ALIYAH HONOR

I feel privileged to have had and continue to have so many strong and inspiring role models in my life—who have very special qualities which I try my best to emulate. This month, when we read the Megillah on Purim, I find myself focusing on the Biblical character of Esther, and the strength and courage which Esther exhibited in the Purim story.



While growing up, all the girls wanted to be Queen Esther on Purim because, as we were taught, Esther was beautiful. It is certainly true that Esther was beautiful, but she was also a smart and God-fearing woman. She endured great hardship, yet ultimately turned a catastrophic situation for herself and her people into an astounding story of personal growth and national salvation. As queen, Esther hides her religious identity and doesn't use her real name (Hadassah). As a person deeply connected to God, she wonders, as does Mordechai, why she has been placed in such a difficult situation. However, once Haman's decree against the Jews is publicized (Meg Esther 3:-15), her role becomes clear in that Esther is to be instrumental in saving her people.

"While Esther's story is impressive on the level of intrigue, bravery and adventure, it is made eternal by her self-sacrifice and unmitigated faith. Esther remains a role model not because of her external beauty or because she was queen of a powerful empire, but because of her inner fortitude." [Women in Judaism, Copyright (c) 2000 by Mrs. Leah Kohn] Our traditions recognizes that what makes a woman an *Eishet Chayil*, a true woman of valor and strength, is not her looks but her actions.

In the book, *Praise Her Works: Conversations with Biblical Women*, (Penina Adelman, editor; JPS, 2005), Tamara Cohen offers the following about what we can learn from Esther: "Live with your eyes wide open. Prepare yourself to hear the voice that calls you to fulfill your mission. You are on this earth for a purpose, at least one. Meaning may not come to you like it came to Esther in the Megillah version of things. In fact, it will likely not come that way. But there is always a decree somewhere against somebody. There is always someone's fate in the balance: a whole people, one child, an entire species, a river.

So when you hear the knock at your door, before you answer, stop. First remind yourself that you are not the only one in the universe hearing the call. The entire universe does not rest on your shoulders alone. Then let yourself hear it again. Maybe this voice is yours to answer. How will you know? It can take a long time to grow quiet enough to really listen. Esther gave herself three days. Give yourself time. Be silent. Pray. Ask others to pray with you. Don't hide what you are going through. Find a partner to push you if you need to be pushed. Remember also, that it is likely that when you take a step forward you will at some point find yourself falling back. Life doesn't move only in one direction.

Finally, live with awe. Stand back and let your mouth fill with praise for the beauty around you as naturally as it fills with air. Step forward and speak the truth when it needs to be spoken. Take action when it needs to be taken. Dare to believe that God needs you as a partner on this earth."

Esther as a role model, along with the message of the Purim story, become more and more relevant as our world becomes more and more unpredictable. What we assume and take for granted, can suddenly change. The story of Purim holds out the hope that no matter how bad the circumstances, each of us can do our part to affect the outcome.

Let's make sure our children know why it's really so empowering to dress up as Queen Esther on Purim!

Beineynu By Harvey Brenner, Executive Director

Once again, as I write this column, it is bitter cold, there are the remnants of a snowstorm all around, and more snow is predicted for the rest of winter! Sometimes, you just have to laugh or you'll cry!

When I was a child, I remember being enthralled by snow. I just couldn't get enough of it. It didn't

matter that I lived 2 blocks from PS 170 Queens, a half mile from Van Wyck Junior High School and a mile from Jamaica High School; I would have to slog my way through it, smiling and romping all along the way. But now, as an adult and the 'property manager' charged with the safety and security of our congregation, snow and ice are my constant adversaries.

As an adult, I've been less thrilled with it, but snow seems to follow me wherever I go. When I worked in Buffalo, just prior to coming here, I was fortunate to both work and live in the 'north towns' (Williamsville and Amherst) which were relatively snow-free, compared to the 'south towns' (i.e. Buffalo proper) that would get the much-ballyhooed lakeeffect "feet" of snow that the TV weather-casters are so fond of mentioning to us down-staters in Metro NYC. In fact, when I was in Israel seven years ago this month, it snowed substantially in Jerusalem and rained torrentially in Tel Aviv. Passing from one city's storm to another reminded me of my commute to CBI from my home in Monmouth County. South of the Driscoll Bridge (near the Raritan Bay on the Garden State Parkway @ Exit 129) we have one weather pattern and north of it a totally different one!

I've been pleased with the way our staff and our contractors have 'risen to the occasion' and either made it in to work under adverse conditions, worked from home or worked longer hours to catch up when we've had weather-related issues. They've supplied us with salt during shortages and plowed through the night so that we could open our doors safely.

For the most part, our own CBI "Emergency Notification System" while not publicly broadcast over the airwaves (with its irritating warning claxon) has functioned as we hoped it would. The BBRS, HGECC and Youth Group leadership teams have collaborated well on determining if and when we have to postpone, delay or cancel programs or events due to the weather, and we've sent that information to the congregation and respective groups through dedicated email blasts.

