FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

The difference between superficial existence and a meaningful life is a matter of perspective. If we demand that our lives stand for something, we are forced to live for the future – for we are continually being challenged to create meaning and fix the world. If we are content to allow our lives



to stand alone, we see only what is in front of us - we perceive only what is superficial. We react to the present and live in the past.

Most people live in the past. More to the point, they see time as flowing backwards, not forward. In relationships we look to the past to determine what will happen in the future. We assume that just because it has always been this way - it must always be so - and finding the strength to recover from life's blows becomes harder and harder.

Living in the past leaves you unprepared for the change the future brings and it denies you the freedom to change. We must always be aware of the past – but we can never allow it to dominate and control our present.

So, we have a choice. We can yearn for the good old days, or we can anticipate what is ahead, always just out of our reach. Yearning for the past requires you to find fault with the present; with what you have and with whom you share it. Anticipating the future allows you to harness your energy and those around you to work for a meaningful future.

What if you looked upon each challenge as something that would train you- that could give you a skill that could eventually save lives? Wouldn't that change the nature of the challenge and your attitude towards it? What would you need to change your perspective and give your life meaning?

It is my hope that no one will ever stand here and say 'if you do not keep kosher you are not a good Jew." Or, if you don't come regularly to services you are not a good Jew., or "You should give me more honors and respect because I know more, or I observe more or I work harder and have served longer, or I deserve more."

Because if you can defy entitlement, you will build community. You will attract those who likewise search, who want a good education for their families, and perhaps together you will be able to find God. But if you get sidetracked and only find each other in the process - and have some coffee and bagels in the process, that's ok too.

So should it be for us as well!

MUSICAL NOTES

PSALM 23

I think that some of the most beautiful, passionate and inspiring words in the Hebrew Scripture is the collection of 150 Psalms found in the Book of *Tehillim*. Authorship of the psalms is attributed to King David but it is known that he had help compos-



ing many of the psalms. In the days of the Temple in Jerusalem, the psalms were sung as part of the service; many psalms still serve a central role in Jewish liturgy. Liturgical units such as *Hallel*, *P'sukei D'Zimra* and *Kabbalat Shabbat* are made up (almost entirely) of selections from the Book of Psalms. Running the gamut of emotions, from pain and despair to gratitude and joy, the psalms have been a great source of encouragement, strength, support and spiritual and emotional elevation for centuries.

Most people are familiar with the 23rd Psalm and many of us could probably recite it in English (especially with some prompting!). This Psalm is almost always recited at a funeral or memorial service and at *Yizkor*. Among traditional Jews, there is also a custom of reciting Psalm 23 at the third meal of *Shabbat* (*Shalosh Se'udot*); the *Mishna Berurah* actually cites a custom of reciting this psalm between the ritual washing of the hands before a meal and the recital of the blessing over bread. Psalm 23 has often been associated with death because of the word *Tzalmavet*, usually translated as "the shadow of death," however, the more correct translation is "deepest darkness." Nevertheless, the feeling of calm, comfort and assurance evoked by this beautiful and pastoral text certainly makes it appropriate for solemn occasions. So what is it about these ancient words that speaks to so many people in their time of deepest darkness?

David was himself a shepherd, but starting the psalm with this image of G-d as the author's shepherd, immediately paints a quiet and tender picture. The psalm begins by speaking of G-d in the third person, followed by a description of how G-d as the Shepherd will care for David. However, when David begins to speak about possible danger (Though I walk in the valley of the shadow of death...), he turns directly to G-d and addresses G-d in the second person (I fear no harm, for You are with me, at my side). Rabbi Harold Kushner wrote, "The primary message of Psalm 23 is not that bad things will never happen to us. It is that we will not have to face those bad things alone, "For Thou are with me."

When you can, take some time to reread Psalm 23. Perhaps King David's words will inspire and encourage all those who may be experiencing pain, loss or darkness in their lives to have the strength and resiliency to be able to emerge from the valley and continue climbing up the mountain, with G-d by your side.

