# Letter from the President

I am happy to report on a successful and fulfilling trip for the CBI Desert Dawgs on the Israel Ride, benefiting Hazon and the Arava Institute. We biked from Jerusalem to Kibbutz Negba outside Ashdod and then from there to the outskirts of Gaza and on to Sde Boker and Mitzpe Ramon for Shabbat, where we were joined by Rabbi Ari. On our final two days of biking, we traveled to Kibbutz Keturah and the Arava institute, and then rode a final day along the

Egyptian border to Eilat. Along the way, we were taught about the connection of places we passed through to biblical history, met people who live in settlements around Gaza and in settlement towns in the Negev, talked to Israeli, Palestinian and American alumni and students of the Arava Institute and met fellow riders and dedicated supporters from all across the U.S. The Desert Dawgs constituted about 10% of the total of 170 riders and was the largest single team by far, under the able leadership of our captain, Brett Cohen. We were inspired by Dan Richter, who is a lifelong supporter of Israel and had planned to come with his family. While he could not join us on the ride, we brought him with us in spirit and through the presence of "Flat Danny", the life-size portrait of Dan that posed with us for pictures throughout the week. Thank you to the many CBI members who donated to support the team. It is a great cause that promotes both environmental sustainability and Arab-Israeli cooperation in the Middle East.

There is growing excitement in the preschool as our enrollment continues to grow and will soon reach 40 students. The new playground equipment has arrived and will soon be installed. We look forward to seeing the preschool families and their kids at the monthly Bim Bam shabbat and at Saturday morning Shabbat K'tanim services.

I would like to acknowledge a gift from the estate of Shirley Lieberman. Shirley and Lester Lieberman were long-time members of CBI from the day they moved to Millburn and lived here for over 40 years. They were strong supporters of CBI, JTS, Daughters of Israel and Federation. In her younger years, Shirley was a teacher and Lester was a CPA in partnership with his brother of a small, well-respected accounting firm. They often welcomed new CBI members to their home and both left CBI insurance policies when they died! # Letter from the Rabbi

Dear Congregants,

I adore the old joke about a congregant who is fast asleep in the front row of the sanctuary, his head leaning on his wife's shoulder. The rabbi, noticing the sleeping attendee, descends from the pulpit and asks the wife to wake him up. The wife replies, "Rabbi, with all due respect, you put him to sleep, you wake him up!"

When I assumed the pulpit at CBI, I was asked about my vision and strategy for crafting worship services (be it Shabbat, Festivals, or High Holidays). My simple response: create an environment which avoids the aforementioned scenario. The necessary ingredients include careful planning, the creation of and adherence to a spiritual arc for a given service, and some reliability. With this recipe, I would endeavor to create a two-and-a-half hour (literally from start to finish) Shabbat morning service that would be liturgically traditional, spiritually heightened, and would attempt to engage the soul, the mind, and create communal energy, resonance, and connection.

Week in and week out, we have mostly achieved this mission. Our service begins at 9:30am and concludes by 12pm as we make our way to delicious kiddush in the social hall. It might be true that millennials have less *sitzfleisch*, or attention span, than our parents and I'm most definitely an old millennial. The motivation for this concept, however, is a desire to make every moment spent in the sanctuary one of spiritual impact and intensity, void of the lulls that historically characterized a visit to shul. After all, each time we enter the sanctuary we should strive to feel as if at the base of Mount Sinai, filled with awe and wonder.

There's just one key ingredient that we're still partially missing: You.

We have a dedicated core of Shabbat attendees, both in person and online. Spending time with them each week enriches my life immeasurably. Still, I recognize that some of you have not yet given our new Shabbat service a try and I'd like to invite you to do so. Some weeks we have guest speakers; other weeks, guest chanters or leaders; most weeks, Cantor Wallach and I are harmonizing our way through the service.

If you haven't given Shabbat morning a try in a while, make a plan to try it out. We'll greet you with open arms, warmth, and an accessible service that will, hopefully, leave you invigorated.

