President's Message

Sunrise, sunset, swiftly flow the years: after thirty introspective and transformational years, Rabbi Bayar is retiring from Congregation B'nai Israel. As we bid farewell to our rabbi of a generation and a half, we reflect on the many ways in which his legacy and leadership live on in the very soul of the CBI community. Early in Rabbi Bayar's tenure, he endorsed and encouraged the move to egalitarian practice; I cannot imagine a more impactful change

in our congregational life. He came down from the bima, setting the reader's table among the pews arranged around it, inviting the entire kehillah (congregation) into the liturgy and Torah reading and instituting one of the hallmarks of life at B'nai Israel. His interactive sermons have engaged our minds, pushing us to think for ourselves, rather than simply be consumers of knowledge. Throughout his time at CBI, Rabbi Bayar has made room for congregants to learn, to lead and to flourish both during services and as lay leaders for our community.

During the past few months, congregants have shared with me some of their cherished moments with Rabbi Bayar. Some have regaled me with stories about trips to Israel and service trips to Kentucky; others have been moved by his care during difficult times. His teaching has inspired congregants of all ages, from our young people who enjoyed his classes at BBRS linking Talmudic lessons to Disney movies to adults studying Pirkei Avot, contemporary Jewish philosophers, the Jacob narrative and more. As Rabbi Emeritus, Rabbi Bayar's everyday presence will be missed, but his influence will continue to guide us in our Jewish way of life.

Kicking off June in a festive way, CBI will again be marching in the Salute to Israel Parade in New York City on June 2. We will first join at the synagogue for breakfast and poster making and then take the bus into the city together. Please RSVP to the office to reserve your spot on the bus. On Monday evening, June 3, our Sisterhood will be hosting its annual Installation and Dinner to break bread as they install their new board. Thank you to Ruth Kirshner and Laurie Kavowras and their Board for a wonderful year. The CBI preschool will be celebrating the year end and toasting its graduates on June 6 at 10am. Continuing the festive mood, we will be having our first Musical Shabbat and Dinner on Friday, June 14 and a Holy Happy Hour on Friday, June 28.

While our children may insist that June marks the end of learning, for us, June is a time to rejoice in the study of Torah. During Shabbat services on Erev Shavuot, June 8, we will inaugurate our beautiful new Torah Covers depicting scenes of Jerusalem followed by a special kiddush to thank all those who participated in this year's fundraiser. Special thanks to Elizabeth Cohen, Heidi Cohen and their committee for stepping up to raise these needed funds for our community. Erev Shavuot services will be that evening

MUSICAL NOTES

Every year on the Festival of Shavuot, Jews celebrate the giving of the Torah and we renew our acceptance of this gift from G-d. This June 9th and 10th as we celebrate *Shavuot* at CBI, when we sing "Vayehee Binsoah Ha'Aron" and the Ark curtain is opened revealing the magnificent new covers on our Sifrei Torah, I am already anticipating the



increased joy and excitement that I know I will feel about seeing our Torah scrolls cloaked in such beautiful and symbolically meaningful covers. The captivating artwork, using rich and soothing colors and interesting textures in depicting Jerusalem and other scenes in Israel, is a poignant way to keep our hearts and minds directed towards *Eretz Yisrael*, our Jewish homeland, and our beloved holy city of Jerusalem as our Kehillah (community) joins together to pray and hear the Torah chanted. With the Torah being our most sacred and significant text and sacred object, it is most fitting that our congregation (thanks to the inspiration and hard work of a few congregants who were the catalysts for this project!) can fulfill the Jewish concept of *Hiddur Mitzvah* through this CBI-wide endeavor.

From the Torah we learn of the Mitzvot (commandments) which Jews are obligated to perform. Mitzvot are a means of expressing our love and connection to G-d and, we are told, we should strive to perform each commandment in the most beautiful fashion. This is the concept of *Hiddur Mitzvah* – we should seek not only to fulfill the basic commandment, but to do it in the most beautiful manner by adding an aesthetic dimension. This concept originates from the verse, "*This is My G-d and I will glorify Him*" (Exodus 15:2) which the Sages interpreted as an exhortation to beautify the commandments in the most glorious fashion.

Beauty enhances the performance of *Mitzvot* by appealing to our senses. There are many different types of artistry that can contribute to our enjoyment and spirituality of engaging in religious acts. The music that is used in worship is also intended to enhance the liturgy and to touch our souls. Our CBI community is blessed to have developed a beautiful, strong and exciting new tradition where on several Shabbatot in the spring and summer, we begin our Kabbalat Shabbat services at an earlier time on Friday evening (and finish before sundown!) so that we can enjoy musical accompaniment for the services, provided by our own talented, dedicated and enthusiastic CBI volunteer band. These instrumentally enhanced services have been very well received by many and the ruach (spirit) of the service is truly uplifting! This year's instrumental musical services will be on JUNE 14th at 7:00pm and JULY 12th at 7:00 pm. PLEASE NOTE THE EARLIER START TIME and THAT THIS IS THE ONLY SERVICE on the evenings of the instrumental music services. I encourage all of you to make every effort to join us in welcoming Shabbat through a spiritual and spirited Friday night experience. All are welcome to attend so bring your family, friends and neighbors!