Just today, I attended a workshop in Sayreville, NJ, where we learned what steps we have to take and what legal requirements we must meet in order to secure the nearly \$150,000.00 NSGP-UA Homeland Security Grant, which we were awarded in early September by FEMA/New Jersey Office of Homeland Security & Preparedness.



Let me back up a bit and explain.....

In June, we along with several hundred non-profit religious and educational institutions across the country applied for a Homeland Security Grant (to provide funding for 'target hardening' physical equipment purchases) offered by FEMA through the NJOHSP.

This competitive grant required an extensive 'law enforcement' assessment of our vulnerabilities and developing a purchasing plan of security equipment that would mitigate against each of the identified vulnerabilities. The NJOHSP, in coordination with the Essex County Prosecutor's Office and the Millburn P.D. inspected our site and made many recommendations of ways we can improve over our already good security equipment.

Using that list, we researched what items, systems and equipment were available to us and how we could best utilize the grant dollars to shore up our facility. Things like improved access control devices at each of our entry doors, shatterproof blast film for all of our building's windows, improved CCTV cameras and recording equipment, extra outdoor lighting, more rigid/impact resistant fencing and decorative security planters around vulnerable points of entry, are just a few of the kinds of items we included in our initial application.

Happily, we were one of 63 organizations in New Jersey who were awarded grants totaling upwards of \$8,600,000 (15% of the total federal allocation for this NSGP-UA grant cycle).

As you may well imagine, this nearly three-year funding window requires us to adhere to strict operating procedures and every dollar must first agree with our initial application requests, and then along the way, we must (as requested) provide all the required proofs of purchase and performance before we can receive and money at all. Impeccable record keeping is a must for without which the government will not release any of the allocated funds (which is as it should be, in my estimation).

Given the time it takes to first research all the items, obtain competitive bids for all the various components and phases of the work and submit them for preauthorization approval by both the state and FEMA, it's reasonable to assume that actual work will not commence on the majority of the project until Spring or Summer, 2019.

In this column, I'll try to keep you abreast of the stages of development and what projects will be scheduled and when so that you, like me, can watch with interest as a newly upgraded plan and systems takes shape on our campus.

Thanks to Art Fredman, Nik Minocha and David Good (as well as our vendor partners in planning these improvements) for their guidance and review of our various documents, forms and photos.

Stay tuned; it's going to be an interesting winter of planning (to say the least!)

MEET OUR HONOREES: WENDY AND HANK KAPLOWITZ

Wendy was born in the Borough Park section of Brooklyn. Hank was born in New Haven, Connecticut and attended the New Haven Hebrew Day School and later attended Yeshiva University (YU) High School in Manhattan. He stayed at YU and earned his B. A. and Ph.D. in Social Psychology there.

When the couple married in 1965, Wendy was entering her junior year at Hunter College and Hank was starting graduate school. They managed to work at jobs in their fields while going to school. That afforded them the means to develop their passion for travel, going to Europe and Israel each summer on student fares. They have since been back to Israel 15 times, most recently this past June. "Each trip is more inspiring than the last," they say.

When Wendy finished her Masters in Nutrition at Hunter, she moved on from being a hospital dietitian to working as a nutritionist for the Health Insurance Plan (HIP) of Greater New York. Upon finishing his doctoral coursework, Hank took a position as an instructor in the Psychology Department of Kean University, then known as Newark State College. They moved to New Jersey, where Wendy worked as a nutritionist until they both retired in 2014.

While at Kean, Hank rose in rank from instructor to full professor. He served as chair of the Faculty Senate, an officer of the faculty union and as special assistant to three presidents. He also was the founding director of Kean's Human Rights Institute. Upon his retirement, Kean's Board of Trustees conferred upon him the title of Professor Emeritus.

