Musical Notes

A synagogue is a unique treasure. Throughout the centuries, wherever Jews have lived and journeyed, the synagogue has provided a haven for our souls and a sanctuary in which to gather as a community to worship and to learn. In the synagogue, the essential times of life and rites of passage such as welcoming a newborn into the



Covenant, the acceptance of adulthood and marriage are celebrated and made sacred. The synagogue can be a place you go to restore your strength and courage, and find the patience and wisdom with which to meet the many demands of life. Being part of a synagogue community can help you nurture and strengthen your connections to Judaism, to G-d and to Israel. One way we do this is through prayer, and particularly, through communal prayer. Prayer is at the heart of our spiritual experience during the High Holy Days.

The Haftarah that is read on the first day of Rosh Hashanah, the story of Hannah's journey from the heartbreak of childlessness to the glory of motherhood, exemplifies the power of prayer. As the story of Hannah shows us, prayer can be a means of expressing and unburdening ourselves of our deepest pain, and faith can help us achieve the courage and strength to deal with it. We all face difficulty and pain at some point in our lives. What a blessing it is to be part of a synagogue community where you can find comfort, meaning and support.

For me, one of the High Holyday prayers that we sing together on Yom Kippur, "Ki Anu amekha, v'atah eloheinu," provides that feeling of comfort, purpose and the support of the community. This early medieval poem emphasizes our relationship to God – but focuses on "We" rather than on our personal relationship with the Divine. "For We are Your people, and You are our God; We are Your children and You are our parent. We are Your servants, and You are our master; We are Your congregation, and You are our portion."

The prayers of confession (Viddui) that we recite in the plural as a community on Yom

Kippur are preceded by this short poem. As we prepare for the daunting task of confession, the text of this poem utilizes simple metaphors to reassure us that our connection to the Holy One is certain. The prayer ends with the ultimate promise that we seek, the guarantee of a communication that will be reciprocal and effectual: "We are the ones You address, You are the One to Whom we speak." *Ki Anu Amekha* is essential to the *Vidui* that follows. We must be assured of our relationship to God before we pour out our hearts and ask forgiveness. Why raise our voices if God is not listening? Why bare our souls if God is distant or indifferent? We cannot hope to correct what is broken in our relationships unless we know that these relationships are there to be repaired. We find assurance, too, in the key

Beineynu

As I write this month's column, we have just commemorated the 9-11 attacks on the United States back in 2001. Are there many among us who can't remember *exactly* where we were and what we were doing when we first heard the news? I doubt it!



In my case, I was scheduled to take an early morning (~8:30am) flight from Newark airport to Raleigh, NC (to meet up with my salesman and a customer later that afternoon). I was by then a consultant to distressed business and worked to engineer 'turn around' efforts or as sometimes happened, develop and preside over a "business cessation plan".

As fate would have it, my business partner at the time suggested that I stop in at our clients' offices in South Plainfield before going to the airport and then taking a later in the day flight. We had a few matters to discuss with the owners, and since I had the time built into my schedule, it made sense for all of us to spend some "face time" together.

Sitting in our meeting shortly before 9:00am, we were interrupted by a production coordinator who ran into my office carrying a small, "rabbit ear" black & white portable TV, shouting, "OMG.... A plane crashed into the World Trade Center". We had no suspicion of terrorism. Like most Americans, we thought it was an errant recreational pilot who flew too close to the building and was swept up by the wind currents that are created in downtown Manhattan's Wall Street area. We all believed, America was impervious to such terrorist activities. We, like virtually everyone else, were wrong!

As events unfolded, we learned in shocking detail (and with great horror) that this was a coordinated attack on the United States by people who wanted to do us harm (because of our apparently opulent lifestyles, our beliefs, customs and practices, and the freedoms that we enjoy daily). We hardly left my office as events unfolded and more information was shared about the tragedy.

It was impossible to get an outbound phone line as carriers were jammed with millions of calls in the metro NY-NJ area. Rudimentary cell phone service, such as it was, became overwhelmed quickly and it took me several hours to be able to let my wife know that I was safe, had changed flight plans (so I never was at the airport much less on an airplane) and that I was planning to fly later that day.

Well you can guess the rest..... all the airports closed, flights were canceled, travel came to a standstill across the USA, and I couldn't make my trip for several days. While very nervous about resuming my normal business travel schedule, it was like falling off a bicycle as a kid; you dusted yourself off and got back on the bike lest you'd never ride again. So, while going back to EWR (Newark airport's

call sign) amid National Guardsmen, policemen and armed air marshals, was a bit daunting, it was also a bit reassuring at the same time. I boarded the flight to Raleigh, met my salesman and customer as planned (though about a week later) conducted our business and then returned safely to New Jersey.

So why is this important? I think it important to remember (in Hebrew, *zachor*) and it is inherent in our history, religion and tradition. Having just celebrated *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur*, we prepare for *Sukkot*, *Shemini Atzeret* and *Simchat Torah*, holidays and celebrations steeped in 'remembering' our history. We have felt the weight of persecution throughout our history and now is not so significantly different.

