# B'NAI ISRAEL Holocaust Remembrance Program

**Our synagogue remembers** ... a Holocaust commemoration program in conjunction with Voices of the Generations. Julie Kohner has been a Jewish educator for over thirty years, with a master's degree in educational counseling.

After Julie's mother, Hanna, a Holocaust survivor, passed away in 1990, Julie began to create educational programs to honor the victims and survivors of the Holocaust. Her goal was to teach the Holocaust as seen through her mother's eyes. This was the beginning of Voices of the Generations, a unique and personal approach to Holocaust education.

Julie Kohner has presented Voices of the Generations for the past 26 years. Julie's parents wrote an autobiography, *Hanna and Walter, A Love Story*, which traces their journey from 1930s pre-war Europe to reuniting after the end of the war.

Voices of the Generations teaches the devastation of the Holocaust through its impact on one family. It is through their only child, Julie, that Hanna and Walter's story lives on.



My name is Julie Kohner and I am the daughter of a Holocaust survivor. In 1990 I created Voices of the Generations as a way to preserve and share the memories of Holocaust survivor stories. My mother, Hanna Kohner, survived four concentration camps including Auschwitz. She passed away in 1990. Since then it has been my passion to tell her unique story of love overcoming evil against the backdrop of World War II Europe. Her experience was also the basis for an early 1950's television program, the first to tell a survivor's story. It is my hope that people of all ages, ethnic and religious backgrounds will be moved and inspired by her story and the stories of other survivors and their children, known as second generation. This will keep the memory alive.

## PASSOVER L'SHANA HABA'A B'YERUSHALAYIM

a Nishtana? Why is this Passover different for me (and my family) than in all other years (with the exception of 2017)? Having sent my children to school at Golda Och Academy, I have known for a while that this year, my son would be with his 12th grade classmates on



the Neshama program (under the direction of our own CBI member, Rabbi Meirav Kallush) spending three months (February to May) traveling in Israel (with the first week spent in Poland), and that Mike and I would be going to visit him in Israel for Passover (just as we had done two years ago when my daughter did the same program)! I am beyond excited for this upcoming trip and very grateful to CBI and to Rabbi Bayar for enabling me to be able to spend Pesach in Israel again this year, together with my son.

When I recited the phrase, "L'Shana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim" (Next year in Jerusalem) at the conclusion of last year's Seder, it took on extra special meaning for me. I want to share with you what I learned about the origin and significance of reciting the phrase, *L'Shana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim*, at the end of every Passover Seder. The phrase became part of the Haggadah in the Middle Ages and it is connected to the theme of redemption. At the Seder, each of us is supposed to feel as though we personally experienced the physical redemption at the Red Sea. As the Haggadah says, "For it was not our forefathers alone whom the Holy One redeemed; G-d redeemed us, too, with them," and, "In every generation, every individual must feel as if he or she personally had come out of Egypt." Then, as we end the Seder, we utter this phrase that reaches forward to the coming of the Messiah and to complete spiritual redemption, represented by Jerusalem. In this interpretation, Jerusalem refers to the actual city, with reference to its Temple being rebuilt when the Messiah comes.

While many Jews have no issues expressing a longing for the Messiah at the conclusion of the Seder, there are Jews for whom this concept doesn't resonate. And how about the Jews who recite this phrase who are already somewhere in Israel, or specifically in Jerusalem for their Seder? Perhaps one can use a less literal interpretation of the phrase to make it more meaningful and relevant. There is a Midrash based on verse 3 of Psalm 122, "Jerusalem was built as a city that is knit (or connected) together," which the Rabbis suggested meant that there are two ways to think of Jerusalem. *Yerushalayim Shel Matah* is the earthly Jerusalem, which has been ravaged for centuries by war and strife, and *Yerushalayim Shel Matalah*, the upper Jerusalem–a heavenly version, relieved of the contradictions of human life. This is the ideal to which the earthly Jerusalem that represents a sense of holiness and of hope.

The words "next year" give us the sense of possibility and potential – that things don't have to stay the way they are. We can take action to bring about change in our lives, in our communities and in the world. In a commentary on Elijah's cup, Rabbi David Hartman, in *The Leader's Guide to the Family Participation Haggadah: A Different Night*, suggests that Elijah's Cup is the cup of hope. "Passover is the night for reckless dreams; for visions about what a human being can be, what society can be, what people can be, what history may become. That is the significance of *L'Shana Haba'a B'Yerushalayim* (Next year in Jerusalem)."

I wish all of you a Hag Pesach Same'ach. May your Pesach celebration be filled with joy, meaning and hope!

## **Beineynu** By Harvey Brenner, Executive Director

"On behalf of USCJ, the member congregations, the USCJ board and officers, I bring you greetings as you begin your 2019 NAASE Conference." Leslie Lichter, USCJ Chief Operating Officer.

....And so began four whirlwind days of study, prayer, meetings, eating and commiserating with and among  $\sim$ 130 attendees at the 2019 NAASE

(North American Association of Synagogue Executives) Annual International Conference, this year in West Palm Beach, FL last month. Leslie discussed how important the relationship between member kehillot and the national organization are and how we, as senior synagogue executives enhance, strengthen and foster that connection.

