Musical Notes

Stay Tuned for an A Cappella Musical Shabbat on November 15 - 16!

I f you know even a little bit about me, you know my passion for singing – particularly singing Jewish music, both sacred and folk; and for making music with others through the venue of a choir. I



have derived great joy and satisfaction from conducting our own CBI choir, whom you hear each year singing so beautifully on the High Holydays.

This past summer, as I have done for almost every summer since 1990, I enjoyed attending the North American Jewish Choral Festival, sponsored by the Zamir Choral Foundation. This festival is a 5 day gathering of over 500 people, all of whom share a passion for singing Jewish music (although not all of them are "professional" singers/musicians) and who share the objective of keeping alive the tradition of music in Jewish life and worship. A survey conducted on behalf of the Zamir Choral Foundation shows the impact that singing in a Jewish choir can have. There is strong anecdotal evidence that many people who are not otherwise involved in Jewish life, find their way in through their love of Jewish singing. For me, singing in or conducting a Jewish choir is a way to integrate music, Judaism, community and spirituality.

For 10 years (1988 – 1998), I sang with the Zamir Chorale in New York. I didn't even know that this Jewish choir existed until I was in Cantorial School. I always wished that I had had some type of outlet for singing Jewish music, especially with my peers, during my college years, but Jewish A Cappella groups had not yet become a presence on college campuses as they are at so many colleges today. Realizing the tremendous positive impact that singing Jewish music together can have in strengthening the Jewish identity of young adults in college, I feel it is critical for the future health and strength of the Jewish community to support the existence of such an extra curricular activity in colleges and to encourage students with an interest in music to get involved in these choirs.

In what has become an annual tradition at CBI, we will enjoy another college *A Cappella* Shabbat on Friday night November 15 at a 7:30 PM service and Saturday morning, November 16 as we welcome back the SHABBATONES, the Jewish A Cappella choir from the University of Pennsylvania. This talented group has a repertoire which includes Jewish, Israeli and popular American songs. These students (including my niece!) will perform at our service on Friday night (Please note earlier start time!) and will also share their voices on Shabbat morning and with community singing at Kiddush! These events are open to the entire community (you are welcome to bring your neighbors/friends who are not members of CBI) and I also hope to see the many UPenn alumni who are at CBI and in our area to show their support!

It's almost *Sukkot* as I sit to write my November column and that means that Thanksgiving cannot be far away. Having just spent the better part of a month in shul, many things come to mind, but most importantly, my desire to be a better person this coming year (both generally and



Jewishly). So, I'm taking a little liberty with my column this month and reprising one that I wrote two years ago. I hope you'll forgive me for doing so, but it's even more relevant today than at that time.

"While sitting in my home synagogue's sanctuary for the *Yom Tovim*, I had the chance to read, think and plan just how accomplish this. One of the tools I found available to me was a handout complied by my rabbi that offered lots of inspirational and contemplative excerpts for our personal use. One of the selections resonated within me, most probably because of what I do for a living.

Dr. Ron Wolfson, Fingerhut Professor of Education, American Jewish University, and founder of "Synagogue 3000", spends a great amount of his time teaching and writing about converting synagogues from 'transactional' organizations into 'relational' ones. The preferred latter, where people connect with one another and establish lasting friendships is far superior and much more rewarding to all.

So it was with great interest that I read an excerpt from his *Spirituality of Welcoming*, "*Jewish Values to Guide Communications*". In it, he lists **seven Jewish values** that we should incorporate into our everyday synagogue language and behavior, and some hints to help us model them:

1) Sh'tikah & Sh'miat Ha-Ozen: Silence & Active Listening

- a) Reflect in silence while others are speaking
- b) Refrain from interrupting while others are speaking

2) Dibbur: Speech

- a) Speak the truth as you see it, but.....
- b) Don't hurt others by speaking harshly to or about them
- c) Speak as if God was listening to everything you say

3) Salvanut: Patience

- a) Be patient while others are speaking; wait your turn
- b) Have empathy towards others and their opinions

4) Elu v'elu: "These and these"

- a) Allow for multiple perspectives
- b) Even if you don't agree with others, don't be condescending towards them

5) B'yachad: Together

- a) Let's think of each other as teammates
- b) Progress emerges from collaboration
- c) Even davenning requires a minyan!

6) Derech Eretz: Common Decency towards others

- a) Treat each other with mutual respect
- b) Remember, everyone present is on the same side

7) L'Shem Shamayim: For the sake of Heaven, and Da Lifnei Mi atah Omed: Know before Whom You Stand

I'm going to try and remember that our congregation is a *Sacred Community* and not just a building. We are a collection of individuals who share a common goal and a profound love of Judaism. It is "all about the relationships" we develop that keeps us together in good times and bad. We support each other spiritually, emotionally and socially."

