FROM THE RABBI'S DEN

To the Bnai Israel community:

This will be my last bulletin article as the Rabbi at Congregation Bnai Israel in Millburn, New Jersey. I will be on leave until mid-March.

While I will be in residence at CBI from mid-March until June 2, I expect that my successor will have been identified before I return in March. By now you have already met several of the well-qualified candidates brought in to the congregation by the dedicated members of the search committee. You have had an opportunity to meet the Rabbi who will ascend to the Bimah this coming summer.

But your new Rabbi will not be able to ascend the Bimah because our Bimah is on the level of the congregation. We chant Torah, lead the prayers and hear sermon/dialogues all from the floor of the sanctuary. This was planned by design. We moved the Bimah down to the level of the congregation to better demystify the tradition and become more participatory. We also humanized the clergy by encouraging them to sit with the congregation and not above it.

Any Rabbi assuming the pulpit will bring change - it is inevitable and normal. Some will embrace this change and some will recoil from it. What is most important is that the congregation continues in its tradition of change and adaptation. I would hope that the ideals we created over the past thirty years will help guide the future conversation - not hinder it.

I leave you with words spoken by Rabbi Max Gruenewald, the Rabbi Emeritus of Bnai Israel until his passing in 1992. He told the congregation at my installation that while he and I could not have been more different if I, as his successor, could keep the name of Bnai Israel alive and vital then I would have fulfilled his greatest hope for the future. So it is with me.

MUSICAL NOTES

ALIYAH HONOR

When was the last time you had an *Aliyah* Honor at CBI services?

There are many opportunities for an honor, and while we maintain the *Minhag* (long-standing custom) of reserving the first and second Torah Aliyah Blessings for a Kohain/Bat Kohain or a Levi/Bat Levi if they are present, our volunteer Gabbaim (Amy Dantus, Joe Tenenbaum and Susan Gordon) are always looking to give out honors to those who haven't had one in a while.

In every Jewish community all over the world, it is considered of great merit to receive an honor during any service (Shabbat, Holiday or weekday minyan). In addition to the honor of being called to the Torah to recite the *Aliyah* blessings, other honors can include leading *davenning*, reading Torah or Haftarah, opening the Ark, carrying the Torah, lifting or dressing the Torah, teaching words of Torah, or doing an English reading.

"Aliyah", which means "ascent," refers to the spiritual elevation which comes with the privilege of receiving an honor. The Zohar tells us, "G-d looked in the Torah and created the world; when humans act for the sake of G-d and the Torah, we sustain the world." There are no restrictions for a Jew to receive an honor – one does not have to be learned or observant of Mitzvot, and you don't even have to know how to read Hebrew! According to *Minhag* (long-standing custom), there are specific occasions when preference for an honor should be given, such as to a Groom (or Bride in an egalitarian setting!) before or right after their wedding, to someone who is commemorating a Yahrzeit, to a parent of a newborn, and to a child on the week immediately after his/her Bar/Bat Mitzvah! But you certainly don't need to be marking a special occasion to receive an honor!

Anyone who has escaped from disaster or danger (such as a car accident or surgery) or has recovered from a serious illness, would also be given priority to have an Aliyah to the Torah so that after the Aliyah blessing, they could recite a special blessing of gratitude called *Birkat Hagomel*. During the days of the Temple, it was obligatory to bring a thanksgiving offering before God when one survived a life-threatening situation. In the absence of the Temple, *Birkat Hagomel*, which first appears in the Talmud, is said in place of making a sacrifice as a proclamation of gratitude. This blessing serves as a powerful way to give glory and thanks to God for God's protection.

If you want to learn or review how to chant an Aliyah to the Torah, or any other synagogue skill, and/or if you've had an experience for which you'd want to say the short "Gomel" blessing, I am happy to make myself available to help you (and I also have recordings that you can listen to!). So, if it's been a while since you've had a service honor, please let us know, or just come and elevate your soul by accepting an honor in any of our services!

Please let the committee know which events you attended over the rabbinic visits where you had the opportunity to observe or meet the candidates.

