropy.

SALUTING OUR SUPER SENIORS: WENDY AND HANK KAPLOWITZ

endy and Hank Kaplowitz recently celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary. When their new friends at CBI remark, based on their youthful appearance and vigor, that they must have been very young when they got married, they respond that they were so young that they are still growing up together

Wendy was born in the Borough Park section of Brooklyn before it became Chassidic, and her family attended the Conservative synagogue Temple Emanuel where she was confirmed. Hank was born in New Haven, Connecticut and attended the New Haven Hebrew Day School . Because there was no Yeshiva high school in New Haven at that time, he went to Yeshiva University (YU) High School in Manhattan, where he dormed. He stayed at YU and earned his B. A. and Ph.D. in Social Psychology there. While in college, he not only pursued two degrees (240 credits) but he also managed to work as a waiter in the Catskills and at catering halls on weekends.

When the couple married, Wendy was entering her junior year at Hunter College majoring in Home Economics/Dietetics and Hank was starting graduate school. They lived in a studio apartment on the Upper East Side of Manhattan that was the size of a dormitory room, but they viewed it as a great adventure. They relate how they managed to work at jobs in their fields while going to school that afforded them the opportunity to move to a bigger apartment on the East Side and travel to Europe and Israel during the summers on student fares.

When Wendy finished her Masters in Nutrition at Hunter, she moved on from being a hospital dietitian to working as a nutritionist for the Health Insurance Plan (HIP) of Greater New York. Upon finishing his doctoral coursework, Hank took a position as an instructor in the Psychology Department of Kean University, then known as Newark State College. This led the couple to move to New Jersey, where Wendy worked as a nutritionist for visiting nurse agencies, providing nutrition counseling to patients in their homes and educational programs in the community, until they both retired last year.

While at Kean, Hank rose in rank from instructor to full professor and managed to balance the seemingly conflicting positions of chair of the Faculty Senate, officer of the faculty union and special assistant to the President. He also was the founding director of Kean's Human Rights Institute. Upon his retirement, Kean's Board of Trustees conferred upon him the title of Professor Emeritus and named the award presented annually to a prominent human rights activist at the Kean International Human Rights Conference in Hank's name.

When they moved to New Jersey and started their family forty years ago, the couple bought a house in Union, because Solomon Schechter Day School was located in that town, and it had two vibrant Conserva-

tive synagogues. They quickly became active members of Congregation Beth Shalom with Wendy co-chairing the Annual Dinner Dance and Hank becoming the President. Time slowly changed the demographics of Union and neighboring communities. Even after the synagogue's merger with Congregation Ahavath Achim Bnai Israel of Irvington and its name change to Congregation Bnai Ahavath Shalom (CBAS) the Shul eventually struggled to maintain its Minyans. As the membership receded, Hank and Wendy took on more responsibility to keep their beloved synagogue functioning. Wendy became responsible for the weekly luncheon Kiddush, and Hank served as unlicensed plumber, electrician, Gabbai and Treasurer.