If you remember, last year I wrote about how June is a 'bittersweet' month for me (as it's the month my father Arty (z"l) passed away in 2012 and also the time when I get to be grandpa on Father's Day to my now $6\frac{1}{2}$ year old granddaughter, Averi).



Well, this year, it's even more complicated and yes, even more poignant and unsettling!

As I write this article in early May, my son is set to remarry, in just under two weeks. He's getting married to a lovely lady and hopefully beginning their new home together, living "happily ever after".

Unfortunately, her father suffers from C.O.P.D. and after a nearly two-week stay in the hospital for pneumonia, infections, and other breathing-related complications, he has just been given 3-6 months to live! Nobody expected that prognosis, least of all the wedding couple.

The only solution is to receive a lung transplant, and God Willing, he'll be added to the National Registry list this week (after he meets certain criteria and passes a gauntlet of tests).

I can't imagine what my future daughter-in-law's family is experiencing as they prepare for her wedding and perhaps a major health crisis with her father, both at the same time. How on one hand his greatest wish was to walk his youngest daughter down the aisle to meet her groom and now they are discussing "end of life" issues and running all the "what if" scenarios in their heads, "just in case" the worst happens.

Can you imagine marking both the happiest day in your life and potentially one of the saddest, God Forbid, a mere few days or weeks apart? I can't, and every time I see my future daughter-in-law since we heard the news, I want to cry.

Sometimes, life's not fair! But it's at times like these that being a member of a community becomes really important. Sharing both times of euphoric joy and crushing sadness are rendered 'manageable' when spread over the shoulders of our friends and family.

So, for me, that's one of the very positive things about doing the work I do. While I'm not clergy or an educator, and much of the time my duties are not sacerdotal in nature, I do help and enable others to perform those functions for this community. If you have a simcha, or some sort of personal crisis, the work I do helps others to be there for you when you need them to be. It's sort of a 'covenant' among our members, donors, supporters, clergy, educators and staff.

So, in this month when we celebrate Shavuot, (when the Jewish People received "the torah" from HaShem) it is appropriate to remember that everything we do at CBI is inter-connected and we are here to help and support one another. As I noted last month, it is said: "without Torah there can be no bread and without bread, there can be no Torah."

To our congregants:

After much deliberation, Rabbi Dario Bialer has decided not to accept our offer of employment as rabbi of Congregation B'nai Israel. Despite our concerted efforts and prolonged negotiations, he cites personal and communal obligations in his current home of Rio de Janeiro as the reasons behind this decision.

Although we are disappointed in this result given the widespread support of Rabbi Bialer from the congregation, we are now ready and able to put into effect our alternate plan, free from any constraints of having extended an offer. We have communicated our intention to select an interim rabbi and then commence a new search for our permanent rabbi to both United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism and the Rabbinical Assembly, which have endorsed this approach. The Rabbi Search Committee will be reconvening imminently to discuss our options for the coming year as well as to consider any lessons learned thus far to improve our search.

Personally, I would like to thank the Rabbi Search Committee and the Negotiating Committee for their hard work and focus on a fantastic process and the entire congregation for their engagement and enthusiasm. I am confident that our ongoing efforts will ultimately result in a new rabbi that will complement and lead our congregation into the future.


Tikkun Leil Shavuot / Study Session





While the concept of *Hiddur* Mitzvah usually focuses on the aesthetics of the objects we use to enhance our experience of doing Mitzvot, sometimes there are people who also enrich our Jewish lives by bringing deeper meaning and understanding of our sacred texts, liturgy, Jewish ethics and values and engaging us in Tikkun Olam and other mitzvot. I have had the privilege of having Rabbi Bayar as a colleague for the past 21 years. I, like so many others over the past 30 years at CBI, have learned a great deal from Rabbi Bayar, and I am grateful for his support and comfort at both joyous occasions in my family's life as well as in difficult times of illness and loss. I wish Rabbi Bayar much fulfillment and success in all of his future endeavors.