In the coming months, we will have the opportunity to celebrate and enjoy time with Rabbi Bayar as he returns from his scheduled time away. We can also look forward to receiving our beautiful new Torah Covers as we kick off the Torah Cover fundraiser. A letter with details about this exciting initiative will be coming soon. This spring, we will be hosting a Volunteer Appreciation event to thank the many, many people who generously give of their time, energy and efforts to make CBI the wonderful, dynamic community we love.

Beineynu

As you read this column, we are experiencing a typically frigid stretch of sub-freezing temperatures yet our energy and enthusiasm at CBI is bubbling over. Why, you may ask?

Our kehillah has been given a rare opportunity to seek out, explore, interview and eventually hire our next spiritual leader. If we're good at it, (and there's every reason to believe that we will be successful in finding our next "right rabbi") he or she may be on our bima for the next 30 or so years. Sounds daunting, but truthfully, it isn't. How do I know? Well, as my namesake "Paul Harvey" of radio fame used to say, "here's the rest of the story".



This is my 8th senior rabbi search (4 as a lay leader of my own congregation in Aberdeen, NJ and 4 as an executive director and senior staff member). I have been involved in every facet of the process; from meeting with the Rabbinical Assembly executives and placement people, to consulting with our then USCJ regional/district field workers (they're now called KRMs, Kehillah Relationship Managers) for their expertise, to developing the Job Posting Questionnaire that candidates see and to which they reply, to receiving and screening candidate resumes and submissions, to long distance telephone and video conference interviews, to having more focused "face to face" interviews as the field is narrowed, to bringing in viable candidates for a trial weekend amongst the congregation, to selecting the final candidate, to getting board and congregational approval, to negotiating the contract, to helping the candidate move into the community, to assisting both the congregation and new rabbi in transitioning from one rabbinate to another and finally, to arranging for the installation of the new leader with an appropriate community-wide celebration.

I've experienced 'open' pulpits (when there is no rabbi on staff), to interim rabbis (when someone is engaged to bridge the 'interim period' between one permanent rabbi and another) and even temporary High Holy Day/Holiday clergy who are hired specifically for the "Days of Awe" or the "Shalosh Regalim".

Trust me; it seems like an impossible task, but "if we could do it, so can you!"

The three pieces of advice I give, if asked are:

- 1) **Trust the process.** If the process is sound and you follow it for all applicants and candidates, the outcome

will be a good one as whoever is hired will be "the right rabbi" for the shul.

- 2) **Be patient.** This is an arduous task with (as you see from my description above) has many complicated and time-consuming steps to it. The people leading the search are most likely congregants, just like you. They have day jobs, family obligations and fit this search into their already active life. It takes the better part of a year from start to finish, and in some cases even longer.
- 3) **Keep the optics transparent.** In other words, "how will what we do and how we act appear to each candidate, our congregation at-large, and the outside Jewish Community" so that we conduct ourselves with the highest degree of integrity and in keeping with established core Jewish values.

I know, having now worked among you for a year and a half that you have the time, talents and dedication needed to be successful in this search (even if you might think you don't). There was nothing congregationally unique about each of my prior 7 searches, save for the differences in minhag, location or theology. Each one ended successfully with the kehillah being served by that chosen rabbi at least through two or more contracts, and some, even until today (a decade or so later).

So, trust the process, be patient and keep the optics in mind.

M'chayil P'chayil! (May you move from 'strength to strength!')



Winter has arrived in earnest and we are enjoying it! When we are able to get outdoors we are focusing on the changes we see in nature and how things look different at this time of year. One of our favorite activities is feeding the birds and keeping track of the types that frequent the bird feeders in our playground. Ms. Wendi, our enrichment teacher from the Cora Hartshorn Arboretum, helped us identify which birds like our choice of birdseed and we are busy documenting their feeding habits. We particularly enjoy watching the squirrels who are growing fatter and fatter eating the seeds that drop to the ground—lots and lots of learning for sure!

We are continuing to enhance our early childhood curriculum by developing different learning opportunities for the children. Our latest addition is our 'loose parts classroom' in which the kids can create, imagine, design, invent and document using all kinds of stuff! The shelves are filled with



egg cartons, wooden sticks, bottle caps, lids, clean food containers, tape, fabric, corks, shells, twigs—basically all kinds of things that can be used in any way the children see fit. The kids use trays as a 'base' and are free to create whatever they choose. This activity is based on the Reggio Emilia philosophy and we are very excited to make it part of the HGECC program.

