



## **President's Message**

We have a rich history at Congregation B'nai Israel, tracing our origins back to the early 1900s when Millburn's Jewish families first met in private homes or rented stores. In 1923 and 1924, the group was invited to conduct High Holy Day services in the Parish House of St. Stephen's

Church. In 1925, ground was broken on Lackawanna Place and a synagogue was completed later within the year. Defined by our starting point as a community, our 100th anniversary is just one year away! While past celebrations of our history focused on when our first building was constructed in 1925, we are starting to plan for events as early as next year to begin celebrating our 100 years as a congregation. I hope you will join us in celebrating our past 100 years as we look to securing our next 100 years.

The building we now inhabit at 160 Millburn Ave. began construction in 1950 and is well regarded for its architecture and unique art. While we might describe CBI as a synagogue located at 160 Millburn Ave, it is so much more than that. Aside from the dedicated professionals who nourish us spiritually, intellectually and emotionally, CBI relies on a myriad of volunteers who collectively donate thousands of hours every year to sustain every aspect of our operations. Congregants help run services and read Torah every week, organize and/or teach classes, organize and staff community meals and kiddushes, engage us musically, take care of our physical plant, participate in committees, make deliveries to congregants, participate in charitable work, or provide labor when called upon. Indeed, the list of volunteer activities is too big for me to capture easily, so I will be looking for your help in publicizing all the ways that you contribute your time on behalf of CBI, both big and small. If you are wondering how you might get started in contributing your time, I hope the examples we publicize will give you some ideas on ways that you can help. We will be dedicating our services on Friday, June 10 to honor all our volunteers and highlight many

of the contributions that congregants have made in the past year.

As we head into the summer, we will look for opportunities to take advantage of the warmer weather to either meet outdoors or to increase the ventilation in our indoor spaces. We have gathered in person as well as by Zoom throughout the year, and encourage you to come join us in person whenever you can – we all miss the personal contact that we took for granted pre-Covid. One of my goals for the coming year is to find ways to bring people together both at CBI and at other venues, and I welcome your suggestions on how to do this.

## From the Executive Director

## CBI: A warm, welcoming Mishkan

We describe CBI as a warm, welcoming, and vibrant community on our website. As Abraham welcomed strangers into his tent, at CBI, we define ourselves as practicing the Mitzvah of hachnasat orchim, welcoming all. Our tent is wide by design, my design.

Yet we are living in challenging times. Antisemitism is on the rise. In October

2018, the Tree Of Life – or L'Shimcha Congregation in Squirrel Hill, Pittsburgh was attacked during Shabbat morning services. In January 2022, a gunman held four hostages at Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas. We need to be vigilant, ensuring the safety of every person that enters our doors while continuing to embody our mission of welcoming those who seek to be a part of our Kehillah Kedosha, our religious community.

We have been hard of work at achieving this difficult balance. To date, we have received \$300,000 and \$20,000 in Homeland Security Grants to make our building more secure. We continue to meet to ensure these funds are used in the most effective way possible. We have partnered with local law enforcement to maintain effective communication and regular surveillance. We have enhanced security both inside and outside our campus and are training our staff to be ready to respond when necessary. We have added dedicated security for our preschool beginning in late April.

Our Jewish texts help guide us as we embark on this mission to create a safe, comfortable space for our community. Several parshas in Exodus describe in great detail how to build a beautiful and meaningful place where God can dwell among us (Parsha Terumah, Parsha Vayak'heil, and Parsha Pekudei). Parsha Vayeira, in Genesis, describes how Abraham welcomed strangers into his tent with great hospitality.



Parsha Ekev in Deuteronomy reminds us that we must befriend the strangers, for we were strangers in the land of Egypt.


However, to balance these teachings and be audaciously welcoming, our texts also instruct us that we have the responsibility to make sure that our spaces are safe. In Ki Teitze (Deuteronomy), we are instructed to ensure that our homes are safe: When

you build a new house, you should make a parapet for your roof to prevent anyone from falling from it. Our mission is ongoing: to achieve the delicate balance between ensuring all who enter our building <u>and</u> being a warm, welcoming, and vibrant place for all who seek to be a part of CBI.