I hope to continue to build on the foundation of his leadership as all of us in the CBI community move forward. Rabbi Bayar has often quoted Rabbi Moshe Chaim Luzzatto (1707- 1746) also known by the Hebrew acronym RaMHaL, (רמה"ל), who was a prominent 18th century Italian Jewish Rabbi, Kabbalist, and philosopher. The following quote of Rabbi Moshe Chaim Luzzatto seems particularly relevant at this time. "Everything in life serves as a challenge and test to elevate us. ISRAEL AFFAIRS

2020 AIPAC Policy Conference March 1-3, 2020

Next year's Policy Conference will be held Sunday March 1 – March 3, and once again there will be a Shabbaton the weekend before. The conference will be held the week before Purim, so well ahead of the

spring holidays. Next year's conference is in an election year, and AIPAC has usually invited Presidential candidates to address the Conference during election years. So, this conference may be even more historic than usual. Talk to your fellow congregants who attended this year and decide to come with them next year.

I have in mind three subjects to discuss concerning the United States and Israel. The three issues I am thinking about are:

- 1) About our trip to Israel, from Pesach to Yom Ha'atzmaut
- 2) How to discuss volatile issues with people who disagree with you
- The recent Israeli attempt to land a spacecraft on the moon.

Visiting Israel News

April, May 2019

When I travel and have something scheduled I like to prepare for it the night before. Thus, the night before I started my Ulpan sessions, I checked to make sure I had enough coins to be able to pay quickly for my bus ride from our neighborhood to the Ulpan, which is next door to the Dan Panorama in Tel Aviv. It turns out planning is good, because my Tel Aviv family saw what I was doing and commented, "Oh, you can't use coins on the bus anymore." I was surprised but pleased that at least I found out about it before I was standing on the bus with the driver speaking rapidly to me in Hebrew and confusing me completely.

So, for all of you who may be travelling in Tel Aviv soon – the use of coins and paper money to pay bus fare has now been replaced by an electronic card called a *Rav-Kav*. This card must be purchased ahead of time for 5 shekels, and then preloaded with credits. I paid 100 shekels and got credit for 125 shekels to purchase fares. With my trip half over, and my class within a couple of days of completion, I still have over 75 shekels left. Oh, the places we can go!!

Biggest difference between this trip in April/May and last year's July/August? The first 10 days had high temperatures mostly below 70 degrees. And after that, we have only reached mid 80's. It's interesting when the morning temperature is about 60 degrees, that I am in short sleeves and people I pass

are wearing heavy coats.

The timing of this trip was designed to include Pesach in Israel (which we had done before), but also Yom HaShoah, Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'atzmaut. When you next see me, if you have not already, be sure to ask me about our special holidays in Israel.

You can also ask me to relate some of my Shufersal (grocery store) stories. We had some interesting experiences. By special request, I may tell you these special stories in Hebrew, as telling stories in Hebrew has been a major part of my second experience at Ulpan Or.

Can't we just get along? About a book by Arthur Brooks

One interesting presentation at AIPAC was given by Arthur Brooks, the President of American Enterprise Institute. He was explaining to a plenary session (all the delegates) the major theme of his new book, Love Your Enemies: How Decent People Can Save America from the Culture of Contempt. Basically, the book proposes that when we are faced with disagreements about what to do, we should at least find agreement on the values we are trying to advance. Never answer contempt with contempt, but with warm heartedness and love. We hope that in our community, we never display contempt. But it is worth trying to realize that people who disagree with us are neither stupid nor evil; they simply disagree with what we believe.

It was an interesting challenge to try to improve the caliber of political discussions in this time of contention, and I have been looking for an opportunity to try it out. (While I continue working on finishing Brooks' book).

What about failure – is it the road to success? The Israel Space Program

Now remember I wanted to comment on the SpaceIL and IAI (Israel Aerospace Industries) attempt to successfully send a spacecraft to the moon. The attempt successfully orbited the moon, successfully approached the moon, but failed to land on the moon. As Opher Doron, the General Manager of IAI commented, "We had a failure in the spacecraft; we unfortunately have not managed to land successfully." Following the disappointing failure, Prime Minister Netanyahu stated, "If at first you don't succeed, you try again."

You can be sure that when SpaceIL and IAI try again, they will not send the same spacecraft as before with hopes that this time it will land successfully. They will analyze the recent failure and make adjustments to assure success next time.

Current Events at the end of April Comments on important events

The last weekend of April including Shabbat and the final day of Pesach in the US was noteworthy for two bad reasons. Not only did we discover a dehumanizing anti-Semitic cartoon in the International New York Times, but we experienced another shocking and violent assault on our Jewish community. Despite whatever comes our way it is critical that we stand up for ourselves. One lesson from the attack in Poway is that strong reactions to the gunmen by people in the building prevented more harm. As unfortunate as it sounds, the people there had learned about how to respond from the events six months earlier in Pittsburgh. And while the severity of the insulting cartoon in the International NY Times is less than the loss of a life, we must respond aggressively to let the world know that insults of this kind are not acceptable.