As long as we are at the mercy of the weather, we'll always err on the side of caution and we'll endeavor to make our program and facility related decisions as early in the day as possible. When threatening weather is forecasted, please continue to check your emails and when in doubt, contact the respective schools or the main office for the latest updates.

Ultimately, you are in charge of your own safety. If you're uncomfortable driving or commuting to a program, stay home. There will be other programs down the road.

So, my friends, stay safe, stay warm, and B'zrat HaShem, the next column I write for April, we'll be enjoying the first blushes of spring!

Sisterhood's Message

Purim is coming! We love Purim – the *hamantaschen*, the costumes, the noise making. But mostly, we are inspired by the women at the center of the story. Indeed, Purim is one of the few Jewish holidays where the women ARE the story.

First, there's Vashti. She makes a brief but impactful appearance in the story. Vashti is beautiful and, as it turns out, strong willed. She refuses the command of King Ahasuerus, her husband, to dance at the feast he presides over. Vashti refuses. She pays dearly, losing her crown and being banished. Her exile paves the way for Esther, her more famous counterpart. But Vashti has also been heralded as one of the original feminists. Harriet Beecher Stowe wrote in 1878 that Vashti's decision was a "first stand for woman's rights" and that "we shall stand amazed that there was a woman found at the head of the Persian empire that dared to disobey the command even of a drunken monarch." About 20 years later, the Woman's Bible commentary put together by suffragist Elizabeth Cady Stanton called Vashti "a sublime representative of self-centered womanhood" who rises "to the heights of self-consciousness and of self-respect."

And of course, there's Esther. Everyone knows her – she even has a book named after her! She is tasked with saving the Jews from Haman's evil extermination plan. She is more calculated and more subtle than Vashti. Indeed, while Vashti reacts immediately to Ahasuerus' unreasonable demands, Esther takes her time before appearing before the king to reveal her true identity and Haman's nefarious plot. She plays the system to her own advantage. Crafty, huh? The women have different styles, but can both be described as independent, savvy, courageous, brave, outspoken and heroic. Both serve as role models to women everywhere. We celebrate both of them on March 20 and 21.

Two of Sisterhood's regular programs, Mah Jongg and Knit and Knosh, return this month on Wednesday, March 13 and Tuesday, March 19, respectively. We are thrilled with the turnout at these programs. Please join us! Looking ahead, our Women's Seder returns on April 7 and will feature new Passover songs and the CBI band. Look for the flyer with all of the information. This is a hugely popular event so respond early!

Israel News – 2019 – The Israel Show

I have written in the past about websites, newsletters and podcasts you can use to follow news about Israel. Today I will tell you about another on-line show, like a podcast, but available in a different manner.

I listen every week to a program called "The

Israel Show." This is a show presented by the Nachum Segal Network, which can be accessed on-line, through Facebook, or through an app for your phone called Nachum Segal Network

I listened to The Israel Show on February 4, and learned about something happening in Israel which to me is a great example of the greatness of Israel, but also of the complicated nature of life there.

There is an Israeli television show entitled Kochav haba, Rising Star. The show is a talent show which is used to find the Israeli contestant for Eurovision, the Europe wide singing contest. The current season has featured amazing performances by the Shalva Band, a band created by the Israeli organization Shalva, an organization dedicated to "empowering and supporting families to raise their children with disabilities with the family framework." www.shalva.org

I first became aware of Shalva when I first visited in Israel in 2003 on a trip co-sponsored by CBI and by Ziv Tzedakah fund. We visited the Shalva organization in a Jerusalem neighborhood on the side of a hill. We saw how the organization focused on helping the children, and helping the parents by providing them time off from the very demanding imperative of caring for their special needs children. In 2016 they built a much more advanced center to help serve their population.

This year, the Shalva band, which includes 8 talented musicians with disabilities (including blindness, Down Syndrome, or other disabilities is competing in the television show, and has reached the quarter finals.

However, there is a complication because several of the band members are Shomer Shabbat. The problem is that the Eurovision contest requires a Saturday afternoon dress rehearsal. Israel is appealing to organization to show flexibility on their rules, but as of early February, this has not happened. Culture minister Miri Regev has appealed to the organization, but as of now, the Eurovision management has not agreed.

The Eurovision final will be held in Israel this year, and the venue was already changed from Jerusalem to Tel Aviv as

Jerusalem was uncomfortable with the violations of Shabbat which would be required to put on the show. Tel Aviv agreed to be the site of the event, but the popularity of the Shalva Band raised the issue again., As of the first week of February, the Shalva Band has decided to withdraw from the television show.

I encourage you to listen regularly to The Israel Show. To get it for your device, download the Nachum Segal Network App. Once you download the app, you can select NSN Archives, and then select "The Israel Show with Meir Weingarten." To hear what I reported on today, select the show from February 4, 2019.

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
