Rabbi's Musings

It is March. One would not think that it is a month packed with Jewish activity. But it is! I would like to share some of the highlights here at CBI. I would like to encourage you to participate in all, or some of what is being offered. Esther: An Eishet Chayil

I feel privileged and fortunate to have had and continue to have so many strong and inspiring role models in my life. In this month, when we read the Megillah on Purim, I find myself focusing on the Biblical character of Esther, and the strength and



courage which Esther exhibited in the Purim story. "While Esther's story is impressive on the level of intrigue, bravery and adventure, it is made eternal by her self-sacrifice and unmitigated faith. Esther remains a role model not because of her external beauty or because she was queen of a powerful empire, but because of her inner fortitude." [Women in Judaism, Copyright (c) 2000 by Mrs. Leah Kohn]

Our tradition recognizes that what makes a woman an *Eishet Chayil*, a true woman of valor and strength, is not her looks but her actions and her faith. In the Book of Proverbs, verses 10 – 31, there is a beautiful poem, *Eishet Chayil*, (A Woman of Valor) which praises women for these special qualities. In many households, it is the custom to recite *Eishet Chayil* every Friday night at the Shabbat meal. Many Jewish grooms also recite the *Eishet Chayil* poem to their brides at their wedding. This poem is also sometimes heard as a tribute to a deceased woman at her funeral.

In Jewish lore, this poem was written by Solomon for his mother Bath-Sheba, but some say it was written by Abraham as a eulogy for his wife, Sarah. The text is too lengthy to print here, but it is worth reading if you are not familiar with it. The poem begins with a question, "A woman of valor – Who can find?" It invites us to participate in the search. Who are our role models? What qualities do they possess which we would want to emulate? *Eishet Chayil* is not just about the virtues of a woman who is a good wife and mother and who provides for her family. It also praises women in their own right for having many valuable qualities, including women who volunteer, work hard, give tzedakkah, who are strong, wise, courageous and who revere God.

In a book called <u>Praise Her Works: Conversations with Biblical Women</u> (edited by Penina Adelman, JPS Publishers, 2005), I learned of a 13th century Yemenite collection of midrashim called *Midrash HaGadol* (The Great Midrash), which describes twenty two women of valor in the Bible and connects each of them to a line from the *Eishet Chayil* poem. The Biblical women included are: the wife of Noah, Sarah, Rebekkah, Leah, Rachel, Batya, Yocheved, Miriam, Hannah, Yael, the widow from Tzarfat (I Kings 17:14), Rachav (who took in the spies, Joshua 2), Bath-Sheba, Michal (David's wife, I Samuel),Elisheba (Aaron's wife,Exodus 6:23), Hatzlelponi (Samson's mother, I Chronicles), Serach (daughter of Asher), wife of Obadiah (2 Kings), the Shunammite woman (2 Kings), Esther, and Naomi and Ruth (from the Book of Ruth read on Shavuot).

CBI Begins a Recycling Program

It has been a long time coming, but CBI is joining the ranks of other concerned establishments around the globe and is beginning to separate "trash" from "recyclables" and thereby reducing our land fill



use and helping to improve our environment.

There are ample teaching examples throughout Jewish history and liturgy about how we are commanded to be "stewards" and "caretakers" of our environment. The modern interpretation of *Tikkun Olam* is the Jewish concept defined by acts of kindness performed to "**repair the world**."

The phrase is first found in the *Mishnah*, a body of classical rabbinic teachings, saying, "**Mip'nei tikkun ha-olam**," (*for the sake of repairing the world*), which appears with the meaning of amending the law in order to keep the society well-functioning. It is often used when discussing issues of social policy, ensuring a safeguard to those who may be at a disadvantage. In this case, our planet and environment.

Over the next few months we'll be phasing in *"single stream recycling"* similar to what many of us already do at home: glass, paper, plastic and metal can be "co-mingled" and separated from "regular trash" and taken to a recycling plant for separation and reuse.

We're starting in the schools and offices with special "blue buckets" to collect anything recyclable and have already obtained a separate "recycling dumpster" to collect and haul away that refuse. Food waste, wood, used paper plates, foil tins and wrap, etc., <u>are not</u> permitted in the recycling <u>stream</u> and should be treated as plain, old fashioned, garbage. Our motto should be, "When in doubt (about an item), treat it

as 'trash' and throw it out!"

