FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

everal years ago I went to visit one of my daughters in Israel. She was attending a summer program and had one Shabbat free in Jerusalem. Friday afternoon several families took their daughters to Ben Yehuda Street to prepare for Shabbat. Friday afternoon on Ben Yehuda Street is an experience not to be missed. In the summer you might meet friends from your hometown, your rabbi or see different groups of Hasidim congregating and preparing for Shabbat.



As a group we were beset by beggars asking for money. Some would give a few "shek" (or "shekel" worth about 25 cents at the time) or like me, they would turn away. One young American male, dressed in Chasidic garb, persisted. I finally asked him, "Why are you asking for money?" He answered, "I have nothing to eat for Shabbat."

Immediately that changed the entire dynamic. According to Jewish law when a person specifically asks for food, their needs must be met. I told him that I would not give him money but would buy him three meals for Shabbat. He left, to return ten minutes later with his roommate. To the consternation of the other families and the utter surprise of these two boys, I took them to the nearest "take out place" and bought them three meals for Shabbat.

When they were about to leave, laden with their food (and beer), one asked me why I spent so much money on them. I told him that since he has asked for food I was not allowed to refuse. He had never heard of that law, and asked me to educate him.

I replied, "I am a Conservative Rabbi, I know that you will not accept Jewish law from me."

He answered, "But you know the laws of Tzedakah."

I smiled and said, "Now I know the Mashiach is near, when a Bratslaver Hasid asks a Conservative Rabbi to teach him Jewish law, can the Mashiach be far away?"

Our tradition downplays the importance of intention in favor of action. You are judged by what you do, not what you intend to do. There are exceptions to this rule, one of them is Tzedakah. At first glance Tzedakah seems simple: someone gives money to someone else. However Tzedakah is not only what you give, but how you give it as well.

The Messianic age will not arrive until we understand this lesson.

MUSICAL NOTES By Cantor Lorna Wallach

here does your mind take you when you hear music? Are some melodies more emotive than others? Each of us, no doubt, has songs strongly associated with our memories and feelings. For many of us, this is true of Jewish music, too! Does your heart swell with pride when you hear *Hatikvah*? Or when the *Hava Nagila* melody is amplified at a ball game? Can you close your eyes and actually see the golden glow of the Kotel when you hear the poetic words of Naomi



Shemer's song, *Yerushalayim Shel Zahav*? Even if you never lived in "Anatevka", do you feel as though you are in that town when you hear "Sunrise, Sunset"?

The music of our liturgy can also evoke memories and emotions. Singing Shalom Rav together on Friday night helps us to leave the stress of the week behind us and experience the serenity of Shabbat. Hearing just the first few notes of the Kol Nidrei melody is enough for some of us to feel transported and in the moment of such a solemn Jewish Holy Day. I believe that we have all experienced the power of music at some point in our lives. Particularly in Jewish prayer, where music has always played an important role, I've heard many people comment that it is often the melodies of the prayers or singing together as a community which uplifts them, inspires them, or strengthens their connection to G-d and to their Jewish heritage. In the words of Goethe, "Religious worship cannot do without music. It is one of the foremost means to work upon man with an effect of marvel." This is the power of music and of songs. It is universal. Rabbi Sampson Raphael Hirsch defines song as "an inspired or rapturous expression of what some external event has revealed to the inner self, that which the physical eye cannot see, but what has become clear to the mind's eye."

There are few songs mentioned in the Torah. Even the word *shir* is found quite infrequently. This month we celebrate *Shabbat Shirah* (and it's Men's Club Shabbat this year -- for the first time!) because we read *Shirat HaYam* in the Torah (in Parashat Beshallach) and the Song of Deborah (Judges 5) in the Haftarah. *Shirat HaYam*, The Song of the Sea, is the first example recorded in the Torah of communal spontaneous prayers by the Jewish people. The Israelites have safely escaped the Egyptian army, and are free on the other side of the now chariot full Red Sea. And they look at Moses, and up to God, and declare their belief in God's power, and in Moses's ability to advocate on their behalf. And they were all so ecstatic that they began to sing. First Moses and the men, and then Miriam and the women.

