#### FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

hanukah is upon us. Of all the holidays of the year, the holiday of lights is one of the most popular and most challenging. How could a holiday that bestows presents upon our children and grandchildren be anything but loved by the recipients? Yet, how do we adults who bestow these presents



access the message of religious freedom and rebellion against tyranny for our families? How do we make the lighting of the candles (or oil) a ritual which is more than the preamble for opening one or more gifts?

On a larger stage, isn't this the question we face as Jews in the United States? We expend so much energy making the programs and rituals enjoyable that we often despair at how we can also make them meaningful? Too often "fun" replaces "meaningful" because "meaningful" is not always fun.

It's the difference between enjoying the Passover Seder because of the entertainment acumen of the hosts and being challenged with existential questions during the seder that cause us pause and make us think about who and how we are, in what direction we are going and what our ultimate goals should be.

That is not to say that enjoyment should not be a foundational value for what we practice. But enjoyment should lead to meaning or, perhaps more appropriately; enjoyment can accompany meaning.

No matter where we go as a community in Millburn or as an eternal people - these questions will stay with us. Indeed, they have been our constant companions from the time of Abraham. There may be many different answers and the solutions differ with time and location - but as long as this challenge remains with us - we will remain vigilant and vital in our building and maintaining community. It is only when surrender one for the other that we will lose both.

#### **MUSICAL NOTES**

#### THE LIGHTS OF CHANUKAH

Percentage of the Chanukah I watch the candles burn on my Hanukkiyah and with each additional candle, by the eighth night I am completely mesmerized by the lights. The Rabbis ordained that we should light the Chanu-



kah menorah each night in order to publicize the miracle of Chanukah. Interestingly, the light of the candles is not to be used for any other purpose (like illuminating a room in order to see). But the original reason for marking the holiday with light is uncertain. From the Books of Maccabees we know that they burned incense on the altar and lit the lamps on the menorah when they rededicated the Temple; however, the well-known story of the miraculous cruse of oil does not appear in the Books of Maccabees nor in the Mishnah, but only in the Talmud.

So why do we celebrate Chanukah with light? Rabbi Jose, in the Talmud (Megillah 24b), says, "I was long perplexed by the following verse: 'And you shall grope at noonday as the blind gropes in darkness [Deut. 28:29].' What difference does it make to a blind man whether it is dark or light? Once I was walking on a pitch-black night when I saw a blind man walking with a torch in his hands. I asked him: 'Why do you carry the torch?' He replied: 'As long as the torch is in my hand, people can see me and aid me." From this, we can derive deeper meaning about the Chanukah candles. They not only remind us of what happened 2000 years ago in the Temple, but they also represent the light of the human spirit and the light of the Divine presence in our lives. The Chanukah menorah reminds us that no matter how dark life may be, there always remains a source of light inside us. Each of us can brighten up the lives of others through acts of Tzedakkah, Chesed (kindness) and Tikkun Olam (repairing the world).

This teaching I found from Rabbi Rachel Cowan gave me a new insight about the Chanukah lights: "The opportunity for spirituality implicit in the Chanukah story is made explicit in a beautiful text from Proverbs that links the lighting of candles to the search for spirit: "The human spirit is God's candle" (Proverbs 27:20). It is our spirit that brings light into the world—the light of love, compassion, truth and justice. To the extent that we do the very Jewish work of cultivating these inner qualities, we can bring more light into the world and feel a deeper connection to that which is holy."

This year, let us all remember that by lighting the Chanukah menorah, we ignite the flame within ourselves, and we can use that spark to light up the lives of others. Wishing you a joyous and meaningful Chanukah celebration!

#### **President's Message**

The last month at CBI has been shaped by the horrific tragedy of the attack on the Tree of Life congregation in Pittsburgh. The deadliest anti-Semitic assault in U.S. history has influenced how we have come together as a community and how we position ourselves to counter these threats.