As a rabbi colleague of mine is fond of paraphrasing, "All that is needed for terrorism to win is for us to be too afraid to lead our normal lives".

Indeed, we must lead our normal lives but also be cognizant of potential dangers that are around us. At CBI, by applying for and winning several competitive Federal Homeland Security and State of New Jersey Preparedness grants, we are able to provide armed guard service for many of our 'open door' and 'semi-public' events as well as adding layers of 'physical security enhancements' to strengthen our facility against certain acts of aggression. We'll discuss this further over the next 12-24 months.

Our systems and precautions only work if all of us are vigilant and observant. If something 'seems off' or 'doesn't feel right', please tell someone. Find an usher, greeter, guard, administrator, officer or clergy member and share your concerns with them. If that fails, call 911. The adage developed by the NYC – MTA..... "If you see something; say something!" is certainly applicable in all instances.

So let us enjoy our community, our surroundings, our programs and our services together. CBI is a strong, vibrant congregation, one which I am proud to serve!

Our Lifelong Learning classes and programs are underway. Your kids are learning; be sure to make time for you to learn something new! If you don't see what you're looking for, let me know and we'll make it so. Being a *dugma* - a role model - for your children is the best way for them to learn how to "do Jew." Join us for Family Shabbat or Shir Shabbat or any regular Shabbat service. Let your kids show off what they know - and you might be able to show them a thing or two. Hearts and Hands is Always looking for Volunteers!

Do you have a heart? Do you have a hand? Good! You can join the CBI Volunteers group called Hearts and Hands! Hearts and Hands volunteers will enjoy working with other congregants in a few areas to help the needy at various times throughout the year. We are rolling out first with hunger response, although we will look at other areas to address as ideas and volunteers come in to lead these programs.

For hunger response, our program is called Triple AAA. Triple A stands for "Achlu Aiyvey Amecha" which comes from Parsha Mishpatim and means, "the poor in your nation shall eat." So far we have 4 partner organizations that run either food pantries or soup kitchens in the area, and we are looking to add a Bridges Run which does bag lunch distributions.

Besides addressing hunger, we'll look to do other mitzvah events through the year, the types and times to be determined by CBIers who come forward to lead the programs.

Hearts and Hands will also work with the other mitzvah groups to assist them in their goals including Kiddush Couriers – to transport leftovers from CBI events to soup kitchens, MLK Day Mitzvathon Committee, a day or mitzvah activities at CBI on MLK Day, and the Caring Committee to visit the ill and injured CBIers and be present at shivas.

We are currently looking to ramp up our participation in the Interfaith food pantry on Wednesday mornings from 8:30am til noon, but if any of the other partner organizations are of interest to you, definitely let me know, and we'll get you over there to help out! See below for a description the times of the 4 partner organizations .

Bobrow Kosher Food Pantry - 170 Scotland Road, South Orange

1 Sunday / month 9:00am-12:30pm

1 Wednesday / month 6:00pm - 9:00pm

The Bobrow Kosher Food Pantry, organized by Congregation Oheb Shalom in South Orange, serves the hundreds of elderly and poor of this community. The Food Pantry is staffed entirely by volunteers. Bagging is on Wednesdays from 6:00 - 8:00 PM. Food that has been collected and purchased is divided into bags with an assortment of groceries in each bag. Distribution on Sundays begins at 9:00 and concludes at 12:30 pm.

Isaiah House - 238 N Munn Ave, East Orange

1 Sunday / month 11:30pm - 1:30pm

Isaiah House has been a community fixture since 1988. Our mission is to reduce the prevalence of homelessness, hunger

and unemployment throughout Essex County and more specifically, within the Oranges and Newark. As the brain child of an alliance between the Community Service Council of the Oranges and Maplewood (a division of United Way of Essex and West Hudson), the Junior League of the Oranges and Short Hills, and the Concerned Clergy of East Orange, Isaiah House remains the only shelter in East Orange and provides temporary and permanent lodging, food, social and financial services, as well as comfort and hope for families and individuals every year.

Summit Helping Its People (SHIP) Oakes Center - 120 Morris Ave., Summit

1 Sunday / month 3:00pm - 5:00pm

The mission of SHIP is to feed the homeless and at-risk homeless people in Summit and assist participants in obtaining additional support services. SHIP is a team effort by committed volunteers from the community. Individuals, local organizations, and congregations are invited to volunteer.

Interfaith Food Pantry of the Oranges - 105 Main Street, Orange, NJ

1 Wednesday / month 8:15am - 12:00 noon

The Interfaith Food Pantry of the Oranges (IFPO) is a "client choice" food pantry that provides supplemental and emergency food, diapers and toiletries to low-income residents of Orange and East Orange, NJ. IFPO is an all-volunteer, collaborative effort of four religious congregations in Short Hills and South Orange, New Jersey. IFPO is one of only a few food pantries in New Jersey that offer client choice. Client choice means that our clients have more of a grocery store experience, where clients are allocated "points," based on family size, to select their own food, rather than receiving a pre-packaged bag of groceries. This process encourages healthy choices while also serving clients with dignity and respect. Under this system, clients do not receive food that they don't like or cannot eat for health or personal reasons. IFPO has been serving residents of Orange and East Orange for 25 years, growing tremendously from a small group that initially served 20-30 clients per week. In 2017, IFPO had 9,300 pantry visits, serving nearly 30,000 people. IFPO averaged 225 clients per week. Fully 43 percent of recipients are children.

