Letter from the Rabbi

CBI's New Siddur (Prayer Book)



My Dear Congregants,

There is no better sign indicating the need for a new siddur (prayer book) than discovering that the current siddur is out of print! Siddur Sim Shalom has served CBI's Shabbat and weekday community with loyalty, dignity, and meaning for the better part of three decades. Just as it, too, was once deemed "the new siddur" in relation to its

predecessor, the Silverman Siddur, the Siddur Sim Shalom now finds itself approaching the end of its tenure.

There's a life lesson in this, perhaps. This is not by chance. Since its inception, the Conservative Movement has recognized that an evershifting world would necessitate new and renewed forms of prayer and meditation. The earliest version of the Silverman Siddur, for instance, did not include prayers to be recited on Yom Ha'Shoah, Yom Ha'Zikaron, nor on Yom Ha'atzmaut. Those days, after all, had not yet formally existed.

The Movement's new official prayer book collection, The Lev Shalem Series, is the perfect siddur for our time. Its English is emotive, literal, and can be relied upon as a trusted translation. Its reflections, poetry, and commentary stimulate both mind and soul while stirring the heart. The prayers are inclusive, recognizing that Jews and Jewish households are not homogeneous.

Personally, I'm incredibly excited for CBI to join the ranks of other Movement congregations that have already made the move to Siddur Lev Shalem. I'm equally excited to embark on some learning with all of you over the next few months, as we discover the siddur together, explore its wisdom, and find ourselves reflected in its pages.

I invite you to purchase a personal copy for your home so that you can pray with us throughout the year, even when you're away or joining us online. I also invite you to invest in the copies for the sanctuary, through the donation of a book plate and inscription. **Please see pages 18-19 for details!** If the Lev Shalem Siddur serves us for the next 30 years, we have an opportunity to impact the spiritual lives of the next two generations with this purchase. In this way, we renew and keep relevant our ancient, sacred prayers, so that our children and their children will find meaning and relevance in their hallowed, sacred words.

I look forward to praying alongside you.

Musical Notes

Kol Yisrael Areivim Zeh Bazeh. This Aramaic phrase, found in the Talmud (Shevuot 39a), means "All of Israel are responsible for one another." Our sages point to this phrase as the basis of the notion of communal responsibility in Jewish law. If one Jew sees another Jew about to sin, s/he has an obligation to intervene. To me, this phrase serves as one of the many different reminders that I am part of a larger Jewish community and that I am connected to

Jews all over the world – just by the fact that we are all Jews.

At this time of year, I think about how Jews all around the world will be reading Megillat Esther and exchanging Shalach Manot on Purim (although only we at CBI Millburn will have the special treat of experiencing the very talented singer/composer Carla Friend in a special Purim afternoon family concert!). Or on Passover, how so many Jews will join a Seder (or two!) and even though no two Seders will be identical, (with different Haggadot, minhagim and traditions, melodies, questions and discussions, foods, duration, etc.), eating Matzah, asking the Four Questions and other elements of the Seder will likely be included. (If you want to learn more about the Haggadah through the Ages, join us Sunday evening, March 27th for a special pre Passover CBI Lifelong Learning lecture on Zoom by Rutgers University professor Gary Rendsburg).

Over Presidents weekend, I visited my son Josh at college in Boston and had the opportunity to go with him to the Friday evening service at Hillel. It was a beautiful, spirited service (with impressive attendance!), and it was another reminder of feeling connected to Jews not just in other places but also of different generations. Mike and I were the oldest ones there by many years, but I felt connected to them in our Davenning by reciting the same liturgy, the use of the same Nusach (traditional Jewish musical prayer modes) by the students who led, and by many of the same congregational melodies that we sing at CBI and that I had learned at Camp Ramah. The other pleasant surprise for me was that they use Siddur Lev Shalem! And they had enough copies for the approximately 60 students who were there! I of course asked Josh what he thinks of this Siddur and he said he really liked it (I hadn't even told him yet that CBI will be transitioning to it soon!) and that being able to read the commentary and explanations about the prayers during the service made it more

One of the beauties of being Jewish is the rhythm that guides our lives, first and foremost through the weekly celebration of Shabbat. I marvel at the impact we have had on the entire world, which follows the weekly rhythm established by the Jews millennia ago. Shabbat is a welcome

respite from the rest of the week and gives us an opportunity to gather as a community and interact with each other, whether in person or through Zoom. In these times, I especially look forward to Shabbat as a break from my daily routines. Ironically, the restrictions that forbid work on Shabbat give me the freedom to rest and recharge.

We also observe an annual rhythm with a rich calendar of holidays to celebrate. Indeed, there is only one month in the Jewish calendar with no significant observances, the month of Cheshvan (how fortunate for American Jews that we can celebrate the secular holiday of Thanksgiving in Cheshvan!).

