# FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

here is an old Rabbinic tale of Hillel and Shammai, the rabbinic leaders of their generation. A would-be convert comes to Shammai and offers to "convert to Judaism if you can teach me the entire Torah while standing on one foot." Shammai kicks him out of the room. The same person approaches Hillel with the same offer. Hillel's answer is, "What is hateful to you do not do to others. All else is commentary. Go and learn."



This paradigmatic story is used to illustrate the

greatness of Hillel. In his generation Roman persecution reached new heights. Hillel included anyone who wanted to be a part of the community to better sustain it. Shammai is seen as a curmudgeon; excluding and thereby limiting community.

The irony of our reaction is that Shammai was right and Hillel was wrong. What kind of "Chutzpah" does it take for a person to offer conversion under those circumstances? The only rabbis I know of today who would take that offer charge thousands of dollars for a penny-ante conversion which isn't worth the toner used in printing the certificate. Of what use would this person be?

In point of fact we want to be like Hillel - but we act like Shammai. We want to be inclusive but the majority of the Jewish community is more comfortable with Shammai. Change is challenging. New people coming into our community tend to come to services earlier and sit in our seats. They are not interested in the old feuds that sometimes dominate congregational interactions. They have new ideas and methods. Clergy and congregational leadership, used to their own intrinsic dynamic can be easily put off by this fresh air and mark their territory in uncomfortable ways.

The story is also a cautionary tale for those who practice inclusion as well. It's not by accident that the convert offers a deal that is at heart, disrespectful at best. He is mocking the tradition by suggesting that it can be encapsulated in just a few seconds. If that's all there is, why be Jewish. In similar circumstance would we be inclusive to someone equally mocking, equally obnoxious? Would we include a sincere Messianic Jew? Would we count a felon in a minyan? Would you allow a known wife beater to have an honor.

Shammai was Hillel's contemporary. He too faced Roman persecution. His response was to restrict entrance into the community so that its values and practices remained constant. Can we say he was wrong?

I believe that the key to the story is Hillel's message. "What is hateful to you, don't do." Inclusion and exclusion are byproducts of "ahavat Yisrael," love of Israel. If you truly act out of love and compassion, you will know when to include and what lines must be drawn to keep the constantly changing community safe. The highest purpose to which anyone can aspire is to be the guide in this endeavor.

# **MUSICAL NOTES** By Cantor Lorna Wallach

nce again, it's the season of lights! Light, whether in its physical or spiritual manifestation, is a significant symbol in Jewish tradition all through the year. The Torah states that G-d made light on the first day of Creation, thus preparing the potential for everything else that was to be created. At the end of Psalm 97 is the familiar verse, "Or Zarua Latzadik..." "Light is sown for the righteous..." We light candles to usher in Shabbat and Festivals, and we light a special candle for Havdalah



at the conclusion of Shabbat. Also, on the observance of the anniversary of a family member's death a Yahrtzeit candle is lit which is to burn for 24 hours.

During Chanukah, the most important holiday ritual is the lighting of the Chanukiyah (menorah) on each of the eight nights with the recitation of specified blessings. There are laws on how and when to light the candles and what their function should be. Unlike the Shabbat candles, which may be used for illumination, the Chanukah candles are kindled for the purpose of publicizing the miracle of the holiday and they should not be used for anything else. All year long we are looking at what we see using the light, but on Chanukah we are to focus on seeing the light itself. We are to fill our eyes with the light of Chanukah so that when Chanukah is over, we will continue to see our lives in this special light. What is special about the light of Chanukah?

The light of Chanukah is different than the light of the sun; it's the light beyond nature. It's the light of miracles. And what does the world look like in the light of miracles? The world looks like a miracle. In the light of nature nothing is new, but in the light of miracles everything is new and novel. We fill our eyes with the light of Chanukah for eight days, so that when the holiday is over, we see that everything is a miracle, we see that even nature is actually a miracle.

Albert Einstein once said: "There are two ways of looking at the world either you see nothing as a miracle or you see everything as a miracle."

The Jewish view is to see everything as a miracle. The Greeks, on the other hand, saw nothing as a miracle. To the Greeks, a miracle was an absurdity. To them, only what is reasonable, logical, and rational could be real. Miracles are illogical and therefore not possible. The Greeks assumed that the world was perfect already and everything was as it should be. But according to Jewish belief, G-d created the world, G-d cares about people, and G-d invites us to be partners in making history and perfecting the world.

This is why we light candles on Chanukah and bring the light of Chanukah - the light of miracles - into our lives every year. It is a celebration of hope and miracles.

As we kindle the lights of Chanukah this year, let us appreciate the miracles around us, and think about rededicating ourselves as G-d's partners in Tikkun Olam (perfecting the world). Then each one of us will help to make the world a brighter place..

I have been working with the BBRS board for the past several months and we are excited to announce that we are in the process of changing the schedule and offerings for BBRS for the school year 2017-2018, 5778.



We will be consolidating the days of the week in which our students come so

that there no longer will be classes for Kitot Gimel, Dalet and Hey on Tuesdays. Instead they will come on Thursdays at the same time as Kitot Vav and Zayin. This should help parents with carpools and not having their children here on different days.

The part that is most exciting is that Tuesdays will now be a special enrichment day. We will have a variety of electives, which will be open to students in all grades to enhance their connection to Judaism through language, movement and culture.

The electives will include a children's choir, which will perform at our Shir Shabbat services once a month, Krav