As is our custom, every year we convene just before Purim in one location (last year, Israel and next year Houston) to share time together to help each other learn, grow and advance in our competency and knowledge. This year's theme, "*Peering over the horizon; preparing for the next 5 years*" was particularly interesting to me and I think, ultimately, to our congregation. Ideally, some of the information and strategies we developed in Palm Beach can assist our kehillah as we transition from one rabbi to another, from one rabbinic style to another and to help us grow the congregation literally "from one generation to another".

Here's a smattering of what was presented over the several days of the conference .....

**Bob Leventhal,** USCJ's Kehillah Leadership Specialist, was our first official presenter who shared with us what is necessary within a congregation to build an effective executive-clergy-lay leadership team and how we can improve communications between and among the "three-legged stool" (as my Reform colleagues define that relationship. If one leg is weak, the stool wobbles and eventually tips over. So too, if all three do not work in harmony, the congregation ultimately suffers).

**Rabbi Joshua Rabin**, *Director of Innovation at USCJ* (and also a rabbinic candidate here at CBI) presented his thoughts on "Innovation as a Process". During his session, we learned that to become innovative means dedicating resources and talents towards thinking out of the norms, challenging ourselves and our communities to try different (even "crazy") things. Be flexible and "build things out of Legos, not bricks!"

**Jonathan Bundt**, *Founder, Masa Consulting*, shared with us ways to make your shuls safe and secure, while at the same time keeping them open and welcoming. It's a difficult dichotomy, balancing one against the other, but it can be done with some creativity and awareness training.

Hannah Strasser Olson, Chief Donor Relations Officer and Director



of Marketing, Melvin J. Berman Hebrew Academy, MD, shared with us interesting perspectives on "how to reach Millennials, Gen-Xers, and other hard to reach demographic groups", a topic of particular relevance to us as we move throughout the rabbinic transitioning process.

Additionally, as with all membership organizations, we had a plenary/business session "for members only". In it, I served two roles.... I chaired the committee that wrote the new "Code of Ethical Standards" for NAASE (we hadn't updated it in almost 20 years) https://www.naase.org/about/about-the-ethical-standards/ which was unanimously and enthusiastically adopted by the plenum; additionally, I was elected Senior Vice President and B'zrat HaShem, will be its next president in two years. I am looking forward to continuing my years of service to my chosen profession and this wonderful peer organization (which has helped me grow and develop to better serve my congregations).

NAASE specializes in "peer to peer" study sessions known as "NAASE U". In them, members with expertise and knowledge in subjects from which our kehillot may benefit, are urged to present mini-workshops for their colleagues. There were about a dozen such efforts, and I am privileged to have presented one of them, a workshop on "Ethical Decision-making in the Synagogue: a case study approach to balancing the competing vectors of Jewish Values, Civil Law and Common Sense, in crafting the decisions synagogues and their leaders have to make on an almost daily basis." Other sessions may be more 'best practices' (Employee Supervision and Evaluation), informative (Fun with Software) or just plain educational (Top 10 Bookkeeping Tips).

And last, there is a vendor marketplace where those businesses that market to the synagogue world (shul database management software, pew and bima designers, electronic message boards, insurance agencies, etc.) set up booths and afford us a first-hand view of what's new, what's upcoming and what's available so that we can bring back to our respective kehillot items of immediate interest that can help with a specific project or venture.

I have never failed to learn something of relevance at each of the conferences I've attended in the past and this one was certainly no different. As we enter this new era for CBI, I hope to employ many of the processes and strategies learned in helping to foster our mission and purpose.

Thank you for supporting my efforts to learn and grow in this profession and I hope you remain pleased with your "return on that investment"!

## THE STORY OF THE STATE OF ISRAEL THROUGH ITS MUSIC WITH LEN HAUSMAN

Music is an ideal way to learn about a country's history and culture. In the initial module of this class we will be learning about Israel's first two decades through the music of Naomi Shemer, who is known as the first lady of Israeli song and poetry. Her music is regarded as the soundtrack of the lives of Israelis who came of age in the 60's, 70's, and 80's.

The class will learn about the composer's life and how it was interwoven with the development of the State of Israel as reflected in her music. The text for this class is Naomi Shemer's song lyrics, in translation, as we explore their context and meaning. We will approach the lyrics as we would a poem, looking for their resonance and allusions. The Hebrew text will also be available and we will learn some key Hebrew words in the lyrics.

An added bonus is that while Naomi Shemer did record her songs, the most well-known versions are those done by others. These versions were sung by the leading vocalists and groups of the day and the class will gain the familiarity of a 'Who's Who' in the history of Israeli song as we listen to and enjoy her music.

#### ABOUT THE CLASS LEADER

Len Hausman has had an interest in the music of Israel since his youth. He completed a year of training in Israel toward being a teacher in the diaspora, sponsored by the World Zionist Organization. He has enjoyed teaching on a range of subjects over the years at CBI's Shabbat Journeyers' Minyan and other venues. Professionally, Len is a psychologist with practices in Greenwich Village, New York and locally.