Now, as we prepare to exit from our winter cocoons and look forward to the approach of the Spring with more daylight and warmer temperatures, we also delight in the holiday of Purim. I have personally been baking hamantaschen for family and friends since I was in college, and I'm always on the lookout for silly hats to wear for the megillah reading. I look forward to seeing you at the chanting of Megillat Esther and, for the younger set, our Purim carnival.

One month after Purim, we celebrate Passover with the seders being the highlight of the holiday. In my household growing up, we shared the seders with another family and traded nights on which family would host. We kept up this tradition for almost 50 years, extending to the next generation. Passover and the seder nights remain a powerful draw to gather as an extended family, even when we have had to do it on Zoom.

Passover is a time of renewal, where we clean out our homes and start fresh. In keeping with this tradition, we have launched a campaign to replace our Sim Shalom prayer books with the new Lev Shalem siddur. The Lev Shalem siddur is full of interesting commentary and will enhance our Shabbat services. You can participate in this campaign by dedicating books in honor or in memory of loved ones. You can also order a siddur for your own use at home at the same discounted rate. Thanks to a generous donor who wishes to remain anonymous, your donations to this campaign will be matched 1:1!

Soon after Passover this year, we will have our own celebration at CBI, welcoming Rabbi Isenberg and his family to our community with a Gala evening, followed by Rabbi Isenberg's official installation on Shabbat morning. I hope you will all be able to join us at both events.

Passover is a celebration of moving from bondage to freedom that we can appreciate more fully this year. After two years of living with the suffering from a global pandemic and the restrictions it has placed on our lives, all of us are ready to be free. We have been a resilient community, coming together on-line when we have had to and maintaining close ties to each other. We have great plans in place for the upcoming holidays and events regardless of what fate throws at us. It is my fervent hope that we have the opportunity to celebrate together.

From the Director of Congregational Learning

Todah rabbah once again to CBI for supporting my professional development. I had the privilege of attending the Jewish Educators Assembly Conference, The Leader Within, January 31 through February 3. I will continue to serve on the

National Board, this term as an Early Childhood Education Liaison. During the conference I presented two sessions with colleagues on how to attract families with young children, even if you do not have a preschool.

I can't describe how amazing it was to be together in person, after two years of meeting online. We were a small group physically together in the mornings, with the bulk of the conference sessions online in the afternoons. And once again, I was blown away at how much we all do in this position that is described in the vernacular as "Hebrew School principal." More and more of us also have responsibility for a preschool. And the position of Youth Director has disappeared almost everywhere, becoming merged with the Education Director. The breadth and depth of our jobs has grown exponentially. And while some of us are Cantor-Educators, the rest of us are equally expected to teach tefillah, lead youth services, and often sub-in for clergy, whether leading services or preparing divrei Torah. We can hang with preschoolers in the morning, run supplemental school in the afternoon, and teach adult education along the way. To be together with my chevra, my colleagues my friends, was beyond amazing. No one else understands what we do. No one else speaks the same language, faces the same challenges and opportunities, reflects in the same way on the year passed and the year to come. To be in community to learn together, to eat together, to dream together was a perfect mid-winter break. And we davened, three times a day - with each of us taking turns.

It was some of the most spiritual worship I have participated in. I am looking forward to integrating new ideas into all areas of my portfolio.



Safety and Security Thru The Lens Of Pekuach Nefesh

Pekuach nefesh – the saving of life – is a key aspect of Jewish practice, and reflects the larger Jewish principle of reverence for life. Pekuach nefesh is so important that our tradition permits almost every commandment to be violated if the violation is necessary to preserve life. The centrality of pekuach nefesh, coupled with a recent and significant rise in antisemitism, has caused CBI and many others in the Jewish community to renew their focus on synagogue safety and security.

Several years ago CBI applied for, and was awarded, a major government grant to fund a variety of "target hardening" projects, and over the past 18 months a small committee of congregants worked to actively administer that grant. Funds from the grant enabled us to upgrade and expand our security camera system and our door entry control system. The grant was also used to install the several benches and planters that now adorn the patio at the front of our building and the school entrance and playground area at the rear of our building. Grant funds also enabled us to undertake other projects, such as offering the virtual Safety and Security Seminars held in January 2022 for our school staff, congregational staff, and congregants.

Through careful selection and management of grant projects, and with a watchful eye on the grant budget, our committee spent the full amount awarded – approximately \$150,000 – and successfully obtained reimbursement of all funds disbursed. In other words, all projects undertaken were funded exclusively with grant money and not with CBI funds.

