FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

ears ago there was an incident at Meah Shearim, the ultra orthodox community in Jerusalem. There was an attaché case that when opened was found to be a bomb. A chasid found it and disarmed it.



Here is the rest of the story. One morning a lady noticed a guy throwing an attaché case in the garbage.

She thought this man stole the case from someone in the neighborhood and it probably had his tallis and tefilin in it. She saw her brother in law who was fixing his car. She called out to him, "go get the bag out of the garbage

He opens the bag and finds a cellphone and a bunch of wires. He realized it was a bomb and disconnected it. A minute later the phone rang – but no bomb exploded.

How did this chasid living in Meah Shearim know that this was a bomb? How did he know to disconnect it without blowing himself up?

15 years before, 10 chassidim got drafted into the army. The community protested– they were against being conscripted to the Israeli defense forces. The ten families used their connections to arrange this and it worked in 9 cases. One boy was left in the IDF. This was that man. He was only in the army for 6 months. Guess what he learned how to do there? Diffuse bombs.

I wonder what he thought 15 years before when he was required to go into the IDF? Did he think God had abandoned him? And how did he feel when his 14 fellows left but he could not? Did he give up on his beliefs or did he look at his new surroundings as an opportunity for growth which might someday infuse his life with new meaning?

Certainly that day, as he diffused the bomb, drove the lesson home. How often have we looked back and realized that what we thought of as a defeat of our most treasured goals opened a path, actually illuminated our lives, and helped us achieve what we never thought possible. With proper perspective no door is ever completely closed. But to do that we must face forward and move ahead or around the challenges facing us.

The difference between superficial existence and a meaningful life is a matter of perspective. If we demand that our lives stand for something, we are forced to live for the future – for we are continually being challenged to create meaning – and fix the world. If we are content to see only what is in front of us – we perceive only what is superficial. We react to the present and live in the past.

May this New Year bring us challenges we work through to make our lives meaningful as we face the future.

STAY TUNED FOR AN A CAPPELLA MUSICAL SHABBAT ON OCTOBER 26 - 27

his past summer, as I have done for almost every summer since 1990, I enjoyed attending the North American Jewish Choral Festival, sponsored by the Zamir Choral Foundation. This festival is



a 5 day gathering of over 500 people, all of whom share a passion for singing Jewish music (although not all of them are "professional" singers/musicians) and who share the objective of keeping alive the tradition of music in Jewish life and worship. A recent survey conducted on behalf of the Zamir Choral Foundation shows the impact that singing in a Jewish choir can have. There is strong anecdotal evidence that many people, who are not otherwise involved in Jewish life, find their way in through their love of singing. For me, singing in or conducting a Jewish choir is a way to integrate music, Judaism, community and spirituality. I have derived great joy and satisfaction from conducting our own CBI choir, whom you hear each year singing so beautifully on the High Holydays and enhancing our services!

For 10 years (1988 – 1998), I sang with the Zamir Chorale in New York. I didn't even know that this Jewish choir existed until I was in Cantorial School. I always wished that I had had some type of outlet for singing Jewish music, especially with my peers, during my college years, but Jewish *A Cappella* groups had not yet become a presence on college campuses as they are at so many colleges today. Realizing the tremendous positive impact that singing Jewish music together can have in strengthening the Jewish identity of young adults in college, I feel it is critical for the future health and strength of the Jewish community to support the existence of such an extracurricular activity in colleges and to encourage students with an interest in music to get involved in these choirs.

Over the last few years, I have invited several College Jewish A Cappella groups to spend a Shabbat at CBI to share their talent, enthusiasm and their sweet souls with our community! This year, I am excited to welcome **PIZMON** to CBI. Please join us on **Friday night October 26** at a **7:30 PM** service, and **Shabbat morning, Oct. 27** to hear PIZMON, the student-run, co-ed Jewish a cappella group of Columbia University, Barnard College, and The Jewish Theological Seminary of America. As a Jewish pluralistic group, its members come from nearly every Jewish background. In describing who they are on their website, they say that through their identity as Jews and their love of music, the members of Pizmon strive to be role models for Jewish youth and enhance the religious experiences of Jewish communities of all denominations. Since its inception in 1987 as the first collegiate Jewish a cappella group, Pizmon has traveled to hundreds of communities within the United States and around the world to share their love of Jewish music and culture.