If that last statement seems a bit counter-intuitive, it's not. The recycler will "reject" the entire load of recycling matter if there are regular trash items included in it. The disposal company will then return the load to us and impose a "penalty fee" for having the load rejected.

So, let's start slowly and carefully. We're in the process of sourcing recycling receptacles for the rest of our building's "public spaces" (lobby, Social Hall, MPR, Youth Lounge) so that as a program, service, meeting or event concludes, participants may place their items either in trash bins or recycling containers, whichever is appropriate.

This is but a first step but in this season of the impending Spring renewal, let us begin the journey together to help our community and our planet thrive!

THE STORY OF THE STATE OF ISRAEL THROUGH ITS MUSIC WITH LEN HAUSMAN

Music is an ideal way to learn about a country's history and culture. In this third module consisting of four additional sessions we will focusing on the period between the 6-Day War and the Yom Kippur War and its aftermath. While we will be highlighting the music of Naomi Shemer, known as 'the first lady of Israeli song,' other composers will be heard as well.

The class will learn about how the lives of the composers were interwoven with the development of the State of Israel as reflected in their music. The text for this class are song lyrics, in translation, as we explore their context and meaning. We will approach the lyrics as we would a poem, looking for their resonance and allusions. The Hebrew text will be available and we will learn some key Hebrew words in the lyrics.

We will be listening to the most well known versions of these songs which were sung by the leading vocalists and groups of the day and the class will gain the familiarity of a 'Who's Who' in the history of Israeli song as we listen to and enjoy the musical selections.

ABOUT THE CLASS LEADER

Len Hausman has had an interest in the music of Israel since his youth. He completed a year of training in Israel toward being a teacher in the diaspora, sponsored by the World Zionist Organization. He has enjoyed teaching on a range of subjects over the years at CBI's Shabbat Journeyers' Minyan and other venues. Professionally, Len is a psychologist with practices in Greenwich Village, New York and locally.



Kenny Kavowras, Michelle Neier, Bruce Novick and Joe Tenenbaum. We are working closely with our Executive Director, Harvey Brenner, to create an overall emergency and security plan for CBI. All plans and policy recommendations will be brought before the CBI Board for discussion and approval.

We are very pleased to report that Harvey has already secured two grants from the Department of Homeland Security and FEMA to upgrade our security. Funds from one of these grants has already enabled us to hire an armed security guard whenever large numbers of people are expected to be in the building. Additionally, with these funds we will be addressing security issues related to door access, lighting, windows, CCTV, and more.

We have continued to consult with the security experts at Jewish Federation of Greater MetroWest and at the Millburn-Short Hills Department of Education. We also want to learn from and collaborate with other synagogues in our area as well as with our local police department.

In the coming months we will continue to update you on security issues. We are all responsible for maintaining CBI's security and so you may see changes in the future such as regular announcements about emergency exits at gatherings and emergency information cards in the pews and around the building. Knowing where the exits are located and what to do in an

Israel "Current" Events

The Israeli election will be held any day now (depending on when this Bulletin is published). From outside Israel we watch and wonder if the third time will be the "charm." Will Israel be able to form a permanent government? In

Israel, the saying is different – פעם שלישית גלידה or Pa-am Shlishit G'lidah which means, the third time – Ice Cream !! I think I prefer the Israeli saying.

Perhaps you can say we anticipated this saying with our recent celebration of Ice Cream for Breakfast Day on the first Saturday in February. Look for this event to become a regular occurrence for us.

In the meantime, the United States presented its new Peace Plan. Although the plan seems to have been accepted by both the Prime Minister and the leading opposition candidate in the Israeli election, the way forward is not at all clear. The Palestinian Authority has rejected this plan and rejected participation in developing the plan. Some commentators have accused the plan of scuttling the two state solution. My observation is that the two state solution had been without significant progress in over a decade. Negotiations are difficult when both sides have significant nonnegotiable issues.

As you read this, the AIPAC 2020 Policy Conference is occurring. It is fascinating that the Conference coincides this year both with Super Tuesday in the United States and with election number three in Israel. 
