he aftermath of Pesach brings yearly programs to our congregation. We celebrate the birth of Israel, commemorate the tragedy of the Holocaust and are reminded of our ongoing responsibility to tikkun olam; fixing the world.

Our Yom Hashoah service forms the ethical foundation for these programs. We are reminded with all the ongoing tragedies in the world today, the Holocaust remains the one event where "not all victims were Jews, but all Jews were victims." To hear



the love testimony of a survivor is an experience that by the passage of time has become all the more precious – and serves as a constant motivator for us to heal the world.

As the tradition teaches, "it is not for us to complete the task, but we are not allowed to turn away from it." Being a part of the chain of tradition allows us to be part of a whole that spans most of civilized history and encourages us to do our part in making the world a better place.

These are the major reasons behind our yearly pilgrimage to Appalachia. Our annual trip will take place in early June. If you are interested in a no expenses paid trip that may change your life (and will certainly change the lives of those we work with) you have only to let us know and we will take you to a place few have ever seen.

Reb Zusya of Talmudic fame once taught, "When I die and go before the heavenly throne, I will not be asked why I was not like Moses or Abraham. For those questions I would have a ready answer. No, but I will be asked 'why were you not like Zusya' (why did you not do what YOU were capable of doing? Why did you not reach for your own personal potential?' and for that, I will not have an answer."

The answers are before you. I look forward to seeing you soon.



MUSICAL NOTES

usic is one of the greatest gifts given to humanity. The Torah speaks of Yuval, "the father of all who play the lyre and the pipe" (Genesis 4:21), and the book of Psalms concludes with a stirring call to praise God with harp and lyre, drum and dance. Without Jewish music, it would be impossible to experience the serenity of Shabbat, the silliness of Purim, the pathos of Kol Nidrei, or the joy of Simchat Torah. Through music we can express the greatest praise and thanksgiving to God.



I believe that we have all experienced the power of music at some point in our lives. Particularly in Jewish prayer, where music has always played an important role, I've heard many people comment that it is often the melodies of the prayers or singing together as a community which uplifts them, inspires them, or strengthens their connection to G-d and to their Jewish heritage. But this is more complex than it seems, because not all types of music speak to everybody, and when the familiar melodies are changed, some people feel uncomfortable and distanced from the prayers. One of my primary tasks as a Cantor is to transmit a part of our Jewish heritage through the medium of music but also to create a deeper spiritual prayer experience through singing!

We are blessed to have a new tradition at CBI in the spring and summer, where on several Shabbatot, we begin our Kabbalat Shabbat services at an earlier time on Friday evening so that we can enjoy musical accompaniment for the services provided by our own CBI volunteer band. These instrumentally enhanced services have been very well received by many and the ruach (spirit) of the service is truly uplifting! I have always found the Kabbalat Shabbat service to be one of the most beautiful and spiritual services of the entire year. This service, which consists of six Psalms, the hymn "Lecha Dodi" and two more Psalms, is of relatively recent origin. It was introduced by the Kabbalistic scholars of Tzfat during the middle of the sixteenth century. These mystics created a liturgy for greeting the Sabbath with the sovereignty of God as its theme. Most of the Psalms included refer to singing to God and rejoicing. Two of the Psalms, (96 and 98), begin with the phrase Shiru l'Adonai shir chadash--Sing unto God a new song. To me, the challenge is just as much about reinvigorating our old melodies so that they feel new each time we chant them as it is about finding new ways to sing praises to God.

We look forward once again to holding three instrumentally enhanced Kabbalat Shabbat services this spring and summer, featuring the CBI volunteer band. The first service will be on May 20th at 7:00 PM, please note the earlier start time. ALSO, THERE WILL NOT BE AN ADDITIONAL LATER SERVICE THAT EVENING. Hold June 10th for the next Kabbalat Shabbat service with the band and a July date will be announced soon.

I encourage all of you to make every effort to join us in welcoming Shabbat through a spiritual and spirited Friday night experience in which children of all ages are welcome to attend. Let us lift our voices together in singing a new song unto God.

In Their Own Words

Our synagogue remembers...a Holocaust commemoration program in conjunction with The Blue Card Fund.

We are honored to have as our speaker Eva Deutsch Costabel.

Eva was born in Yugoslavia to a Viennese family. In 1941, her father Arnold Deutsch was arrested by the Ustashe, Yugoslav Nazis. He was later murdered in gas chamber of Treblinka concentration camp in Poland. Eva's remaining family fled Zagreb in 1941 to Adriatic Coast, occupied by the Italian army. Eva was imprisoned in two Italian concentration camps. Kralievica and Rab. After the Italian capitulation in 1943 she joined the resistance against the Nazis, worked as an army nurse and later as a staff artist on a Yugoslav Resistance newspaper in the mountains of Yugoslavia.



