Rabbi's Musings

Connecting with the community - Torah Teen Time with the Rabbi and commemorating a Yahrzeit

Yahrzeit - the annual remembrance of a loved one. It is a day set aside for each of us to remember members of our family who have passed away. They could have died last year or they could have died 30 years ago. We are encouraged to set aside some time every year to remember our loved ones in a slightly formal way. This is yet another great Jewish tradition in our on-going

mourning process.

There are two parts to the commemoration of the yahrzeit. One is to light a candle the evening before the date of the yahrzeit. One can gather family members at the lighting of the candle and recall positive memories of the deceased. This is a nice way to involve the next generation in recalling the person. Another tradition is to come to synagogue on the day of the yahrzeit and say kaddish with the community at minyan.

We need ten adults to say kaddish, which "forces" us to connect with the community, and here at CBI, it is connecting with the minyan folks who are a very friendly people. And if you come to shul, you also get to help make the minyan! I encourage you to do so.

On Friday night at services, there is a tradition here at CBI of reciting the names of the folks who we are mourning in the upcoming week. This is another example of taking the personal and weaving it with the community. We are going to experiment with another tradition which I would like to incorporate into the CBI set of traditions. We are going to do this for the next four months and see if there is any positive impact on the community.

Before I recite the list of the yahrzeit people, I will ask anyone who is in shul that Friday night who has a relative on the list, to share 1-2 minutes of memory of the deceased. This way you can hear the name recited and share a memory with the assembled which will help folks to get to know your loved ones better.

Please let me know if this resonates with you and if you plan to come to shul on Friday night in the next few months to do so. Again, this is an experiment which I hope will add meaning to your ability to remember those who have passed who were important in your lives.

Torah Teen Time with the Rabbi

Starting on <u>Shabbat, January 4th at 11:00 AM</u>, I will hold our first session of TTT - Torah Teen Time with the Rabbi. We will gather teens in our shul for an hour of Torah study, experiential prayer and time for engagement. We will conclude with lunch.

We have a good USY program and we have a good *madrichim* program already in place. These programs engage with many of our teens, though of course not all of them and not on Shabbat! I want to bring our teens into our Shabbat community and to make them feel the amazingness of Shabbat. For me Shabbat is at the core of my Judaism. However, one observes their own Shabbat, I just want our

Musical Notes By Cantor Lorna Wallach

I'd like to believe that I'm in good company with others who also procrastinate! I tend to put off starting something such as an exercise regimen or a diet until what seems like a more logical (or convenient!) time to begin. I find myself saying that I'll make regular exercise one of my resolutions for the new year, or I'll start my diet the day after my birthday.



Rather than waiting for a once a year opportunity, the Jewish "calendar" gives us the opportunity every month to renew ourselves and to start over, just as the moon renews itself each month. The Hebrew calendar has been based on the lunar year since Biblical times. Rosh Chodesh (the festival of the new moon) had much greater significance in Biblical times than it has today. Numbers 10:10 states that trumpets were sounded and special sacrifices were offered on Rosh Chodesh. There is Biblical proof of Rosh Chodesh being celebrated with a festive meal and refraining from all business transactions. In Talmudic times, the Rabbis allowed men to work, but Rosh Chodesh continued to be a semi-festival for women in recognition of the women in the wilderness of Sinai who, unlike the men, refused to contribute their jewelry for the building of the golden calf.

In anticipation of each Rosh Chodesh, we are even given the chance to plan ahead. On the Shabbat immediately preceding the first of the month (except for Rosh Chodesh Tishrei which is actually Rosh Hashanah!), a special prayer to announce the specific date of the upcoming new month is added to the liturgy towards the end of the Torah Service. This blessing, called "Birkat Hachodesh," begins with a paragraph attributed in the Talmud (Berachot 16a) to Rav, who used to recite it daily at the conclusion of the Amidah. Since it already contained a full gamut of people's spiritual and physical needs, including a moving plea for a life of peace, sustenance, health and abundance, and a life based on love of Torah and awe of God, a phrase was added later relating it to the new moon. The second paragraph of Birkat Hachodesh refers to God as a performer of miracles and calls for Jewish unity, reminding those of us in the diaspora to stay connected to Israel. From the time of the Middle Ages, community leaders wanted to be sure that everyone knew when Rosh Chodesh fell so that they could keep track of the calendar and be able to say the appropriate special prayers such as Hallel (in its shortened form). The announcement of the new month has always been said on Shabbat simply because that is when the greatest number of people are congregated.

If you missed the most recent announcement of a new month (Rosh Chodesh Tevet) followed a week later by the 2 day Rosh Chodesh celebration (on the 30th of Kislev and the first of Tevet), we will bless the new Jewish month of Shevat on Shabbat, January 25 (to be followed very soon after by the actual Rosh Chodesh!).

I pray that this new month will hold the blessings of health, goodness and peace for everyone. And may it be an opportunity in our lives for a renewal of wonder, love, justice, friendship, compassion and holiness.

Since this column is entitled "*Beineynu...... Just Between Us.....*" I'm taking the liberty of changing it a bit this month. I thought that a little conversation (and a commercial of sorts) about Congregational *Kiddush*

Along with the many enrichment activities that fill our days we'll be learning about and celebrating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.s' birthday and the important values he believed in. parent and teacher conferences where everyone will have the opportunity to share information about each child's growth and development.

Accessibility is being able to get in the building. Diversity is getting invited to the table. Inclusion is having a voice at the table. Belonging is having your voice heard at the table.

An important goal for BBRS this year is to ensure that Jewish education is

readily available to every child, regardless of their individual learning strengths and challenges. We are all familiar with the five senses. But there are actually two additional senses. These sixth and seventh senses control body awareness (proprioception) and balance and spatial orientation (the vestibular sense). Students with sensory processing issues have difficulty sitting in a classroom and focusing on traditional school tasks. We are making changes to help all of our students have the tools they need to be effective learners.

Every classroom now has a basket of "fidget tools." While these look like "toys" that children are "playing with" during class, they are very effective self-regulation tools, used for calming, promoting focusing and attention, and increasing tactile awareness of fingers/hands. The tools are required to remain out of sight and to be silent. They are used only by those students who need them, when they need them. Room 203 is being converted into a sensory space. This therapeutic space has a walking path with a variety of activities that helps children calm and focus themselves so they can be better prepared for learning and interacting with others. This safe, quiet room helps students work on their proprioceptive and vestibular systems. It is designed for all ages and will be used both by CBI Preschool and BBRS.

Each classroom will have a "cozy corner" of rugs and comfortable furniture, so students have choices of where to work. We are currently seeking donations of sturdy, comfortable furniture in good shape from pet-free and smoke-free homes. If you have bean bag or pouf chairs, ottomans, area rugs, family room/living room chairs, coffee tables, large pillows, and similar items that you can donate, please contact Rabbi Julie.