The students of Pizmon (including the grandson of CBI members Aliza and Joe Rosenberg) will perform at our service on Friday night (Please note earlier start time!), Shabbat morning and with community singing at Kiddush! These events are open to the entire community (you are welcome to bring your neighbors/ friends who are not members of CBI) and I also hope to see any Barnard/ Columbia/JTS alumni who are at CBI and in our area to show their support!

President's Message By Mariela Dybner, CBI President



L'shana tova u'metuka! I hope and trust that you have had a chance to pause and reflect during the days of awe and have started our new year renewed and refreshed. During my Rosh Hashanah speech (which can be found on the CBI website), I spoke about the Hineni prayer, about how it differs from the rest of the liturgy in its focus on the self rather than the congregation as a whole and about the impact and value of the emphatic "Here I Am." I asked you to take the time to

reflect on yourself, on what's important to you and about how you can effect change for others and spoke of the momentous transition that this year represents for our community.

We are beginning to see and participate in the events that will shape the future for CBI. On October 14, we will be having a congregational meeting during which we will be taking a vote regarding changing the size and composition of our Board of Trustees. After surveying best practices from other congregations and conducting focus groups regarding maximizing efficacy, the Board has made a recommendation to reduce the number of trustees from 18 to 12 over the next three years and to reduce the role of past presidents by including only the immediate past president as an ex officio member and limit lifetime past president participation to only the Executive Committee of the Board. Please try to be in attendance at the Special Congregational Meeting and make an impact by voting in this important election.

By now you should have received a letter from me describing Rabbi

Bayar's time away from the congregation during this transitional year. Our rabbi has deferred this time allotted to him in his long-term contract and will be taking it during this year to explore the opportunities that await him after he has retired from CBI. Cantor Lorna Wallach will be filling much of the clergy role during the rabbi's time away, and will lead the way as we will also be experimenting with new and exciting programs during Shabbat morning services.


We have augmented our Rosh Hashanah celebration with the addition of social spaces both inside and outside the synagogue walls. Our first ever Rosh Roasters Coffee Spot provided congregants with a snack and place to chat when taking a break from services and coming together with friends. The tented outdoor space provided a way for our young families to participate in the Lev Shalem service and still let their children play nearby, if only the weather had been more cooperative!

With an invigorated focus on coming together as a community, as in past years we are hosting various Shabbat dinners throughout the year. Currently, generous donors have come forth to underwrite the cost for our opening Shabbat dinner on September 28, and we are hopeful that others may step forward as well, whether to celebrate a special event with the congregation or as a group just to support this initiative. One of my favorite Jewish commentators of today is Dr. Ron Wolfson, *Fingerhut Professor* of Education, American Jewish University, and founder of "Synagogue 3000", who spends a great deal of time commenting upon the state of "Organized Jewry" and what we as "Jewish Institutions" can do better to engage with our



members and the greater Jewish community.

Every so often, he tackles something "rabbinic" and I find that totally fascinating!

This Rosh HaShanah, while sitting in my home congregation in Aberdeen, I was thumbing through our supplemental handout and came upon this: *"The Seven Questions You're Asked in Heaven: Reviewing and Renewing Your Life on Earth,"* by the very same Dr. Ron Wolfson.

- 1. Were you **honest**? *Na-sa-ta v'na-ta-ta b'emuna*?
- 2. Did you leave a legacy? A-sakta b'friya u-r'vee-ya?
- 3. Did you set aside time to study? *Ka-va-ta ee-teem la-Torah*?
- 4. Did you have **hope** in your heart? *Tzee-pee-ta li-y'shuah*?
- 5. Did you get your **priorities** straight? *Peel-pahl-ta bchoch-ma? Hey-van-ta da-var mee-toch da-var?*
- 6. Did you enjoy this world?
- 7. Were you the **best** you could be?

He says, **look back** on your life so far and answer them honestly.

Now **look forward** and ask yourself, "How can I work towards a <u>yes</u> for all of these other seven questions?"

- How can I be more **honest** in my business, relationships and with myself?
- How can I leave a **legacy** for future generations? How can I become an ancestor and make a difference?
- How can I find time to study?
- How can I cultivate an attitude of hopefulness? How can I replace fear with **hope** and believe that better days are ahead?

- How can I better **prioritize** my time, my efforts and my goals?
- How can I enjoy the beauty and blessings of God's creations?
- How can I **be me** and **fulfill my unique potential**—in my job, with my family, with my friends and in society at large?