Several women played important roles in the exodus of the Jews from Egypt. Midwives Shifra and Puah defied Pharaoh's orders to kill newborn Jewish babies. Yocheved, gave birth to Moses and kept him hidden for a few months and then placed him in reeds along the banks of the Nile River. Miriam kept an eye on her brother, who was rescued by Pharaoh's daughter, Batya. Miriam then offered to get a Hebrew nursemaid (Yocheved) for the young child. Miriam reappears in the story as the Jewish people wandered in the desert and "Miriam's Well," a source of water, followed and provided for them.

Despite their importance to the story, not one of these women is mentioned in the Passover Haggadah. Why not? A common answer explains the absence of women as a reflection of the Haggadah's central theme: responsibility for the Exodus belongs to God rather than to human beings. Indeed, Moses is mentioned only once in passing in the Haggadah. But a closer look does not support that view. While it certainly considers God the director of history, the Haggadah features a huge cast of male characters, including many (male) rabbis, Abraham, his brother, Nahor, and their father Terah; Isaac, Jacob and Esau and their uncle, Laban; Aaron and Pharaoh; David and his father, Jesse; Elijah, Haman, Daniel, and more. The only woman mentioned at all is Hadassah (Esther) and only in a song.

Because women were given short shrift in the Haggadah, many new traditions have emerged. Miriam's cup. An orange on the seder plate. And, of course, the Women's Seder! Please join us on Sunday, April 7 at 6:00 for our very own Women's Seder led by Cantor Lorna Wallach and featuring the CBI Band. We will share our traditions and recipes, and you will get to taste different kinds of charoset. The cost of this biennial Sisterhood event is \$25 per person and includes dinner.

Are you afraid to open your kitchen cabinet because you know food storage containers are going to come pouring out like an erupting volcano? Do you spend hours searching for the email you need? Will you regret it tomorrow if you give away all of your (now adult) children's preschool artwork? And how many tote bags will you really use? ## **ISRAEL AFFAIRS**

You may have noticed that my articles have been very long, much longer than most other articles within the Bulletin. This month's Bulletin Article might begin a new era in which I write shorter articles.

Why am I writing less this month? Because as you read this, the 2019 AIPAC Policy

Conference is over, and I am no longer urging all of my fellow congregants to attend the Conference. And, as I write this, the Policy Conference has not taken place, so that I am unable to describe for you what happened at the event.

#### 2019 AIPAC Policy Conference

March 24-26, 2019

Well, I can tell you a little bit -as I write this, I have a schedule of what I am attending at the 2019 Conference, and there are some fascinating sessions on my schedule. By the time you read this, I will have heard Rabbi Dr,. Donniel Hartman address the Relationship between Israel and World Jewry. I listened as Dr. Jonathan Schanzer described President Trump's Foreign Policy in the Middle East. I heard Sarah Tuttle Singer, from the Times of Israel, describe her new book, "Jerusalem, Drawn and Quartered." And most importantly, I joined with my fellow citizens to lobby our legislators on maintaining a strong US Israel Relationship.

I do have to make a brief comment about next year's Policy Conference. It will be held Sunday March 1 - March 3, and once again there will be a Shabbaton the weekend before. The conference will be held the week before Purim, so well ahead of the spring holidays. Talk to your fellow congregants who attended this year, and decide to attend next year.

## Israel Elections April 9, 2019: Webinar April 2, 16, 2019

The Federation's Global Connection department is hosting a 3 part webinar to explain the Israeli Elections being held on April 9, 2019. There are three sessions as described below:

April 2: Parties and Campaigns - Candidates, Platforms and impact of the media

April 16: Results and Initial Analysis

Because Israel is a parliamentary system, while the results of the election will be known immediately after the votes are cast, the formation of the new government, and even the identity of the new government may take . longer to develop. ### **Observation about Israel and anti-semitism**

During February I attended a CRC Mission to Washington DC, which included visits with our congressional representatives, and meetings with political and governmental leaders. Among the people we heard from was Elon Carr, the new Special Envoy for Monitoring and Combatting Anti Semitism. In his talk, he identified the three main goals he will be pursuing:

- Not ignoring any region of the world
- Call out bad actors and backing our allies (giving credit for good behavior)
- Eradicate any attempt to distinguish between anti-Zionism and anti-Semitism

Specifically Ambassador Carr called on all countries to adopt the IHRA (International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance definition of Anti-Semitism:

Antisemitism is a certain perception of Jews, which may be expressed as hatred toward Jews. Rhetorical and physical manifestations of antisemitism are directed toward Jewish or non-Jewish individuals and/or their property, toward Jewish community institutions and religious facilities."

He also expressed very directly that the attempt to Boycott, Divest and Sanction (BDS) Israel is anti-Semitism, and he sees as part of his role fighting against this attempt to judge Israel in a way other nations are not being judged.