CBI was delighted to recently learn that it was again awarded \$150,000 in government funds to support additional "target hardening" projects to be undertaken over the next several years. But despite CBI's success in winning security grants, many safety and security

expenses are not grant-funded and instead must be paid from our operating budget. Indeed, the speaker at our recent Safety and Security Seminars observed that "security is both inconvenient and expensive". For that reason, in recent years it has been necessary for CBI to include a modest Safety and Security Fee in the annual billing to all members.

An important part of maintaining safety and security is that congregants and staff receive appropriate security training, and hopefully thereafter have an opportunity to periodically practice what they learn. In recent weeks, several virtual training sessions were announced to the congregation in the regular weekly emails sent by the CBI office. We hope to offer additional sessions from time to time on a variety of safety-related topics, so please watch the CBI emails for details and consider registering for as many trainings as possible.

Though the discussion above relates largely to physical safety, "security" also encompasses internet safety and cybersecurity. In an effort to maintain online security, CBI recently began asking virtual attendees at worship services and other events to identify themselves when entering the Zoom room.

Many of us routinely purchase medical insurance, auto insurance, homeowner insurance, and perhaps other coverage. We hope not to use it, but having it gives us peace of mind. Similarly, we hope there will be no need to use information learned in our security trainings, or rely on CBI's enhanced safety systems. Nevertheless, safety and security must remain an ongoing priority so that we, as a community, can achieve peace of mind from knowing that we are prepared in the event of an emergency. Pekuach nefesh requires nothing less.

Introducing the CBI Alliance for Sustainability

For everyone in the CBI community concerned about the environment, I am proud to introduce you to the CBI Alliance for Sustainability. The Alliance is made up of CBI members who share a passion for the environment and a commitment to making sure that CBI does its part to preserve and protect the natural world.



We began our activities in earnest last year by joining the Hazon Seal of Sustainability initiative, a 12-month program designed to support Jewish organizations and communities like CBI that are working to create a healthier, more equitable, and more sustainable world. Hazon helps link Jewish values and Jewish teachings to substantive action in pursuit of environmental sustainability. Hazon also provides a wide range of resources and direct support from expert consultants to help identify and prioritize projects for our community. Our 2021 projects included:

- 1) Forming the CBI Alliance for Sustainability and completing Hazon's environmental sustainability audits to help inform future projects
- 2) Launching our alliance at the summer BBQ by bringing in composting bins, using environmentally friendly paper goods and utensils, and composting

- nearly all waste from the event. Also at the BBQ, we ran a blind taste test of beef vs beyond meat to introduce and increase awareness of non-meat dietary options
- 3) Bringing in Nigel Savage, founder, and former longtime CEO of Hazon as a guest speaker and teacher during Men's Club Shabbat

In acknowledgement of these 2021 activities, CBI has received Hazon's Seal Certification. We are proud of this recognition and will use it as a springboard to initiate our next round of projects. Our future efforts will focus on what we do within our building, and how we can educate and empower our members to expand their personal sustainability practices at home. Stay tuned for details!



To build on last year's progress, we've identified and prioritized several projects for 2022. We are planning to








Dedicate a Lasting Memory

My own Israel Story

Nancy and I have been visiting Israel for all of February, including, of course Presidents Day. This holiday reminded me of my first visit to Israel, a CBI / Ziv Tzedakah Fund trip scheduled over the Presidents Day holiday in 2003. I was

over fifty years old for my first trip, a trip I took with my mother, Joie Tenenbaum, and my older daughter Stephanie. I wanted to take this trip for a combination of reasons. My Grandmother Celia Kritzler gave me a gift when I was a teenager for an Israel trip which I had never used. And just the year before, my father Harold Tenenbaum had tried to put together a family trip to Israel, but none of us accepted the offer. He died later in 2002 and I felt I owed him a future trip.

The trip was wonderful. It showed us a variety of sites in Israel and introduced us to many nonprofit organizations working to help modern Israel live its Jewish values. Two years later I participated, again with CBI in a Jewish Federation of Metrowest trip; and through the years, I have returned many times.

Since Stephanie made Aliyah in 2007 Nancy and I have visited regularly. I can say that I have lost count of my trips to Israel.

However, I want to describe an important distinction between the trips before she made Aliyah and after. Since 2007, I have taken two tourism trips, and many more visits. Visits are so different because you are experiencing Israel in a more regular day to day way. Through the years we have visited in Jerusalem, Givatayim, Tel Aviv, and now Zichron Ya'akov.

And since 2015, when our first grandchild was born, our visits have become so much more. While we love the modern convenience of video chat and WhatsApp, there are many grandparent tasks which can best be performed in person: for example, making lunches, playing cards, going out for ice cream, and going to the park.

We missed our travel in 2020 but have been able to return several times in 2021 and this year. It seems like most restrictions are now being eliminated so travel to Israel will become easier.

I hope that you will be able to do the same. And if you do, please share your adventures with CBI in the Bulletin.