## THE STORY OF THE STATE OF ISRAEL THROUGH ITS MUSIC

WITH LEN HAUSMAN



Music is an ideal way to learn about a country's history and culture. In our next module we will be focusing on the tumultuous and often heartbreaking period (1939-1948) that led to the declaration of the State of Israel. Just when the need for immigration to Palestine was greatest, the gates slammed shut. WW II threatened the State-to-be in every way. Afterwards as the British prepared to leave, the fight for survival began in earnest. We will learn about this last pre-State generation through the music that tells their story.

Each song presented will be accompanied by a commentary that includes the story behind the song. We will review song lyrics in translation as we explore their context and meaning. We will approach the lyrics as we would a poem, looking for their resonance and allusions. The Hebrew text will be available and we will learn some key Hebrew words in the lyrics.

We will be listening mostly to original versions of these songs, but also at times to updated versions. We will gain knowledge of leading vocalists and groups so that we become familiar with a 'Who's Who' in the history of Israeli song.

## **ABOUT THE CLASS LEADER**

Len Hausman has had an interest in the music of Israel since his youth. He completed a year of training in Israel toward being a teacher in the diaspora, sponsored by the World Zionist Organization. He has enjoyed teaching on a range of subjects over the years at CBI's Shabbat Journeyers' Minyan and other venues. Professionally, Len is a psychologist with practices in Greenwich Village, New York and locally.




## Elise Benjamin June 11, 2022

## **Some News Concerning Israel**

The last couple of months in Israel have included several challenging events.

In March and early April there were a series of terrorist attacks in Israel, including Hadera, Beer Sheva, B'nai B'rak and Tel Aviv. Unfortunately,

fourteen civilians were killed in these attacks. The stories of each of these individuals are heartbreaking. There were two border patrol police only 19 years old. There was a groom killed just before his wedding. A Chabad emissary who ran a local food kitchen was also a victim. Parents and grandparents were also among the victims. Besides those killed many victims were injured, and many others have been frightened (terrorized) which was the objective of the operations. Israel will continue to fight against this violence, and unfortunately there will be people who object

And at this time, we cannot just look at Israel. Because the scale of what is happening is Ukraine is so much bigger. The vicious tactics being employed by the Russian soldiers, directed mostly at civilians, is as bad or worse than what the terrorists in Israel are doing, and millions of Ukrainians are fleeing their country. We must do what we can to help stop the Russian offensive, and to provide aid to refugees caused by this war. If you wish to help provide social services for refugees and others affected by the war, consider contributing to Rabbi Isenberg's Discretionary Fund (through the CBI office) or to the Federation of Greater MetroWest's Ukraine Emergency Fund at the following website: https://www.jfedgmw.org/support-for-jews-in-ukraine/ Our community was honored when the CEO of the Federation, Dov Ben Shimon visited our congregation recently to provide a report on Federation's activities in and around Ukraine.

The stability of the Israeli government is now in question. One member of Knesset has left the government coalition of sixty-one members, endangering the future of the current government. In addition, following clashes on Har Bayit during the Ramadan, Pesach and Easter weekend, a Muslim

member of the coalition has temporarily suspended his participation in the government. While this is not good news for the government, it does not necessarily indicate that a new government will be formed, as any government needs 61 MK, and it is not clear that the opponents of this government can agree to form a new one. Thus, if this government cannot be saved, a new election will probably be necessary.

One challenge might be less negative than we had expected. There have been news reports that the United States would be rejoining the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) also known as the Iran deal. There are concerns that the renewed deal would be less strict than the prior agreement, that it might not only provide economic relief to Iran, but also to Russia, since there are parts of the treaty in which we rely on Russia to provide services to Iran. In addition, Iran has insisted that for an agreement to be renewed, the Iranian Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) must be removed from the United States list of foreign terrorist organizations. The reports of an early agreement have been wrong, and as I am writing this, no agreement has been announced and US officials have indicated that Iran will not be removed from the terrorist list. This is good news. However, do not rely on me as your only source of news on this topic. I encourage you to pay attention to news reports related to the JCPOA.

In more positive news, Israel hosted a conference which included representative of the United States, and four Arab countries, Bahrain, UAE, Morocco, and Egypt. There are many signs that these and other countries are willing to increase their commerce with Israel.

### Travel to Israel

I know of more families and students that are traveling to Israel now or have plans to travel there soon. Due to issues related to Corona, travel is not as simple as it was before, but I encourage everyone to travel to Israel, and to share your adventures with CBI in the Bulletin by sending me a report.




