#### FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

assover is most of all a holiday of symbols. On one level, we find ourselves anticipating Passover and the Seders because Passover is, according to demographers, the time when most Jewish families gather together. On another level, we celebrate Passover because it is a Mitzvah, one of the most extraordinary and important Mitzvot in our tradition. Yet, there is another level to Passover, one that supercedes the beauty of the table or the enjoyment of finding the afikoman. Passover is



serious business. We are commanded to tell our children the story of our people. While the word "continuity" has been bruised and misused these last several years, it is important to remember that Passover is a holy day commanding us to secure the future of our people by recounting our past.

It is a holiday of renewal. It celebrates the birth of spring which coincides with the renewal of the Jewish people.

The Haggadah was developed between the years 200 - 500 CE. Although some portions predate the Hasmonean dynasty (Maccabbees) of 150 BCE. Much of the Haggadah is incorporated in the Mishna which was compiled in 200CE.

According to the Torah, Passover was to be celebrated for 7 days. The first day and the last were considered Yom Tov. In the diaspora, the Jews added another day to the celebration and commemorated the first and last two days as Yom Tov. As the calendar was intercalated from Ierusalem and the intercalation of the calendar was announced on the first of every month, the news of the start of each month did not always reach the outlying areas of Jewish population in time for them to prepare for the holy days. Thus adding one extra day guaranteed that the correct 7 days would be observed.

But no matter how you celebrate the holiday, no matter how strict or lenient your observance, Ginny and I wish you all a happy zeisen (sweet) Pesach.

### **MUSICAL NOTES**

#### Passover L'Shana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim

hen I recited the phrase, "L"Shana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim" (Next year in Jerusalem) at the conclusion of last year's Seder, it took on a whole different meaning for me. Having my children in high school at Golda Och Academy, I have known for a while that in 2017, Shira would be with her 12th grade classmates on the Neshama program,



spending 3 months traveling in Israel, and that Mike, Josh and I would be going to visit her in Israel for Passover this year! I am beyond excited for this upcoming trip and very grateful to CBI and to Rabbi Bayar for enabling me to be able to spend Pesach in Israel this year together with my daughter.

What is the origin and significance of reciting the phrase L'Shana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim at the end of every Passover Seder? The phrase became part of the Haggadah in the Middle Ages and it is connected to the theme of redemption. At the Seder, each of us is supposed to feel as though we personally experienced the physical redemption at the Red Sea. As the Haggadah says, "For it was not our forefathers alone whom the Holy One redeemed; G-d redeemed us, too, with them," and, "In every generation, every individual must feel as if he or she personally had come out of Egypt." Then as we end the Seder, we utter this phrase that reaches forward to the coming of the Messiah and to complete spiritual redemption, represented by Jerusalem. In this interpretation, Jerusalem refers to the actual city, with reference to its Temple being rebuilt when the Messiah comes.

While many Jews have no issues expressing a longing for the Messiah at the conclusion of the Seder, there are Jews for whom this concept doesn't resonate. And how about the Jews who recite this phrase who are already somewhere in Israel, or especially in Jerusalem for their Seder? Perhaps one can use a less literal interpretation of the phrase to make it more meaningful and relevant. There is a Midrash based on verse 3 of Psalm 122, "Jerusalem built as a city that is knit (or connected) together," which the Rabbis suggested meant that there are two Jerusalems. *Yerushalayim Shel Matah* is the earthly Jerusalem, which has been ravaged for centuries by war and strife, and *Yerushalayim Shel Ma'alah*, the upper Jerusalem—a heavenly version relieved of the contradictions of human life. This is the ideal to which the earthly Jerusalem aspires – the Jerusalem that represents a sense of holiness and of hope.

The words "next year" give us the sense of possibility and potential – that things don't have to stay the way they are. We can take action to bring about change in our lives, in our communities and in the world. In a commentary on Elijah's cup, Rabbi David Hartman, in *The Leader's Guide to the Family Participation Haggadah: A Different Night*, suggests that Elijah's Cup is the cup of hope. "Passover is the night for reckless dreams; for visions about what a human being can be, what society can be, what people can be, what history may become. That is the significance of *L'Shana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim* (Next year in Jerusalem)."

I wish all of you a Hag Pesach Same'ach. May your Pesach celebration be filled with joy, meaning and hope!

Another new book just out this year is by the much more established Abigail Pogrebin, "My Jewish Year: 18 Holidays, One Wondering Jew", which documents her immersive, highly personal exploration of the Jewish calendar. Her writing on

Purim describes Esther's role as a leader who "thrust forward" even when it wasn't her plan. Abigail continues to ask, "Can you do your part to guide a place that has challenged and changed you?"