Music has the power to move us, even without words. Sometimes we are most comfortable with the emotional rush of familiar music, and sometimes it is just as thrilling to learn a new tune, open ourselves up to the possibility of a new memory. As our community celebrates this *Shabbat Shirah*, led by our very capable and enthusiastic CBI Men's Club, let us lift our voices in prayer with the exultant spirit of song.

This month the Library reviews My Name is Asher Lev by Chaim Potok, which you all better appreciate because I read this book at great personal sacrifice, namely by almost crying in the parking lot while I tried to read and walk home at the same time.

* *

"It's not a pretty world, Papa." "I've noticed," my father said softly."

Our story begins when Asher is a child, already with his precocious gift for drawing and the belief that somehow he can use it to make the world better. It takes us with a slow, thorough buildup through his Jewish upbringing, his shy childhood and the tension in his family, through his teenage years apprenticed to another Jewish artist and his time becoming an adult and artist in his own right. It's not about plot, it's about character development, family development. By the end of the book you can't believe how well you know this boy, now this man, and the fragile, fractured world he inhabits.

There's Rivkeh, Asher's soft, strong mother, caught between him and his father.

Aryeh, his father, whose drive to help Jews all over the world helps drive his family apart.

Jacob Khan, a grouchy, eccentric Holocaust survivor who loves Asher as a son.


And Asher himself, who wants desperately to support his mother, honor his father, and hold tight to his Jewishness, but cannot resist the pull of his own gift... even when it seems it will destroy the people he loves most.

Richly emotional and insightful, this is a book worth every moment of reading.


USY has allowed me to enhance my Jewish identity by





A Comment on Current Events, With a Look Back to History

In December 2016, the United Nations Security Council passed a resolution which had the stated objective of "achieving without delay a comprehensive, just and lasting peace in the Middle East." However, the focus of the resolution is generally on the relationship

between Israel and its settlements. The resolution "reaffirms that the establishment by Israel of settlements in the Palestinian territory occupied since 1967, including East Jerusalem, has no legal validity. Furthermore, it condemns "all measures aimed at altering the demographic composition, character and status of the Palestinian Territory occupied since 1967, including East Jerusalem.

While many Israelis, and many American Jews differ on the appropriate status of Israelis living in areas beyond the 1967 lines (the 1948 cease fire lines), the resolution's treatment of Jerusalem is startling. Following the 1948 war, when Jordan ended up in control of the Eastern portion of Jerusalem, she systematically evicted all Jews. Thus, the demographic composition of eastern Jerusalem was free of Jews. How can the United Nations endorse such a treatment? "East Jerusalem" includes the Jewish Quarter of the Old City as well as the Kotel, and the Temple Mount, the site of both temples in Jerusalem.

It was ironic (or symbolic) that this resolution was approved Erev Chanukah. One possible response to this resolution can be found in the Book of the Maccabees (not part of the Tanach) when Shimon Maccabee says:

> "It is not foreign land we have taken nor have we seized the property of others, but only our ancestral heritage which for a time had been unjustly held by our enemies. Now that we have the opportunity, we are holding on to the heritage of our ancestors."

Finally, Security Council resolution 242 foresaw "land for peace" in which Israel withdrew from negotiated territories in exchange for their "right to live in peace within secure and recognized boundaries free from threats or acts of force." This new resolution puts a heavy hand on the scale by its statement that any Israeli activity in disputed areas (including East Jerusalem) is illegal and must be stopped. If Israel has no rights to these lands, how can they be the basis for negotiation.

I encourage you to read the relevant documents and to stay current on news which affects the status of Israel in the world.

2017 Trips to Israel

May, 2017 is the 50th anniversary of the reunification of Jerusalem, and many organizations are sponsoring trips for people who would like to participate in celebrations of this milestone. I saw

on-line that JNF has several trips, and Federation of Greater Metrowest also is sponsoring a trip. The trips take place the last week in May, just before Shavuot.