On Sunday, October 28, the morning after the attack, we held a vigil to honor the memory of those lost and to pray for the

injured. As they were our special guests for the weekend, Pizmon, the Jewish a cappella group of Columbia, Barnard and the Jewish Theological Seminary, lent their voices to help us in our healing. The following Shabbat, CBI participated in the nationwide effort that was Solidarity Shabbat, showing that we would not be deterred in our faith. We continue to mourn the lives that were taken at the Tree of Life and refuse to let anti-Semitic violence rob us of our sense of identity, our communal worship and our place in this country.

We have redoubled our efforts for the safety and security of our congregation. Prior to the attack in Pittsburgh, our Executive Director Harvey Brenner aided by our Facilities Committee, obtained a \$10,000 grant from the State of New Jersey to increase our security personnel presence and a \$150,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to harden our physical facility against a violent attack. After participating in numerous security discussions both internally and externally, we have decided to have armed personnel guarding the building both for Shabbat morning services and Sunday morning

religious school. We are currently assessing the ongoing cost for this added security measure and will address the need for increased funds in the coming months. Additionally, we are taking steps to make necessary changes to our building with the use of the funds from the Homeland Security grant. While I cannot disclose all the details, you may notice some of the changes taking effect.

December is a busy month for us at CBI. On Sunday morning December 2, we will be welcoming Amit Stern, our community Shaliach, who will be speaking on Religion and State in Israel, Perspectives from an Israeli, as part of our L'Dor V'Dor Speaker Series. Come to hear our speaker and stop by the Sisterhood Gift Shop and its Chanukah Boutique. You and your family are invited to a Winter Chanukah Shabbat Dinner on December 7; the cost has been underwritten by a generous donor, but RSVP's are needed to ensure that there will be food for all. Please join us as we honor Man of the Year Dan Richter at the annual Men's Club Hanukkah Dinner Dance on December 9. As always, it will be a funfilled night of friendship and camaraderie, and, if I know Dan, many Star Wars references. On Tuesday, December 18, Sisterhood will host its Knit & Knosh (and needlecraft) Group at 7:30 p.m. in the Youth Lounge. The next night, Wednesday, December 19, Sisterhood will host one of its very famous Mah Jongg Nights at 7:30 p.m.

May the warmth and light of the Hanukkah lights fill your home with joy!

Proactive? Prophetic? Just plain lucky?

Call it what you will, but compared to many other 'faith-based' organizations, we're better prepared than most when it comes to security.

With the recent events in Pittsburgh still fresh in our minds, renewed vigor and resources are being committed by religious organizations of all faiths and denominations to ensure that their doors



remain open and welcoming, yet their premises and worshippers are kept safe and secure.

Fortunately (and this is why I asked the opening three questions: proactive; prophetic or just plain lucky?) at my suggestion and advice, the board and officers initiated a series of actions, long before Congregation Etz Chayim's tragedy, to help protect our congregation members, staff and visitors from harm.

We applied for and received a \$10,000 Homeland Security 'Pilot Program' Grant to provide and test the benefits of having uniformed security guards for the next several months. Shabbatot, holiday services, special events and school days may all be part of our schedule of coverage. A visible, armed presence is a known deterrent to many persons who might do us harm.

Additionally, we also applied for and were awarded a nearly \$150,000, Homeland Security Urban Area Security Initiative/ Non-Profit Grant that will permit us to 'harden' our facility. With items like improved access controls at the building entrances, more external security lighting and cameras, security bollards, planters and security window films, we'll be better able to detect and deter potential threats to our community's well-being.

Lastly, in October, I attended a full day workshop taught by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security in New York City, where we learned how to develop a strategic plan specific to our community's needs and our facility's unique features if, God Forbid, we ever are confronted with an active shooter (or other imminent, potential threat).

Over the next few months the senior staff and clergy will develop that plan in coordination with our Millburn Police Department, NJ Office of Homeland Security and Preparedness, our contracted security guard firm (K Street Group) and selected congregational lay leaders so that no matter what activity, time of day or day of the week, trained personnel will be on site to handle an emergency as it develops).