# **Musical Notes** By Cantor Lorna Wallach





If you took a survey to determine what people enjoy most about celebrating Chanukah, I would guess that the top responses would be gathering with family/friends/community to light the Chanukiyah, eating latkes and sufganiyot (jelly donuts) and exchanging gifts. I certainly enjoy all of those elements of the holiday as well, but what I enjoy most, and what I have the most special and meaningful memories of from my celebration of Chanukah with my family

and community through the years, is singing the many songs connected to the holiday-- including those that are traditional, contemporary, culturally diverse, or just plain fun (and even silly)!

Many people are surprised to hear that one of the most widely known and sung songs of Chanukah, *Maoz Tzur*, may have started out as a hymn for the festival of Shavuot! Maoz Tzur was written by a 13th or 14th century Ashkenazic poet named Mordechai, whose name appears in an acrostic in the first letter of each of the five verses. The hymn probably became associated with Chanukah due to the word *chanukat*, "dedication," in the first paragraph. After the opening verse, four succinct paragraphs illustrate God's constant involvement in our people's destiny: in Egypt, in Babylonia and during the crises that are commemorated by Purim and Chanukah. A sixth stanza, apparently written during a similar crisis, was added sometime in the 15th century. It asks God to avenge the persecutions of the current evil regime.

*Maoz Tzur*, like many other medieval liturgical hymns, incorporates Biblical imagery and other ancient Jewish symbolic phraseology, so even the "strict Hebrew meaning" is not always entirely clear. However, there is no doubt that the commonly sung English version is a clear departure from the original text. The words "Rock of Ages" also unfortunately have misleading associations with a famous Christian hymn by that name.

The melody most widely used can be traced to two or three different German folktunes of the 16th century which were pieced together. Long before Maoz Tzur was set to the present tune, this hymn was sung by the Italian Jews to a tune composed by Benedetto Marcello in the 15th century and is still sung with this tune by many in Israel today.

In addition to the many well-known Chanukah songs that hopefully you will enjoy singing, I would also encourage you to explore You Tube to find new Chanukah songs to add to your repertoire! Anything performed by the Maccabeats is sure to be uplifting, and the group Six13's 'Bohemian Chanukah' is worth hearing for the entertainment and interesting harmonies.

If you want to hear a memorable 'Doo-Wop' arrangement of "I Had a







# **ISRAEL AFFAIRS**

### Some News Concerning Israel

I hope that you have a more up to date source on news about Israel than this column, but I still want to follow up on what I wrote in the last Bulletin.

Israel held its election on November 1, and very quickly determined that this election was different from the other four indecisive elections of the last few years. The count showed that a "right wing" coalition led by Benjamin Netanyahu was in a position to form a government, with 64 members of Knesset. While there are still adjustments and negotiations occurring, it seems clear that he will return once again as Prime Minister. What is different this time, compared to others (according to a Times of Israel podcast which I listen to) is that Netanyahu's Likud party is the most moderate party expected to be in the government. Usually, he has formed coalitions with parties to the left, and parties to the right.

This will cause some complications for him as he fills the minister positions in his government – will he offer prime positions to the leaders of the other parties, or will he offer them to other members of Likud?

Perhaps we can say that Israeli elections are much simpler than American elections (You vote only for the party – just one vote to count for each voter), but the formation of the government afterwards is more complicated.

### **CBI's Israel Heroes**

Kol ha Kavod to the CBI members of the Desert Dawgs team which rode by bicycle from Jerusalem to Eilat, and raised funds for the Arava Institute, an Israeli environmental organization committed to working with Israel and its neighbors to protect and improve the status of the environment in its region. I am so proud of all our friends who made the commitment and travelled to Israel to make the ride and support this wonderful organization. Also, I offer a special salute to Dan Richter, who has been a leader in supporting the ride for years but was unable to participate this year.

### **CBI Federation trip to Israel**

Next July, Federation of Greater MetroWest is sponsoring a community wide tour to Israel in early July. Rabbi Isenberg has accepted a challenge to fill a bus with CBI congregants, and the CBI effort is being led by Mariela Markelis Dybner. As we approach the dates look for more information about this exciting trip. (Next year is Israel's 75th Anniversary.