When I reflect during this season of nominations for our next board and budgets for our next year, I think about the times language and leadership issues have impacted my work as president of this amazing community of invested members for the last three years. I think about the times I have had to put on a different set of ears to hear what people are saying, when I have had to "thrust forward" though uncomfortable, when I have had to decide the greater good for all was more important than what I personally believed, and that I now hope, in the end of my days as President this June, I can feel like my own words will be heard.

David and I wish you all a very happy Passover – with family, with your own traditions that anchor you, and with your thoughts of listening and leadership.

This is a late announcement, but we have an award to celebrate! And no, this isn't yet more about the Oscars award mix up.

The National Jewish Book Awards finalists and winners were announced in February. Among the many books that I unfortunately have not read, there was one particularly exciting title that I have — Anna and the Swallow Man by Gavriel



Savit, winner of the Goldberg Prize for best debut fiction.

It's easy to see why *Swallow Man* has made such an impression. The book begins in 1939, the setting is war-torn Europe, and the subject a young girl named Anna.

Orphaned and alone when her father is taken by the Germans along with other Polish intellectuals, Anna latches onto the first person to show her kindness: the unnamed Swallow Man, who speaks every language Anna does, and more — including the language of birds. Anna and the Swallow Man travel far and wide, evading German and Russian soldiers and deceiving fellow travelers to survive; the beautiful writing doesn't glaze over the horrors they go around or through. Anna grows up quickly, surrounded by the Swallow Man's lies and the lies she herself has learned to tell. But the danger is not only in enemy soldiers — it's in the Swallow Man as well.

Gavriel Savit also happens to be Andrea and David Hirschfeld's nephew, and the Sisterhood gift shop sells copies of the now award-winning book. The library will acquire a copy as well.

# **Blanche Bayer Religious School (BBRS)**

I was recently accepted to be a Fellow at CLAL's Rabbis Without Borders Program. I join with Rabbi Bayar and Rabbi Ettinger and just about 200 other rabbis in the country in this exciting program. I thought I would share with you the essay that I wrote for the application in the hopes that it might spark conversation. I hope that you



will consider calling, emailing, meeting me for coffee or chatting at Kiddush about these ideas.

I just finished reading Jonathan Safran Foer's newest novel, Here I Am. Essentially, the book explores midlife crisis through the lens of one American Jewish man's experience and connection to his eldest son's bar mitzvah, an earthquake/war in Israel, his Holocaust surviving grandfather's death, divorce and a dying dog. As I was reading, I kept thinking to myself, this man is thinking what everyone else is thinking, but almost no one is saying out loud. He's having an existential Jewish identity crisis that is a metaphor for an entire generation of American Jews who hate the question: "Are you religious?"

"Jacob never knew the answer to the question, 'Are you religious?'

He'd never not belonged to a synagogue, never not made some gesture toward kashruth, never not assumed – not even in his moments of greatest frustration with Israel, or his father, or American Jewry, or God's absence – that he would raise his children with some degree of Jewish literacy and practice. But, double negatives never sustained a religion. Or as Sam's brother Max would put it in his bar mitzvah speech three years later, 'You only get to keep what you refuse to let go of.' And as much as Jacob wanted the continuity (of history, culture, thought, and values), as much as he wanted to believe that there was a deeper meaning available not only to him but to his children and their children – light shone between his fingers."

For the past 12 years, I have worked as an educator, primarily with elementary school aged children and their

families. It's what I do, and will probably do for the foreseeable future. When I talk with my students about Shabbat, or holiday observance, or their connection to the Jewish past, I have noticed that over the years, those things have had less and less resonance with the children. Even though they are enrolled in Hebrew school, they and their parents are generally not steeped in a general knowledge of Jewish literacy and practice. Shabbat dinner can mean a time when they each say something nice about another person in their family, while I want them to know the beauty of what could be added through ritual: candles, wine and challah. Israel is a geographic place, but it does not necessarily evoke a feeling of connection, as it did in the very recent past. I want my students to think of Israel as more than a place on a map; I want them to share my deep sense of connection and love for Israel. And God's presence or absence is really hard to talk about with my students. It's not really in their consciousness and I want to find a way to nurture in them a spiritual connection, a love of liturgy and a deeper appreciation for the power of prayer.

And so I think, the most creative thing I need to do is to learn to help myself, and others to want to seek the deeper meanings in Judaism – so that we can figure out what we refuse to let go of. When my congregants say "We're not religious," I want to be able to say "Who cares?" And then I want to help them, and me, to form a community based on the continuity that Foer writes about: Jewish history, culture, thought and values. And if we are lucky, perhaps based in faith, and a deference to commandedness and halachic process, even if that becomes one of the things that we can let go of.

So, what's left: The question of what it means to be Jewish? And if I'm going to be a rabbi for the rest of my life, I think that creatively finding answers to this question with my community and beyond is my imperative.