As I do each year, I try to find one or two things to work on to make me a better person. Dr. Wolfson's questions are absolutely "food for thought" for me and a foundation upon which I'll build. With HaShem's blessings, each of us will have the year to learn, grow, improve,2 and connect more meaningfully with God and with each other.

CEMETERY PLOTS

Dear Congregants:

The loss of a loved one is always an emotional time. Sometimes those moments are even more challenging when, in addition to bearing the loss, the family is put in the position of scrambling to make decisions about endof-life issues. Pre-purchasing cemetery plots is one of the most thoughtful and considerate gifts you can give to your loved ones, because it relieves them of making one of those difficult decisions within a few short hours of their loved one's death. It also relieves family members of one of the financial burdens associated with one's final arrangements and ensures that family members may be buried next to each other.


In an effort to serve our congregational family, Congregation B'nai Israel offers to our congregants cemetery plots for purchase. These plots are located in a peaceful and beautiful section of Beth Israel Cemetery, a Jewish cemetery located in Woodbridge New Jersey, and are reserved for our community and their extended family members.

In recent years, Congregation B'nai Israel has been able to offer plots where only flat grave markers may be placed. We are pleased to now be able to offer plots where either flat grave markers or headstones may be erected. (Please note that we do not sell the grave markers or headstones themselves). From now until December 31, 2018, we are offering these plots at discounted prices, \$950 for grave marker plots and \$1100 for headstone plots, well below market prices charged directly by the cemetery and at a substantial discount to the price the synagogue has charged for many years. After that date, plots will be sold for \$1250 and \$1400, respectively.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING: SUNDAY, OCT. 14, 11 AM

(continued from cover)

In a survey of like-size Congregations both local and around the country, it has come to light that the size of operating boards has been shrinking over the last two decades. Our Board of Trustees has been becoming larger; we have seven officers, five representatives of the various arms of the synagogue, eighteen trustees, and as many past presidents as choose to attend. This often results in Board meetings of as many as forty people. As a result of the Board's own analysis regarding size, as well as productivity, and discussions conducted over the past year, during its September 4th meeting, a Board motion was passed to call a special meeting of the Congregation for the purpose of voting on the Board's recommendation to amend the Constitution to:

- reduce the number of Trustees from 18-12. This would be accomplished by not filling the expiring terms of two Trustees in each of the next three years; and
- 2) removing the entitlement of past CBI presidents to sit on the Board of Trustees indefinitely after their term as president. Instead, the immediate past president would act ex-officio as a member of the Board of Trustees during the term immediately following his/her term as President. Additionally, all past presidents would sit as members of the Past President's Advisory Council for so long as they are members in good standing of CBI, and such Past President's Advisory Council shall be part of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees.

The motion to take effect January 1, 2019.

The date for the aforementioned meeting is October 14th at 11:00 AM in the Social Hall. There will be a short period prior to the vote for any questions. This recommendation will only pass and take effect if two-thirds of those CBI members in good standing at the meeting on the 14th of October vote to do so. Please plan to attend.

The following are the details of the changes to the constitution:

Whereas, pursuant to Article X of the Constitution of Congregation B'nai Israel of Millburn, New Jersey (the "Constitution"), the Constitution may be altered, amended, or repealed at any annual or special meeting of the membership upon the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members in good standing present at such meeting; and

Whereas, Article X subsection 3 requires any alteration, amendment or repeal must be initiated by the Board or Trustees as a result of its own action duly taken.

Now therefore, it is resolved that the Board of Trustees moves to call a special meeting of the membership, and take any other necessary action in anticipation of, and to effectuate, such meeting, for the purpose of amending:

- 1) Article III, Section 1. of the Constitution to:
 - a. Strike subsection a.(4) in its entirety and replace it with the following: Twelve elected Trustees; and
 - b. Strike subsection a.(1) in its entirety
- 2) Article IV, Section 2.a. of the Constitution to:
 - a. Add a new subsection (6) stating: To act ex-officio as a member of the Board of Trustees during the term immediately following his/her term as President; and
 - b. Add a new subsection (7) stating: To sit as a life-time member of the Past President's Advisory Council
- 3) Article III, Section 4. of the Constitution to:
 - a. Delete the first sentence in its entirety and replace it with the following: There shall be an Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, which shall consist of the Past Presidents' Advisory Council and the elected Officers of the Congregation.

It is further resolved that if the members in good standing vote to approve 1(a) above, such change shall be implemented over a three year period by not replacing the expiring terms of two members of the Board of Trustees in each of three successive years.