So here's where we can use your help! Although we already have lots of 'stuff' to use we can always use more. Please consider dropping off and leaving outside of the HGECC school office washed bottle caps, paper towel/toilet paper tubes, bubble wrap, etc.—basically anything that can be used creatively. Thanks in advance for helping—stay tuned for photos of our creations!

And, of course, monthly mah jongg and knit and knosh continue this month on the 13th and 26, respectively.





ISRAEL AFFAIRS

Israel News – 2019 – The Daily Alert

I have told you many times about the value of DAILY ALERT, a newsletter published every weekday by the Jerusalem Center for Public Affairs (and distributed by the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations) which highlights important news items about Israel and the Mideast. I reviewed a few days' worth of Alerts from the first week in 2019, and learned some very important things:

Tourism to Israel in 2018 totaled 4 million visitors, up 13% from 2017 and up 38% from 2016. The largest number of tourists were from the United States (813K) with France, Russia, Germany and Britain rounding out the top five. China also had around 100K tourists to Israel.

Almost 30,000 Jews moved to Israel in 2018, an increase of about 5% from 2017. The top two countries for immigration to Israel were Russia (10,500) and Ukraine (6,500). Aliyah from North America totaled 3,250, from France 2,600 and from the UK 500. Among all these countries, only Russia increased from the prior year (45%)

Recent issues have also highlighted some of the amazing innovations being developed in Israel:

An Israeli smartphone app has been developed to help translate speech in text to make it easier for people with limited hearing to interact with hearing people in situations like doctor's visits or business transactions.

A system developed by Coral Drowning Detection Systems uses underwater video cameras, computer vision, and artificial intelligence to monitor swimming pools for potential drowning accidents. When a problem is detected, the systems sounds an "ear-piercing alarm, and sends smartphone alerts to household members.

ElliQ is a robot sidekick developed by Intuition Robotics in Tel Aviv which uses AI (artificial intelligence) to help older adults "stay active engaged and connected to friends." ElliQ might, for instance suggest a walk outside if the weather is nice.

An Israeli Startup, NoTraffic has created a traffic management system which uses AI to track vehicle movements and to adjust traffic lights to lower congestion.

Do you believe in Miracles?

I have discovered another way besides reading websites to stay informed about Israel. One which I want to highlight this month is RejuveNation, a weekly podcast moderated by Eve Harow, an experienced tour guide and a former councilwoman in Efrat.

I want to specifically recommend that you listen to a recent podcast

In this podcast, which was released on December 23, 2018, Eve interviews Chaim Silberstein, the founder of Keep Jerusalem, an organization which focuses on the complicated issues facing Jerusalem. For the first half of the hour long podcast, Eve and Chaim discuss various issues related to Jerusalem – lack of affordable housing, employment issues, demographics and related issues. The organization supports development of a master plan to encourage the State to invest more in Jerusalem to keep it as a vital, majority Jewish city.

The second half of the program is much more powerful, and Chaim Silberstein is also the father of Shira Ish-Ran, the pregnant women shot several times in the abdomen in terrorist drive-by shooting as she and her husband were standing near a road in Ofra, a town near Jerusalem. In the interview he describes the circumstances under which he learned of the attack on his daughter and son-in-law. He expresses gratitude for the short life of his first grandson, Amiad Yisrael, and describes the supreme efforts required to keep his daughter alive. To me, the most dramatic portion of the interview is when he time after time expresses gratitude to G0d for the miracle of the way in which the medical treatment was delivered. While Shira had lost almost half of her blood in the short time after the shooting, her medical transport used their knowledge of the back roads to get her to Sha'are Tzedek Hospital in about 20 minutes, for a trip which usually would take more than an hour. The father's gratitude and lack of vengeance is the most powerful message in this podcast.

If you do not know how to listen to a podcast and would like to learn, we can meet sometime at CBI and I will try to show you how (I have an iPhone). If you just want to hear this heartfelt and inspiring interview, we can meet at CBI some evening before minyan, and listen to it.