Gary Rosenblatt has been editor and publisher of <u>The Jewish Week of New York</u>, the largest Jewish newspaper in America, since the summer of 1993. Prior to that he was editor of the Baltimore Jewish Times for 19 years.

Rosenblatt has won numerous journalism awards from both the Jewish and secular press for his writing, and was a finalist for a Pulitzer Prize in 1985 – the first time an article in the Jewish media was cited in the competition. His series of articles in 2000 on a rabbi accused of abusing teenagers for three decades won several national awards and has been cited as a landmark in Jewish investigative reporting.

Rosenblatt is founder of several Jewish Week projects, including: The Conversation, an annual retreat for American Jewish leaders and emerging leaders; Fresh Ink, a webzine written for and by high school students; The Jewish Week Investigative Journalism Fund; and Write On For Israel, an engagement and educational program – through journalism – for high school students. A collection from 20 years of his weekly column, Between The Lines: A Reflections on the American Jewish Experience, was published in 2013.

Yom Hashoah Light Candles Wednesday May 4th/ CBI Program Thursday May 5, 7:30 p.m.

Please check your mail for a small box containing a memorial yellow candle for Yom Hashoah which begins on the evening of May 4th and goes through the day May 5th. With delivery of these candles, we are offering the CBI community the opportunity to make a donation upon receipt of the candle. This is consistent with the Jewish tradition of giving tzedakah in memory of a departed person at the time of the yahrzeit (the anniversary of the individual's death). Please consider a donation of \$18 (or multiple of) since this is the numerical equivalent of the Hebrew word chai, or "life"). All funds raised above the cost of this program will be used for CBI Holocaust programs and related activities. So light your candles on the evening Wednesday May 4th. If you would like to wait and bring them to our CBI Yom Hashoah Memorial, you may do so and light them there on Thursday May 5 at 7:30 p.m..

Hoopoe Awakening

So I had an awakening in shul a few weeks ago. I thought I had heard the word "Dookey Pot" read from the bima in the middle of the parsha. Can you imagine? Of course I had to flip ahead in the Chumash



in parsha Shmini to the page we were actually on to find the meaning of this amazing word. Re-reading the text in Vayikra 11:19, I saw that the word is actually pronounced "doochiphat" and is the name of a bird called the Hoopoe, a bird not to be eaten by a Jew, because of its detestability. Now "Hoopoe" is not a Hebrew name for the bird, even though "hoo poe" means "he is here." Hoopoe is just the Old English name based on the sound of the bird's call.

This discovery of the word "doochiphat" became even more of a transformative experience for me after shul. Later that day, definitely after Shabbat, I did a Google search on my new friend, the Hoopoe, and I found that this bird, noted for its detestability in the Torah, is actually the elected National Bird of the Jewish People! Apparently 155,000 people voted in an election in Israel in 2008. The vote wasn't even close. The Hoopoe brought in 35% of the vote, and the runner up bird 10%. At that moment, I was so

proud of the fact that there was actually an election in Israel that didn't create division and derision, but rather created unity throughout Am Yisrael.

So here's how the voting, went down. A public committee with representatives from the academic world, government ministries, writers and schoolchildren's representatives determined 25 percent of the vote. The rest of the vote was determined through a combination of public voting through the internet, voting by 70,000 children in the nation's schools, and thousands of soldiers who voted at their bases and through text messages. Votes were also cast by 20 Knesset members and Israeli diplomats in 40 cities worldwide.

The hoopoe received 35 percent of the vote, trailed by the tiny warbler (pashosh) with 10.3 percent and the finch (chochit) with 9.8 percent. The honey-sucker (tzufit), spurwinged plover (siksak), bulbul (bulbul), griffon vulture (nesher) and red falcon (baz adom) each received about 7 percent of the vote, the night owl (tinshemet) got 4.8 percent and the kingfisher (shaldag) barely flew in, with just 3.5 percent.

For the next bird election, we will have to ask ourselves, are the birds better off now than they were 8 years ago? Here's the White Speckled Bulbul, after hearing of the election results back in 2008.



Surely the next bird election will be on Twitter, #DookeyPot to vote for the Hoopoe. I realized that since nature was able to bring the Jewish People closer together in Israel, nature should take a bigger role in our Men's Club activities here at CBI.

So, my fellow lovers of nature, Hoopoes, and White Speckled Bulbuls, today I announce that Men's Club will take bold steps into the woods. 



ISRAEL AFFAIRS

2017 AIPAC Policy Conference March 28-30, 2017

While over 40 people joined the CBI delegation to the 2016 AIPAC Policy Conference held last month in Washington, DC, you will not see everyone in the picture included here.

This demonstrates one of the many strengths of the Policy Conference. There are so many interesting and compelling options, including breakout sessions and special presentations, that it is nearly impossible to get everyone to stop what they are doing to take a group picture. Maybe next year we can encourage our delegates to take more of their own pictures.