Despite the prevailing polarizing political rhetoric that attempts to divide rather than unite us, I still hold great hope for our survival as a religion and a nation. Although I am "third generation born in the USA" American, I feel a connection to all the immigrants who come today and came yesterday to our country to find a better life; one of promise, freedom, health and prosperity for them and all their descendants. Let us not forget that we are a nation of immigrants and somewhere, perhaps deep in our past, some relative trekked from a far-off country to the United States in the hopes of achieving a better life.

For this "better life", for the bounty of this rich and flourishing Jewish community, and for the many other blessings in our lives, I say "Thank You"!

Enjoy your Thanksgiving and the bountiful year to come.....

THE STORY OF THE STATE OF ISRAEL THROUGH ITS MUSIC

WITH LEN HAUSMAN

Music is an ideal way to learn about a country's history and culture. In the Fall 2019 module of this class we will be learning about Israel's second two decades through the music of Naomi Shemer, who is known as the first lady of Israeli song and poetry. Her music is regarded as the soundtrack of the lives of Israelis who came of age in the 60's and 70's.

The class will learn about the composer's life and how it was interwoven with the development of the State of Israel as reflected in her music. The text for this class is Naomi Shemer's song lyrics, in translation, as we explore their context and meaning. We will approach the lyrics as we would a poem, looking for their resonance and allusions. The Hebrew text will be available and we will learn some key Hebrew words in the lyrics.

An added bonus is that while Naomi Shemer did record her songs, the most well-known versions are those done by others. These versions were sung by the leading vocalists and groups of the day and the class will gain the familiarity of a 'Who's Who' in the history of Israeli song as we listen to and enjoy her music.

ABOUT THE CLASS LEADER

Len Hausman has had an interest in the music of Israel since his youth. He completed a year of training in Israel toward being a teacher in the diaspora, sponsored by the World Zionist Organization. He has enjoyed teaching on a range of subjects over the years at CBI's Shabbat Journeyers' Minyan and other venues. Professionally, Len is a psychologist with practices in Greenwich Village, New York and locally.

Israel "Current" Events

My article here is only monthly, so perhaps trying to make people aware of Israel current events seems problematic. However, this year is very special. We have only a few different phrases which have been valid all year. There is another election coming

soon. There may be another election coming soon. An election was recently completed, but we cannot yet tell who will be offered the chance to form a government. The President has selected [Netanyahu / Gantz / Lieberman / Lapid / Shaked / Sa'ar] to form a government, but it is hard to see if he will be able to create a majority government.

There you have it. As I write this in mid-October we still do not know if the Prime Minister will have a new term, or if Israel will have a new Prime Minister, of if instead Israel will have a new election. Tune in next month for an update to this complex process.

5780 Israel Bond Appeal

If you did not pledge a bond purchase during the holidays, you can still purchase bonds directly from the Israel Bond Office by calling David Brown at (973) 712-1404. Be sure to mention that you are a member of CBI Millburn.

Think of purchasing bonds as gifts, particularly in honor of Bar and Mitzvah celebrations. A mitzvah bond will mature in five years from the date it is purchased, which can be perfect time for use either for a gap year in Israel, or the beginning of college in the United States. The message of an Israel Bonds is as valuable as the financial value – nothing says support for the State of Israel like lending money to the State to help it thrive. And a five year bond purchased now will still be helping Israel when she reaches her 75th Anniversary (coming up in 2023).

2020 AIPAC Policy Conference March 1-3, 2020

Next year's Policy Conference will be held Sunday March 1 – March 3, and once again there will be a Shabbaton the weekend before. The conference will be held the week before Purim, so well ahead of the spring holidays. Next year's conference is in an election year, and AIPAC has usually invited Presidential candidates to address the Conference during election years. So, this conference may be even more historic than usual. Talk to your fellow congregants who attended this year and decide to come with them next year.

I hope that you noticed the poster inviting congregants to join Rabbi Resnick as part of the CBI AIPAC delegation this year.

It is so important that we continue to attend in greater numbers, both from CBI, and from other congregations. Consider attending not only with your children (high school and older) but maybe with your parents, your siblings, or your good friends.

Bi-partisan support for the US Israel relationship is the keystone of all that AIPAC does. This concept is being challenged by both sides in our current environment and it is essential that Democrats and Republicans come together in Washington to demonstrate that this relationship is stronger than our partisan divide. Make plans to be part of our CBI delegation.

Olympic Baseball 2020

Israeli baseball is returning to the International stage next summer, as Israel has become the first team to qualify for the Olympic Event. Israel qualified by winning an Africa Europe tournament. In the tournament, Israel defeated Spain, Netherlands, Italy and South Africa.

All members of the Olympic team have Israeli passports, a more restrictive rule than was in effect for the 2017 World Baseball Classic. The most recognizable MLB name on this year's team is Danny Valencia, a 35 year old infielder/outfielder who played for seven American League teams in his eight year Major League career. The team includes 4 native born Israelis, including Shlomo Lipitz, a 40 year old pitcher who has been involved in Israeli baseball for 30 years.