When they moved to New Jersey and started their family forty-five years ago, the couple bought a house in Union, where their children attended Solomon Schechter Day School. They quickly became active members of Congregation Beth Shalom with Wendy co-chairing the Annual Dinner Dance and Hank becoming the President. Eventually the synagogue merged with Congregation Ahavath Achim Bnai Israel of Irvington and its name change to Congregation Bnai Ahavath Shalom (CBAS). As the membership receded, Hank and Wendy took on more responsibility to keep their beloved synagogue functioning. Wendy became responsible for the weekly luncheon Kiddush, and Hank served as unlicensed plumber, electrician, Gabbai and Treasurer. Together

with their dear friends Barbara and David Gelband, the synagogue's long-serving President, keeping the Shul afloat became a second full-time job for all of them.

With the closing of CBAS, Hank and Wendy immediately joined CBI and were joined by a number of other former CBAS members. They state that they were attracted by the warm greetings they received from congregants when they visited, and they particularly enjoyed the Rabbi's ability to blend knowledge and wisdom with an irrepressible sense of humor. The Cantor's angelic voice and beautiful melodies along with the traditional service clinched it for them. Additionally, they were looking for a synagogue within walking distance to their home, so that their children Mark and Tracy and their families could join them on Shabbat when they visit.

Mark and Tracy are Solomon Schechter (Golda Och Academy) Graduates. Mark has his Ph.D. in Jewish Philosophy and teaches at the University of Memphis. He and his wife Rebekah have three daughters. Tracy received her rabbinical ordination from JTS and has a Ph.D. in Sociology of Education. She serves as the Director of Strategic Planning and Community Engagement at The Solomon Schechter School of Long Island. She also was a Rabbinical Intern at CBI in 1999. Tracy and her husband, Jonathan Boxer, have three children..

The Kaplowitzs regularly attend services at CBI. They both attend the Rabbi's classes, and Wendy is a member of the Board of Trustees, Sisterhood Vice-President for Education, and is active on the Kiddush and Shabbat Dinner committees. Wendy also serves as the Treasure of the Union County Section of NCJW and the Hillside-Union Chapter of Hadassah. While the children were at SSDS Hank was a member of its Board of Governors and its Education Committee. Hank serves on the CBI Men's Club board and the Religious Affairs Committee. He is also a member of the board of the American Interfaith Council and of the Kollel Tiferes Nosson Tzvi in Union. Although retired, Hank continues teaching in the Kean doctoral program in Clinical Psychology as well as a course, "Comedians of the 20th Century" to senior citizens at the Green Lane YM-YWHA. Hank and Wendy take courses in the Osher Life Long Learning Program at Rutgers and pursue their passion for travel. They have recently been on Jewish themed tours to China, India and Eastern Europe.

As Cheryl Burstein told you in her Kol Nidre speech about Israel, CBI and Israel Bonds are hosting a special breakfast on Sunday November 4, at 9:30 am to honor our congregants, Wendy and Hank

Kaplowitz. We are honoring Hank and Wendy not just for their long-time support for Israel Bonds, or just for their activities here at CBI, but for a lifetime of achievement.

Wendy hails from Borough Park Brooklyn, and Hank from New Haven Connecticut. They married while both were students, Wendy at Hunter College and Hank at Yeshiva University. During their early years, they lived in apartments on the East side of Manhattan, and their jobs afforded them the opportunity to travel to Europe and to Israel during their summers. They have since been back to Israel 16 times, most recently this past June. "Each trip is more inspiring than the last," they say.

Wendy had a career in nutrition, working for a variety of companies in the health care field. Hank got a job as an instructor at Newark State College in 1972 and stayed there as the college became Kean University and he eventually became a full professor and served in other academic leadership positions including being the founding director of the Kean International Human Rights Conference. In January 2014 Hank and Wendy retired on the same day. When you see Wendy, ask her how they happened to retire simultaneously.

Hank and Wendy's children attended the Solomon Schechter Day School in Union and both pursued advanced Jewish education. Mark received a PH. D in Jewish Philosophy and teach at the University of Tennessee in Memphis.
