MUSICAL NOTES

This month, the Hebrew month of Iyar, we celebrate Yom Ha'atzma'ut, Israel's Independence Day. Join us for a musical celebration of Israel's 71st birthday, singing some favorite Israeli songs following the Shir Shabbat service on Friday evening, May 10th at 6:00 PM.



Each time I visit Israel, I come back inspired by the experience of being in the homeland of my People

and with a renewed sense of how important it is for me and for all of us to make it a priority to educate ourselves about the many difficult issues, as well as all of the innovations and other noteworthy advances coming out of Israel, and also to support Israel in any way we can.

Having just returned from visiting my son and other relatives in Israel, I share with you this article about hope – The Hope – *Hatikvah*. When the State of Israel was declared in 1948, *Hatikvah* was unofficially proclaimed the national anthem. However, it did not become the official anthem until November 2004, when it was sanctioned by the Knesset in an amendment to the "Flag and Coat-of-Arms Law" (now called "The Flag, Coat-of-Arms, and National Anthem Law").

The text of *Hatikvah* was written by the Galician-Jewish poet Naftali Herz Imber in Zolochiv (Ukraine) in 1878 as a nine-stanza poem called *Tikvateinu* ("Our Hope"). It was supposed to be an expression of his thoughts and feelings following the construction of one of the first Jewish settlements in Israel, known as Petakh Tikva. Published in Imber's first book, *Barkai*, the poem was subsequently adopted as the anthem of Hovevei Zion and later of the Zionist Movement at the First Zionist Congress in 1897. The text was later revised by the settlers of Rishon LeZion, subsequently undergoing a number of other changes. In its modern rendering, the text of the anthem includes only the first stanza and refrain of the original poem. The poem is assumed to have been set to music (to the melody of a Moldavian – Rumanian folksong) by Samuel Cohen, an immigrant from Moldavia. The melody is originally based on "La Mantovana", a 16th century Italian song. This melody had been famously used by Czech composer Bedřich Smetana in his symphonic poem Die Moldau.

There are several unique features about *Hatikvah* that are worth noting. *Hatikvah* is written in a minor key, which is often perceived as mournful in tone and thus rarely used in national anthems. It was written in Hebrew, many years before Hebrew became the language of the Jewish State, when the future of the language and the State were unclear. It was written outside the future State, with the poet saving "...towards the east, an eye looks to Zion." The dream is of a return to Zion, which is integral to our religion, yet the poem is secular and makes no mention of God. The text, and how it is written, also raises other issues. The hope that the poem mentions is conditional - the second part of the poem describes a hope, but the first section provides the condition for the fulfillment of this hope. The phrase "Our hope is not yet lost" clearly conveys the tenuous nature of Jewish hope and existence. As a people, we have hope but we are always in danger of losing it. With the establishment of the State of Israel, has the hope of the song been fulfilled? As we grapple with these issues, may we continue to strive to "be a free people in our own land" by strengthening our commitment to and support for Israel. And let us pray for peace in Israel, in the Middle East and in the world.

Jews count!

This is the time of year when we count the Omer (beginning on the second night of Pesach) and we continue until *Erev Shavuot*. *Shavuot* ('weeks' in English) comes from the same root word "*sheva*" as the number seven, or the 7-day mourning period known as "*shiva*", so we count 7 x 7 or 49 total days from *Pesach* to *Shavuot*.



We recount the Pesach story of freedom and count all the way to the *Shavuot* acceptance of responsibility as a Jewish People. We move from being "slaves unto Pharaoh" to servants of *HaShem* in the course of forty days. We recount exiting *Eretz Mitzrayim*, leaving behind our harsh, restricted lives and just a few short weeks later, *Moshe Rabeinu* descends from *Har Sinai* (Mt. Sinai) with the Torah so that we may accept God's Covenant and become the Chosen People.

It is written in Psalm 90:12, "Teach us to number our days that we may attain a heart of wisdom". There are some people who know the price of everything but the value of nothing, right? We know them, and in many cases, feel sorry for them. We're taught that numbers alone aren't a measure of one's worth or one's success. Coupling numbers with the wisdom to understand their inner meaning and interrelation, that's what is really important.

And that brings us to the next few weeks when we are approaching the end of a trying year of transition but also one where many positive conversations took place, programs and events developed and were enjoyed by the membership. These, and many more like them, laid the foundation for next year and many years beyond.

Our rabbis teach us, "without bread there can be no torah and without torah there can be no bread." After the Annual meeting in June, you're going to receive your annual membership commitment packets. We'll communicate to you what the amounts are, explain how those budgeting figures were derived and in general, explain the financial conditions and obligations that come along with membership at CBI.

It's easy to open the envelope, look at the numbers (with no appreciation for what they represent) and grumble about them being "so high". It's too easy to not give any thought or value to the friendships we've made and shared because of our synagogue community; it's too simple to devalue its worth, without knowing how supportive a community like

ours is at a time of sickness or loss. It's far too common to dismiss the benefits of the religious, musical, educational and social programs (that are at no or low cost to the synagogue community all year long) because of the commitment fees we've collected that so generously support them. It hurts when someone deemphasizes just how meaningful a Friday night Oneg or Shabbat Kiddush luncheon can be (when old and new friends 'break bread' together in our Social Hall or MPR).