ISRAEL AFFAIRS

5780 Israel Bond Appeal

I hope many of you were able to attend the presentation by Ralph Nurnberger analyzing the results of the recent Israeli election. It was a very timely event, and although it might have occurred before all the dust was settled, and all the issues

resolved, I am sure that it improved our understanding or the current political situation in Israel.

I want to be sure that you understand the process we are using for the Bond Campaign this year. The main event was the September 20 program, but we are still encouraging everyone to participate in the Campaign. While we are not having a dedicated speaker on Kol Nidre we are once again preparing pledge cards for each family in our community. The pledge cards will be in the inside lobby during the High Holidays, and then in the regular lobby during all Succot.

If you wish to pledge an amount, find your card, turn down a tab, and deposit the envelope in the box provided. You can also use the box outside the CBI office if you prefer. The pledges will be forwarded to our local Israel Bond office, and David Brown from that office will contact you to help you fulfill your pledge. You can also purchase bonds directly from the Israel Bond Office by calling David at (973) 712-1404. Be sure to mention that you are a member of CBI Millburn.

2020 AIPAC Policy Conference March 1-3, 2020

Next year's Policy Conference will be held Sunday March 1 – March 3, and once again there will be a Shabbaton the weekend before. The conference will be held the week before Purim, so well ahead of the spring holidays. Next year's conference is in an election year, and AIPAC has usually invited Presidential candidates to address the Conference during election years. So, this conference may be even more historic than usual. Talk to your fellow congregants who attended this year and decide to come with them next year.

This Summer an AIPAC affiliated organization led trips Members of Congress to Israel to help familiarize them with the complex realities in the middle East. Representative Steny Hoyer led a group of 40 Democratic Members, and Representative Kevin McCarthy led a trip of 30 Republican Members. Although the timing of the two trips differed, the leaders arranged an overlap so that the Members could also meet without regard to partisan divisions.

As you undoubtedly heard in the news, following the AIPAC sponsored trips (funded separately by a related educational

foundation), two Members of Congress planned a separate trip sponsored by an organization with anti-Israel and anti-Semitic overtones. The Israeli government (with some encouragement by the US administration) decided not to allow these Members into Israel. AIPAC issued a strong statement expressing its belief that all members of Congress should be permitted to tour Israel.

Bi-partisan support for the US Israel relationship is the keystone of all that AIPAC does. This concept is being challenged by both sides in our current environment and it is essential that Democrats and Republicans come together in Washington to demonstrate that this relationship is stronger than our partisan divide. Make plans to be part of our CBI delegation.

Elections in Israel and us September 2019

Last month (9/5/2019), there was an article in the New Jersey Jewish News by Martin Raffel entitled "Open Letter to Israeli Voters." In the article, Raffel explains that although as a non-Israeli he has no vote in the Israeli election, he hoped that they would reflect on his thoughts in deciding how to vote in the election. He states that "the sustainability of strong American-Jewish support for Israel is not a given" and then identifies several issues on which large parts of the US Jewish Community disagree with policies and actions of the Israeli government. He identifies issues like the nation-state law, the national conversion law, inequality between Orthodox and other streams of Judaism in Israel, "the Israeli occupation of the Palestinian people", as well as building in the West Bank, talks about annexation, and lack of progress on the two-state solution.

These are all issues which we may discuss among ourselves, with our Israeli friends, and on which we may disagree. Although I wholeheartedly agree with Raffel when he states that "my relationship with and love for Israel...is permanent." He explains that the problem is with others, whose commitment does not run as deep as his and may choose to walk away..."

To me the article implied a threat – do what we want you to do, or we might not be there to support you in the future.

I prefer a different approach. I believe Israelis have a right to decide their own elections, based on their own understanding of the issues they are facing. I encourage discussions between us and them, but for me, as for Mr. Raffel, my relationship and love are permanent. Whatever Israel has decided in its election, whether I agree or disagree on important issues, I will encourage our entire community to support a strong US

Israel relationship. I will not encourage Israeli voters to defer to us in order to curry favor with portions of our community whose support is not permanent.

There is a new book being published which I believe focuses on many of these issues, and I look forward to reading it. Professor Daniel Gordis has written "We Stand Divided: The Rift between American Jews and Israel.

I am considering having a periodic Current Events discussion about Israel at CBI. Would you be interested in attending a program like this? I envision this as a time when we can review news coverage, watch online videos or listen to podcasts, and discuss our reactions among ourselves. I have personally found podcasts to be a tremendous source of information about Israel, and I would like the share access to this type of information with others. We might also use this time to discuss a book of importance, like that of Professor Gordis.