While you may have read about this year's Conference in the national press, if you did, your impression of the conference was probably a little out of focus. Because while the excitement centered on the four Presidential candidates who spoke in person, there were other presentations more focused on the wonder which is Israel. There were presentations explaining some of the extraordinary work performed by Israelis to make this a better world. Among the programs described are:

<u>Tikkun Olam Makers (TOM)</u> a program which allows people of talent to solve the problems of individuals with disabilities, like creating special musical instruments that can be played by a person whose condition makes playing regular instruments impossible, or creating a mechanism to fold a woman's wheelchair and place it in the trunk of a taxi.

<u>Softwheel</u> A company reinvented the wheel to make the ride in a wheelchair more comfortable. They created "inwheel suspension" to improve the ride. As a side benefit, the wheelchair user can even ride over rough terrain. Ultimately, they have developed wheels for bicycles, and are looking at automobiles as well.

<u>IsraAID</u> Arab and Jewish medical professionals working in Israel, Jordan, Northern Iraq, Croatia and Germany to help Syrian refugees.

<u>Sulamot</u> This is an initiative of the Israel Philharmonic and Tel Aviv University to bring orchestral music to the most disadvantaged children living within Israel. The program serves 1200 children playing in 18 orchestras spread throughout Israel. As one of the sociologists involved in the program said, "As they play more, the rate of aggression is

reduced, and the rate of happiness increases." The program serves all children: "Arabs, Jews, Christians, Jehovah's Witnesses, new immigrants, veteran immigrants, students who speak Hebrew, and students who do not know a word of Hebrew."

Each of these programs, and many others are highlighted on the video section on the AIPAC website. I encourage you to visit AIPAC.org and click on Policy Conference and then Videos and Transcripts. If you have difficulty, give me a call, and I will help you see these wonderful videos.

Among the CBI contingent at the Policy Conference were Brett Cohen and his son Koby. After the conference, they collaborated on this description of Koby's reaction to the conference:

1) What made you interested in attending the annual AIPAC Policy Conference this month in Washington DC?

I was most interested in going this year once I found out that the presidential candidates would be speaking. I also know that it is a challenging time for Israel, and I was interested in learning what I could do to help Israel and its people.

2) What aspect(s) of the conference did you find most interesting?

For me, having a chance to listen to the political candidates live was probably the highlight. I also found the various smaller breakout sessions that I attended to be extremely interesting. I got to listen to political consultants discuss how they see the election playing out. I also got to understand the current state of affairs in terms of Israeli-Palestinian relations from leading experts and attended a session where I learned about various environmental challenges faced by Israel and what they are doing about it.

3) What surprised you the most about the Conference?

I was extremely surprised when I saw the number of people who attended Policy Conference (over 18,000!) and who all deeply cared about Israel. The Conference was so big this year that the main events had to be held in the Verizon Center, where the Washington Wizards play.

4) Many Israeli technology innovations were showcased during the conference as well as incredible humanitarian programs that Israelis are engaged in. What was your favorite and why?

There were several very cool Israeli technologies showcased. The one that I was most impressed with was a company called "SoftWheel" that has literally reinvented

the wheel. I neir patented wheel includes shock absorbers built into the wheel itself instead of spokes. The SoftWheel allows a wheelchair user to navigate painlessly down stairs, off curbs and on almost any terrain. They also now make bicycles that use the SoftWheel and unveiled a very cool concept car with the new wheel during the Conference.

5) AIPAC does a significant amount of outreach to leaders on various college campuses throughout the country, as well as to many other non-Jews such as its outreach programs to Latino and African American community leaders. Did it surprise you how many non-Jews were actively engaged in pro-Israel advocacy?

It was very special to see that as a Pro-Israel kid, I was not alone. The number of Christians and other religions who also cared about Israel made me feel great. The reason is because it showed that we Jews are not alone in valuing and preserving the State of Israel. I was also surprised to learn that approximately 4,000 college and high school students from schools all over the country were in attendance and that many of them were non-Jews.

6) Would you recommend others your age attend Policy Conference next year?

AIPAC's Policy Conference has many extraordinary values and different aspects which make it extremely appealing. Although next year there will not be an election, defending the State of Israel always requires understanding the issues and latest challenges it faces. It also requires making our voices heard to the leaders of our Country.

Upcoming Israeli Film

CBI's Israel movie program has lost its chairperson, so please let me know if you are interested in helping manage this program for next year. There is only one film left for this year and I hope you will attend.

May 15: *Ajami* – Ajami is the name of a neighborhood of Tel Aviv with Muslim and Christian Arabs. This movie tells five different stories of residents of this community

The movie will begin at 7 p.m., and have a short intermission for minyan at about 8 p.m. Light snacks will be served.

The Israel Day Parade

The Salute to Israel Parade up Fifth Avenue will be held on June 5 this year. We are hoping to fill a bus with CBI congregants. This year, our delegation will be led by Dan Dovdavany. Look for the registration form in this Bulletin.

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
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