As I wrote in my February column earlier this year, currently, there is no known active threat to the American Jewish community generally, or to the Millburn area in particular. That doesn't mean we should relax our guard. Rather, we should be aware of the following two stratagems:

#### "IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING!"

That's the motto made famous by the Metropolitan Transportation Authority of NYC, but it could very well pertain to any shul in these troubled times. With the recent tragic events of Sandy Hook, Paris and San Bernardino, CA, (now add in Parkland, Las Vegas and Pittsburgh) it reminds us that we must continue to be vigilant and alert to potential threats while still maintaining a warm, welcoming congregation.

If you think something or someone doesn't look quite right, let us know. Tell an officer, clergy or staff member or use your cell to call 911 if you can't find one of us. Please don't assume that someone else will or has notified us. In this case, redundancy is a very good thing!

#### "RUN-HIDE-FIGHT"

In the very unlikely event that there ever is an active threat on our premises:

RUN (run as far away as fast as you can) and avoid danger, then call 911.

HIDE (if you can't run, find a hiding place away from doors and windows) and do not reveal yourself until police search the premises and find you.

**FIGHT** this is your last resort when you have no other alternative (and your life is absolutely in jeopardy). Fight like your life depends upon it! (Historically, 16% of all active intruder situations are ended by just such citizen action.)

B"H", we will never know such violence in our towns, homes, or shul but should the worst happen, these few short slogans, put into practice, may save our lives.

We must not allow our fears to rule our behavior or actions. We must continue to live our lives in as normal a fashion as possible. To give in to those fears and prejudices makes the terrorists the winners and every one of us a loser. But we must be alert to our surroundings and understand how to protect ourselves should the worst occur.

I'm neither an alarmist nor a 'Pollyanna'. I'm a realist who is tasked with learning all he can about securing our community and our members. The best phrase I learned at the Active Shooter workshop was, "Nothing happened today on my watch!"

Let us hope that our community never knows the pain and loss of Pittsburgh, Sandy Hook, Parkland, Las Vegas, Paris or San Bernardino. May HaShem continue to bless us with peace and freedom!

#### **Update from the Rabbinical Search Committee**

The search committee spent the spring and summer conducting a survey of congregational preferences in its new rabbi, and conducting focus groups to flesh out these preferences at a more granular level. Informed by these studies, the committee filled out the extensive Rabbinical Assembly congregational questionnaire, and posted the position over the summer. We are currently receiving expressions of interest and resumes. We will close the search later this Fall and begin to sift through

the applicants for first-round (Skype) interviews. We hope to be able to bring 3-4 outstanding candidates to the synagogue in the early months of 2019 to meet with the committee and congregants, lead services, deliver divrei Torah, and impress us with their leadership, fitness, and kavanah

# **GIRLS IN TROUBLE**


#### WITH RABBI CECELIA BEYER

#### Sisterhood's Message

As co-presidents of an organization that is made up of vibrant, hard-working, intelligent and dedicated women, we are always interested in looking at Judaism from a feminist perspective. Most of the heroes of the stories of the Torah are just that - heroes. But there are many heroines, as well, though many of them are not as readily recognized as their male counterparts. And so it is with the Chanukah story. Ask anyone who the major players in that story are and they will quickly rattle off Judah Maccabee, his father Matthias, and of course the bad guy, Antiochus. But what about Judith? Turns out she played a pretty important role in the story. Judith went to the enemy camp, pretending to be sympathetic to the invaders' cause. She used her beauty to lure Holofernes, an enthusiastic general, into his tent, made him thirsty by plying him with cheese and then got him drunk on wine. When he fell asleep, Judith murdered him with his own sword and cut off his head. The severed head was displayed on the walls of the city, terrifying the enemy army who panicked and retreated. And then there is Hannah, Judah's sister. She watched each of her seven children be tortured and executed for failing to follow Antiochus' orders to bow down to idols, even encouraging her youngest child to become a martyr. She died immediately after. Because of the bravery and religious convictions of Judith and Hannah, women have felt a special affinity to Chanukah. To honor them, there is a custom that women refrain from working while the Chanukah candles are lit. If only we could find a way to keep them lit longer!

Sisterhood also honors Judith and Hannah with its Rosh Chodesh program scheduled for December 6. We are so fortunate that our very own Lisa Lisser, an accomplished Jewish educator, will lead a discussion on Chanukah and Civil Discourse.