So, this year, let's try to open our annual membership statements with joy and a smile, remembering all the positive experiences shared over the past few years, rather than angst or chagrin. CBI needs the support of every member to fund our services, programs, classes and events and we thank you in advance for your continued support and generosity.

We, through your dues, donations and "over and above" contributions, provide both 'bread & torah' to our entire congregation. If you're amenable, why not become a member of our Legacy Circle? THE STORY OF THE STATE OF ISRAEL THROUGH ITS MUSIC

WITH LEN HAUSMAN

Music is an ideal way to learn about a country's history and culture. In the initial module of this class we will be learning about Israel's first two decades through the music of Naomi Shemer, who is known as the first lady of Israeli song and poetry. Her music is regarded as the soundtrack of the lives of Israelis who came of age in the 60's, 70's, and 80's.

The class will learn about the composer's life and how it was interwoven with the development of the State of Israel as reflected in her music. The text for this class is Naomi Shemer's song lyrics, in translation, as we explore their context and meaning. We will approach the lyrics as we would a poem, looking for their resonance and allusions. The Hebrew text will also be available and we will learn some key Hebrew words in the lyrics.

An added bonus is that while Naomi Shemer did record her songs, the most well-known versions are those done by others. These versions were sung by the leading vocalists and groups of the day and the class will gain the familiarity of a 'Who's Who' in the history of Israeli song as we listen to and enjoy her music.

ABOUT THE CLASS LEADER

Len Hausman has had an interest in the music of Israel since his youth. He completed a year of training in Israel toward being a teacher in the diaspora, sponsored by the World Zionist Organization. He has enjoyed teaching on a range of subjects over the years at CBI's Shabbat Journeyers' Minyan and other venues. Professionally, Len is a psychologist with practices in Greenwich Village, New York and locally.







2019 AIPAC Policy Conference March 1-3, 2020

Next year's Policy Conference will be held Sunday March 1 – March 3, and once again there will be a Shabbaton the weekend before. The conference will be held the week before Purim, so well ahead of the

spring holidays. Next year's conference is in an election year, and AIPAC has usually invited Presidential candidates to address the Conference during election years. So, this conference may be even more historic than usual. Talk to your fellow congregants who attended this year and decide to come with them next year.

2019 AIPAC Policy Conference March 24-26, 2019

I hope to have reports from other congregants who attended the Policy Conference this year in future issues of the Bulletin. I am pleased to include here a report from Nancy Tenenbaum, who has attended the Policy Conference for the past 10 years.

I have enjoyed attending the AIPAC Policy Conference with Joe and other members of the CBI Community. It is exciting and a privilege to lobby our Congressional Representatives and Senators. The variety of information gained from the Plenary and breakout session is always valuable. This year I attended a session entitled "Talking about Israel in a Politically Divisive Time" because this is such a timely subject.

The panel session was led by Chancellor Arnold Eisen from the Jewish Theological Seminary. Members of the panel included Lisa Eisen, Vice President of the Shusterman Family Foundation, Dr. Michael Koplow, Policy Director of the Israel Policy Forum and Chloe Valdary from Theory of Enchantment, LLC. I was most inspired by Ms. Valdary, who has a book, and podcast and a website www.theoryofenchantment.com . She stressed that the US Israel relationship must remain a bipartisan issue, that diversity is our strength, and that we must bring back compassion and empathy.

After attending this session, I feel confident and empowered to continue to discuss and endorse the US Israel relationship.

I can report to you that the 2019 Policy Conference was different than many in the past.

Much of this year's Conference focused on declaring our rights as Americans to support a strong US Israel relationship and our rights to lobby and endorse candidates who agree with our beliefs. Many speakers denounced Anti-Semitism not just around the world, but here in the United States. In response to recent comments about the powerful influence of AIPAC, Meghan McCain proclaimed, "Americans don't support Israel because AIPAC is influential. AIPAC is influential because Americans support Israel."

A second major theme expressed by many speakers was the need for Bi-partisanship in support for Israel. While this is a theme at every policy conference, at this year's Conference the emphasis was even more evident. Because so much of what occurs in Washington now is encumbered with partisanship, it is so important to focus on real bi-partisanship. And personally, I was not convinced by the number of people who made this point by declaring (not in these words) "We are bi-partisan, but those guys are not." I found the explanation of the new Senior Senator from Arizona, Krysten Sinema on target:

"When I first got to the US Senate...there was an attempt to politicize the United States support for Israel and its defense systems – and I was unwilling to allow that politicization to happen – so I chose to vote yes on the legislation because I believe in the legislation. That's It. I believe in it. . . . The votes such as that first vote provide an opportunity . . . to push the partisanship aside, focus on the issue and recommit to the shared relationship that the US and Israel have."

There was also another issue hanging over the Conference – the assertion that Democratic Presidential candidates were boycotting the conference. There was a call by another political organization asking that the candidates boycott the conference. While the call was irrelevant since candidates are generally invited in election years, not the year before, the organization claimed success when the candidates did not appear on the main stage.
